PARISH NOTES.

Two useful works are going forward in the Churchyard. The stoke hole is being enlarged so that in future Mr. Herbert may stoke with greater ease. A shed also is being built to hold the bier and the Churchyard tools.

If anyone had found the faithful Herbert asphyxiated one day among the ashes, where he has worked so diligently for so many years, it would have been a most regrettable incident. And if the bier had ever fallen on his devoted head while he was hoisting it up to its eerie nest, we should have been very much to blame. So we hope that these improvements will be appreciated.

While speaking of the Churchyard a few other matters might be mentioned. Now that there is a rubbish pit please take your dead flowers there at once, and don't make other little refuse heaps elsewhere. And those who have a special love for "God's acre" might pick up as they pass through any odd bits of paper, etc., and throw them in the pit.

In the matter of funerals. There are often a large number of people present. Mere spectators we would discourage. For we have very little faith in the good that may follow from an indiscriminate attendance at funerals. But in the case of those whom friendship naturally and rightly brings to the grave side, would it not be better that they should at least join audibly in the Lord's Prayer and in the Amens? for the service is meant to be congregational.

The Men's Meeting to discuss the inauguration of a branch of the C.E.M.S. was held on September 14th. There were eighteen men present and three apologies were presented. We were most fortunate in our speakers who attacked the subject from three different points of view, and sustained the interest of the meeting for an hour and a half.

Their addresses cannot of course be inserted here, but a few points may well be set down. Mr. Boden told us that while the Society had its social and intellectual sides, it was primarily a spiritual movement; and one of its great objects was to develop the spiritual resources of the Church by the better co-operation of the laymen with the clergy, each man doing his "little bit" of work for God.

Mr. Daniels enlightened us as to some important details. Communicant men are eligible for membership. Professing churchmen may be associates. The only rule of life is to pray daily; and to do some work for God. Corporate Communion, Meetings for prayer, for discussions on subjects of interest, for helping forward various parochial works, will be the chief features of the life of a branch.

The Rector of Ridlington put before us two striking alternatives. The Church must encourage the spiritual work of the laity, or the Church must lose them. The idea of the movement is to give the layman his innings. He quoted the following words in which he had known a layman to sum up his experience. "I learn more from Christ my Lord by doing one act of self denial than by listening to a thousand sermons."

A resolution was proposed at the end of the meeting by Mr. Laundon and seconded by Mr. Adams, and carried unanimously "That a branch of the Church of England Men's Society be formed in the Parish." Headquarters however are cautious. They have provisionally accepted us as a branch. And only when after a period of probation they see that we mean business will they finally register us.

A subsequent Meeting was held on Thursday the 22nd, when there were 21 men present. Mr. G. Frisby was elected provisional Secretary, and rules were discussed at some length. The next Meeting will be held on Thursday, October 6th, at 7.30, in the Schools, when the rules will be accepted and a programme drawn up.

The Annual School Treat took place in the Rawlins' Grammar School field on Saturday, September 3rd. The sun shone brilliantly and games

and sports of every description were kept going all the afternoon. Tea was in the Village Hall, arranged to a nicety. The Vicar distributed the prizes at 6-30, by which time we knew it was autumn, and made a mental note that the treat must be earlier next year. There was a regular shower of buns at the close but no heads were broken.

The C.L.B. has lost the services of Sergeant Riley, who has been the correspondent since the formation of the Company, and has most diligently carried out the duties of a post which is by no means a sinecure. The Vicar has taken over the books temporarily, but he would be glad to hear of some layman who would undertake the work.

There is a proposal emanating from the Working Stall Committee to hold a Sale of what is left of their goods, together with a tea, and perhaps a little entertainment, on October 20th, in the Village Hall. It would be an excellent thing to dispose of the remnants, and if something sociable could be worked in at the same time so much the better.

We omitted to acknowledge with many thanks a gift made to the Church in June last, a handsome oak credence table given by Mrs. Watson.

Mrs. Farnham, senr., also has given a silver box for the Communion bread.

There will be a Special Service for the Oddfellows in Church on Sunday afternoon, Oct. 9th, at 3-0. The Children's Service on that afternoon will be at 2-0. Will parents and children please remember this?

Mrs. Stevenson, whose accident at the Mothers' Meeting outing we mentioned some time back, has made very good progress, and she wishes to thank the many friends who have shewn her kindness during her illness.

The District Visitors' Meeting will be held on Wednesday, October the 5th, at 11-0.

The Vicar will be in retreat at Ely from October 11th to the 14th.

PARISH NOTES.

Sunday, the 6th of November, being in the Octave of the Festival of All Saints, is the Sunday when the faithful departed are the subject of our thoughts, and our alms are given for the improvement of the Churchyard, where their bodies rest.

Curtain wings of rich material have been fixed on either side of the altar. They help to give just that touch of warmth and colour which our altar and reredos need. We have also received from Mr. Oliver Brown, a handsome pair of silver-mounted cruets for use at the Communion Service. Both of these gifts we beg to acknowledge with thanks.

The C.E.M.S. is getting well established. On October 6th, Mr. Webster, a member of the Knighton Branch, came to see us, and with a very sensible talk gave us a push along. The following programme was drawn up for the last quarter of the year:—

Tuesday, Oct. 25th, 7.30—"How the C.E.M.S. can best serve the interests of the Parish."
Mr. E. C. Laundon.

Tuesday, Nov. 22nd, 7.30—"Sunday Observance." Mr. O. Frisby.

Tuesday, Dec. 20th, 7.30—"Why am I a Churchman?" Mr. A. Burrowes.

The first of these Meetings has already been held. Mr. Laundon spoke of many ways in which men should make their influence felt. Amongst other things he advocated proper conversation, abstaining from bad language, and a brotherly attitude towards one another. Seven members present spoke after the opener, and there was a very pleasant interchange of thought.

One point perhaps stood out most forcibly in the discussion. The benefit obtained from Holy Communion was the personal testimony of more than one, and the part that Corporate Communion should play in the life of our society was generally agreed upon. We hope that as many as possible of our members will attend the Conference at Leicester on Nov. 5th.

An invitation was given in Church on Sunday, the 9th of October, to all who were interested in Temperance work, to attend a Meeting at the Vicarage on the following Saturday. In response to the invitation a small number came together and decided to make themselves into a branch of the Church of England Temperance Society, and to meet every alternate Saturday after Evensong (beginning on Saturday, Oct. 22nd), for prayer and consultation. A Public Meeting will be held at the Schools on Thursday, Nov 17th, at 7.30, when the Rev. A. J. Meakin, late Organizing Secretary for the Diocese will speak. The needs for a Temperance Society will be put forth, and the particular aims and methods of the Church of England Temperance Society will be explained.

The Church Lads' Brigade had their Annual Inspection on September 20th. Major Corah had intended to inspect the Company but he was unable to be present. Captain Jenkinson of S. Peter's, Leicester, took his place. He spoke very highly of the Company's efficiency.

There is certainly this to be said for our Company. Whatever there is to go in for we go in for it; and we hope that we shall keep this reputation, even if we do not always win. On Wednesday, the 28th of September, a team of six entered for Mrs. Tuckett's Swimming Cup at the Loughborough Baths. Only two other Companies entered, S. Peter's and Holy Trinity, Loughborough. We were second.

We have had two variations this month from our usual weekly drill. On the 7th we had a sing-song which brought to light some hidden talent, and added a little grist to the mill. On these occasions, which will occur from time to time, we shall always be glad to see our sisters, and our cousins, and our aunts—for 1d.

On the 21st the Hall was not at our disposal, so we took to the road instead. The Mountsorrel joined us and with them we marched to Rothley Plain. If the moon had been a little less bashful we might have skirmished a bit. But there is no knowing what we might have tripped upon in the darkness. So we did well after a short rest to wheel round at the top of the plain. We came down into Quorn by Wood Lane, marching easy, quick, and double according to the word of command. Such an evening's outing is splendid exercise, it gives a good opportunity to the band which they are not slow to take, and it saves expense.

We acknowledge, with many thanks, £1 from the Countess of Shannon, towards a rifle range.

It is a matter for congratulation that all the goods made by the working party are now disposed of. The Committee arranged for the sale of them on Thursday, October 20th, and by the inducement of a Tea and Entertainment brought a nice little company together. A profit of £7 11s. 8d., was handed over to the Churchyard Extension Fund.

We owe the members of the Mothers' Union an apology for not sending them their journals last month. The reason is a simple one but it ought not to have occurred. There was a bill awaiting payment. The Publishers got awkward. No money, no more journals. So we wrote a cheque. And must remember in future to discharge our debts with greater promptitude. We must soon be making arrangement for our next meeting.

The Oddfellows' Centenary Service brought 120 men to Church. The Service was of a very simple nature, consisting of Hymns, Prayer and an Address. On any future occasion, without necessarily waiting for the bi-centenary (!), we shall very gladly welcome them to Church.

The Clothing Club will re-open on Monday, November 7th. We are sorry to be unable to give free cards to all who apply. In fact we are bound to reduce the number of free cards owing to the fact that our balance is being considerably reduced every year. We hope to publish the Balance Sheet next month.
