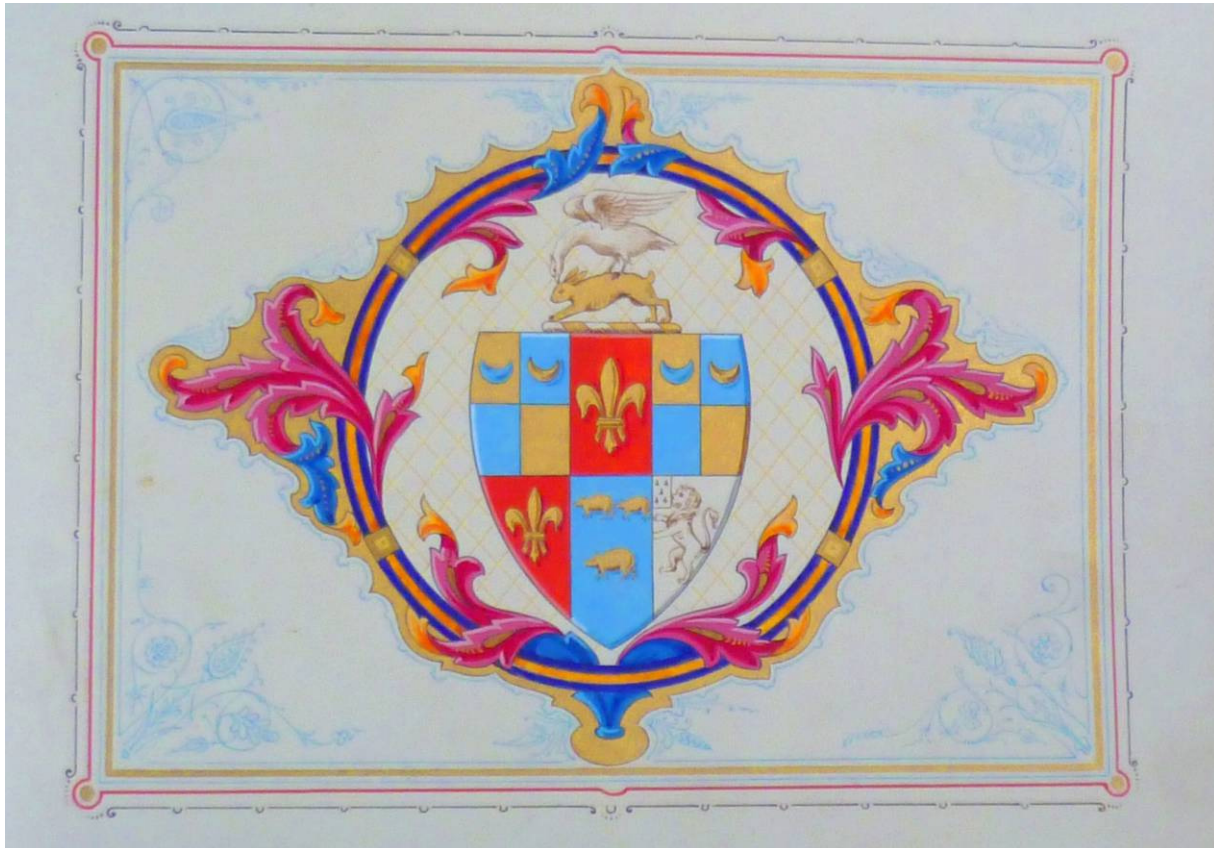


# Quorn House Cricket Club

pervaded every act of yours in connection with the Club since its formation two years ago.

At that time a deputation consisting of Messrs **Firr & White** waited upon you and explained the difficulties which beset the path of the Executive of the then existing Cricket Club, when with that willingness to help in all matters connected with the welfare of the Parish, which has been such a distinguishing feature of your character,
