PARISH NOTES.

On May 22th, with the assent of the Church-wardens, I called together the Church-workers (of whom there are more than 60) to consult together about the desirability of acquiring a piece of ground for the purpose of building a Church room. It is, I think, generally known that a part of Baum's Garden's, consisting of 1000 square yards, adjoining Church Lane, is in the hands of friendly holders, who have offered it at a reasonable sum for the purpose.

The meeting was unanimously in favour of purchase, but it was resolved to take no further steps until a general meeting of Church-people should be called to consult together upon the whole matter.

NOTICE.—Accordingly, a meeting will be held at the Schools, on Wednesday evening, July 24th, at 8.15, to which Church-people are invited.

Since last Magazine the Report of the Diocesan Inspector on the examination at the National Schools on May 1st has been received. This examination and report of course only deal with the religious part of the instruction.

Infants: "The Children are well grounded. The singing was excellent."

Mixed School: "There is an excellent tone and much excellent teaching in this School. The singing is particularly expressive."

It is unfortunate that the same afternoon the Sunday School Teachers for this Deanery are meeting at Barrow.

As usual during the summer, on Tuesday evenings, Mrs. Kelcey and I will be at the Vicarage lawn, to play (or look on) at Bowls. Only those 18 are invited at these times.

On July 15th, 16th and 17th, I hope to be at a Diocesan Retreat at our Cathedral at Peterborough. This is a meeting of clergy on the Bishop's invitation for united Communion, Prayer and Meditation. Addresses will be given during the Retreat by the Archdeacon of Birmingham.

Making this announcement gives an opportunity for me to press upon people the duty of regular pastor in the Church, while it is a very blessed one, much beset with temptations. People see our failings and weaknesses, and perhaps do not scruple to speak of them; they should not fail to pray for us regularly as we are bound regularly to pray for them.

I commend for this purpose the daily use of the Collect, said daily in Church, "Almighty and Eternal God who alone workest great marvels, &c. Some perhaps could say through the Hymn (353),

"O Thou who makes Souls to shine."

I always say this hymn through morning by morning as I ring the Church bell for Prayers. Cannot some join me when they hear the bell. Cannot some at least say one verse, e.g.,

"O bless the shepherd, bless the sheep,
That guide and guided both be one,
One in the faithful watch they keep,
Until this hurrying life be done."

I should so much like to think that while I am ringing the bell many of the people in the houses, streets, factory or away in the fields are praying with me for a blessing on us all!

I hope to be away from home for a fortnight in July. In case of the services of a clergyman being required in my absence application should be made to Mr. Herbert, the Clerk, who has directions how to obtain immediate attention to such requirements.

PARISH NOTES.

Our children will be glad to be reminded that the School Treat will be held as usual in connection with the Dedication Festival—this year on the Eve—Saturday, August 24th. By that time we may hope that even this year the weather will be settled!

On the Dedication Festival, S. Bartholomew's Day, Sunday, August 25th, there will be Holy Communion at 7, 8 (choral) and at mid-day (instead of the first Sunday in September). The Sermons,

morning and evening, will be preached by the Rev. G. B. Ekanyake, who will be so well remembered here. Collections for the Fabric Fund (for keeping our Church in repair, &c.)

According to notice in last month's magazine a meeting was held on July 24th, to further consult about the purchase of a site for a Church Room. It was again unanimously resolved that the site on Baum's Gardens should be purchased, and a scheme for raising this particular money was adopted. As an appeal for subscriptions will be made forthwith, it may be well to repeat one or two facts.

The site consists of 1000 square yards of what is known as Baum's Gardens, immediately adjoining the Church Walk. This and more of the land has been in the hands of two gentlemen who took it over two or three years ago, when the other half of the land was purchased for addition to the Churchyard. Their action made it possible for us at that time to secure the Churchyard land without a great burden of debt. Acting as friends to the Church they have always promised that we should have the best part of the land for a Church Room, without any profit on their former purchase being made. The portion which admirably suits our purpose can now be had for £125. In order to settle the matter £50 at least of that sum should be raised forthwith. It is proposed to issue collecting cards or lists among Church-people, who may put upon them their own subscription, and appeal to those whom they know best, so that by that means every one likely to give may be asked.

If we co-operate heartily together the sum required should be raised in a very short time. I should like to be able to publish a goodly sum in the next magazine.

Several tokens of interest in natural history amongst children have recently come to notice. There was a letter received by a little friend at Quorn Church from Cedric Burrows (who is I suppose about nine years old), from California, in the far West of America. The letter is full of observations as to the animals, trees and flowers that grow there. Another token of this interest is the number of times that children from the Elementary School brought in plants for identification. More than one plant never before found in this district has been covered. And some of the boys seem to be very interested in these searches. It is well known that much encouragement is now given to these branches of study in our Schools, and how much the money has been helped by the Natural History Lectures in the place during the last few weeks.

I never remember to have heard of a Quorn boy being struck by lightning till the case occurred on July 20th. It appears that our friend and neighbour being employed as night-watchman over some new work at Shepshed was struck as he was lighting his lamps for the night. Though rendered unconscious and quite disabled for a time, he is (at the end of the week) doing well.

PARISH NOTES.

I have before called attention to the improvements that have been going on in Barrow Church during the last twelve months. Barrow Church was originally the mother of Quorn Church, and so should have a special interest for Quorn people. The work alluded to is now almost completed. The new vestries, separate for Choir and Clergy, have been finished, and are very handsome in construction and convenient for use. They are built on the North side of the Church, the organ chamber being over them. The new organ will be finished by the end of September,

and the whole new work is to be dedicated on Wednesday afternoon, September 25th, at 3, by the Bishop of the Diocese.

As special services are arranged during the whole week that follows, it may be better that our Harvest Festival should be postponed till the first week in October. The later date will also accord better with the very late season.

Two more parishioners have left us for a very distant land. Mr. and Mrs Blackwell left at the end of August. They have gone to New Zealand.

I am sorry to have to record that by no means good news has come of all our recent emigrants. Several have had difficulty in getting suitable employment, and some have been so unsuccessful that they would be glad to return to the old country and home. This makes it more than ever desirable that intending emigrants should make very careful enquiries and consider very carefully before making a move.

Thankful mention should specially be made this year of the fine afternoon that we had for the School Treat. Looking back it seems the first summer-like afternoon this year!

The following reads curiously now. It is the inscription on a notice board still preserved at the Post Office, of which Mr. North has kindly furnished me with a copy. It is dated September 29th, 1840. Note that only one member of the Committee still survives.

Notice is hereby given that during the time the Post Office is at this Place, any cause of complaint against the parties holding the Post Office, is requested to be made to the Revd. Thos. Burnaby, Fredk. Deacon, Jno. Saville Hyde, Joseph Tacy, Willm. H. Inglesant, Junr., or Edwd. P. Jackson: the Committee appointed to superintend the management of the Post Office.

The Committee have directed, that the Letter Box should be closed from the 1st April to the 1st October, precisely at 6-o' Clock; during the months of March and October, at 5-o' Clock; and during the months of November, December, January, and February, at 4-o' Clock, and any letters coming in after those times and until the man starts with the Letter Bag, at 5 minutes past each of these hours must pay a penny each.

What follows now is a greater curiosity still. It is supplied by Mr. Farnham, having been obtained recently from the Public Record Office in London. It gives a glimpse of Quorn people in the reign of

Henry VIII., that is to say some time between 1547. I suppose "Billmen" were men armed with a sort of axe. "Archers" of course used bows.

Whether a Church Room so much needed (see below), will be built soon or not, one necessary step towards it has been taken.

A Sewing Party to raise money for one or more of our parochial Church funds is being arranged, to meet during the winter at the Village Hall, on Wednesday afternoons at 2.30 (first October 30). Ladies attending are asked to give a small subscription towards the purchase of materials. Tea is provided at 3d. each. As the result of our party in the summer

of 1906, £50 was raised one afternoon at a Sale of Work, free of all expenses. Let us hope for a successful result this time.

A parishioner and Church-worker, who has had large experience in the work, has offered to start and carry on a Band of Hope in connection with the Church, if I can obtain the co-operation of three or four others. Those who assist in such work should have some aptitude and skill in the management of children, and also be keenly interested in the cause of temperance. I shall be glad to hear of any willing to help.

An old friend and close neighbour has kindly allowed me to copy the following inscription from a religious book given him when a little boy. I wonder whether there are any of his school-fellows left?

Willm. Hill,
Quorndon Free School,
given him for his good behaviour
Christmas, 1833

The first three weeks of October were marked by three untimely deaths, as we say. The first, a man in the very fulness of strength, carried off after a few days sickness. The other two were still more sudden—the second—a once strong man, crippled in years through an accident, fell at his work without any warning—the third, a young woman in her prime, also without any warning. I never remember burying three persons consecutively under such circumstances. What a comment on the words said in every grave: "In the midst of life we are in death, whom shall we seek for succour but of Thee O Lord."

Purchase of Site for Church Room.

Statement on behalf of the Church Committee.

Below is printed the list of subscriptions given for this purpose. It will be seen that the appeal of the Church Committee has met with a very prompt and liberal response. I do not think we have ever made an effort to raise money for Church purposes in Quorn before that has been so readily and widely met. I believe that this is due in part to the lead given by the Committee, but the general appreciation of the object has no doubt made it popular. To secure a site close to the Church while it might be had, was so plainly good policy and business-like, whether a Church Room would be built soon or late, that the Committee might have felt sure of generous support. At the same time it was realised that questions might reasonably be raised as to the need of a Church Room at all. To anticipate such questions, at the very outset of the movement, two meetings were called, first of the Church workers and secondly of the general body of Church people. At both of these meetings these questions were raised and discussed, and at both a resolution was unanimously passed in favour of the purchase of the land. For the satisfaction of all interested it may be well to repeat some reasons for the need of a Church Room which cannot be met by the School buildings and the Village Hall.

First to mention some of the purposes for which this room is required:

- (1) For a big lads class on Sunday afternoon, at which more than 40 have been present. This has been held during summer months on the Vicarage lawn but now, as last winter, is crowded into the Vicarage dining-room. It is desired to hold a Recreation Club for these lads on one or two nights in the week. For this also the room would serve
- N.B. A corresponding class of girls and young women is seated *on the desks* in the Infant School Room.
- (2) For weekly Mothers' Meetings during the winter, now held at the Vicarage.
For occasional Mothers' Union Meetings.
For Meetings of the Girls' Friendly Society.
For weekly Sewing Party Meetings held during the winter. [The difficulty of accommodation is just now being felt.]
- (3) For Choir Practices, which it is very undesirable to hold always in the Church.
- (4) I have been lately pressed to start a Band of Hope and a Branch of the Church Lads' Brigade for both of which a Church Room would be utilised.
- (5) For Vestry Meetings. Our Vestry is quite inadequate for this purpose, it is very inconvenient even for a well-attended Committee Meeting.
- (6) For occasional Missionary and other religious gatherings which might be held more frequently if a room was ready without payment or difficulty.

Now as regards the accommodation at the School Buildings and the Village Hall. Of the former it must be remembered that they are not available till the evenings (except in holiday times) and that they are now also nearly filled with heavy desks which it is difficult even to shift about and which are unfitted for grown-up people to use.

At the Village Hall the larger of the two rooms is too large except for really large gatherings, and the smaller is only available in the evenings, it having been let for years for the purpose of a private School. Through the courtesy of the tenant half the smaller room has been used for an afternoon Sewing Party, but it is most inconvenient for the purpose. Moreover of course (reasonably enough) the use of either room has to be paid for which is a practical obstacle to frequent use. That neither the Schools nor the Village Hall are centrally situated is another very real objection to their regular use.

It may be repeated that the plot of ground on Baum's Gardens along Church Lane is being bought from Mr. Warner and Mr. Parker, who have kindly kept it for us, for a sum of £125. These gentlemen bought this and the adjoining strip of land for £520 to accommodate us when the portion along the Churchyard wall was desired for future additional burial ground and they have as yet had no portion of their purchase money back again. Public recognition should again be made of their kindness and I rejoice that we are now in a position to relieve them of part of their responsibility. It must be remembered that of the £125 the Committee decided to appeal only for £50 at present and to borrow the balance £75 from the Building Society. Hearing of our plans Mrs. Perry Herrick not only subscribed £5, but also most kindly offered to lend us the balance free of interest if the £50 should be raised before the end of October. As will be seen from the list below considerably more than £50 has been raised so that we shall only need to accept Mrs. Herrick's benefaction to the extent of about £65.

We have more than 50 persons who do active work for the Church, more than 100 recently contributed money for a Church purpose. How many will mark the Advent season by a special effort of the all important work of united prayer?

The Working Party at the Village Hall on Wednesday afternoons at 3 is going well. To-day (Nov. 20) there were 30 present. There is plenty of room for more.

The list of subscribers to the Church Room Site Fund is again printed with a few additions. The total now amounts to £64 9s. 5d.

The Balance Sheet of the Clothing and Coal Club is given below. It is satisfactory to note that more was paid in this year than last notwithstanding the shortness of work in some quarters.

Before the end of the year I hope to have delivered at every house in the parish an Almanack with a coloured sacred picture upon it, and I ask acceptance of this little present as a token of my good will and good wishes.
