PARISH NOTES.

My dear Friends,

Some of you will remember that, at the last Easter Vestry Meeting, I expressed the hope that in the near future we might be able to form a Communicants Guild in the Parish.

I think the time has now come when we should take some definite steps in this direction, and as the matter is one which concerns so closely the spiritual vitality of the Parish, I am addressing this letter to the communicants of the Parish in the hope that they may respond to the invitation which it contains.

The Holy Communion must stand out pre-eminently amongst our acts of worship, because it was ordained by Christ Himself, because our Lord gave us a very implicit command concerning it, and because of the "Benefits whereof we are Partakers thereby."

The objects of a Communicants Guild would be that God should be more frequently and more reverently worshipped in the special way that He has ordained, and that we ourselves should value more highly, and take more eagerly the help that is offered us in this pledge of God's love, the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of His Son Jesus Christ. "The cup of Blessing which we bless is it not the Communion of the Blood of Christ? The bread which we break is it not the Communion of the Body of Christ?"

The rules for members of the Communicants Guild will be very simple: (i) To come to Communion at least once a month, unless some special

matter of conscience keeps them back. (ii) To attend a monthly Communicant Class in Church.

A Meeting to which all the Communicants of the Parish are invited will be held in the Church on October the 17th, at 7.30. I hope that the points of my letter may be seriously considered and that the Meeting will be well attended.

The Patronal Festival plans were carried out as sketched in the August Magazine. A Parish Tea, at which there were between three and four hundred present, was held in the Village Hall on the afternoon of S. Bartholomew's day, the weather being far too wet to hold it in the Vicarage Garden. Tea was followed by a Concert arranged by Mr. Murray Rumsey, and thoroughly enjoyed by all. A Committee with Mr. Burrows as Secretary, worked very hard, and Miss Emily Thornton with a band of lady helpers provided an excellent tea. Evensong was sung in the Church at 7.30. There were 156 present. The Rev. E. L. Simpson preached from Acts ii, 42.

On the following morning there were 99 Communicants at the Celebrations. There is no standard by which we can gauge the success of our Parochial efforts except that of numbers. And this test is very far from trustworthy. But there was much to encourage us and enough we think to justify the repetition in future years of keeping S. Bartholomew-tide in the same manner.

The figures which we have quoted above when placed side by side very fairly represent we think the different proportion of response which the Church generally receives to her different appeals. We make no discontented comment upon them. But they are instructive and suggestive.

The Parish, and especially the C.E.M.S., loses a most earnest and valuable worker in the departure of Mr. George Frisby. The Annual Meeting of the C.E.M.S., was held in the Schools on Monday, Sept. 23rd, at 7-30. Great regret was expressed at the departure and necessary resignation of Mr. Frisby, and a vote of thanks accorded him with acclamation for his services as Secretary. Mr. Murray Rumsey was elected to succeed him as Secretary, and the following gentlemen to form the Committee: Mr. C. Adams, Mr. J. Atter, Mr. B. Fewkes, Mr. E. Bancroft, Mr. S. Wainwright, Mr. L. Wakeling, Mr. G. Brewin. When the business was concluded, refreshments were handed round and a very enjoyable evening of music spent till 10-30. Including some friends who were very welcome there were about 45 men present.

On October 7th, Mr. Percy Moore will introduce "Church Music" as the subject for discussion at the Monthly Meeting of the C.E.M.S., at 7-30, at the Schools. On October 13th, there will be a corporate Communion of members and a Men's Service at 3-30.

The C.L.B. has been growing in strength during the last few weeks, and we look forward to a winter of great activity. Seven recruits have lately given in their names. We are sorry that the entertainment which we announced in the last magazine has had to be postponed.

The Vicar will be at Ely in retreat from October 21st to 25th.

PARISH NOTES.

News from the front. "We have just had a baptism of 50 candidates. They have had a two years catechumenate. It has to be a long period to test as far as possible whether they are really in earnest. We have the first part of the service in Church. The candidates in dark blue calico. Then we form a procession and march down the avenue to "Jordan." We sing "The People that in darkness sat" three times on the way down. There the actual Baptism takes place, and the newly-baptised don their white robes, and we all march back singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." At the Church door they are received and signed with the Sign of the Cross and given a lighted candle. Then we all enter and the service is finished and followed by the Holy Communion sung for which of course they are allowed to remain for the first time. On coming out they are seized and embraced, or shaken by the hand by all the old Christians. There is great rejoicing. They will all be confirmed we hope early in October when the Bishop is to come to visit us."

The above is part of a letter received from Rusape, Rhodesia, by one of the members of our Missionary Guild. It is an interesting glimpse into

the life of our Church in distant lands among the heathen.

Mark (i). The careful preparation.

(ii). The symbolism of the garments worn, because as St. Paul said to his own converts "Ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord."

(iii). The joyful welcome extended to the new Christians because they were "no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow citizens with the Saints and of the Household of God."

The Missionary Guild will meet next at the Vicarage, on Thursday, Nov. 28th, at 8-o. (i) for further instruction in the work of the Church in Mashonaland and (ii) for prayer based upon knowledge. We cannot preach a true Christ unless we preach His world-wide claims. It is an obligation. The most serious that is laid upon us. "Woe is me if I preach not the Gospel."

On Sunday, December 1st, the first Sunday in Advent, we shall follow our usual custom and give the Collections to the Church Missionary Society. The Society will send a Preacher if they have one at their disposal.

St. Andrew's Tide is becoming more and more widely observed in the Church as a time of Intercession for the Extension of Christ's Kingdom all over the world. St. Andrew's day is November 30th. The following opportunities for prayer will be given in our own Church. On Friday, the 29th, at 11 a.m. and 6-30 p.m., and on Saturday the 30th, at 6-30 p.m., special prayers will be offered. And the Holy Communion on Saturday the 30th at 8-o, and on Sunday, Dec. 1st, at 7-o and 8-o, will be celebrated with a special intention for a forward movement in the evangelization of the heathen.

The Communicants Guild starts with a membership of 35. The first Meeting will be held in Church on Thursday, November 21st, at 7-30. We shall look forward, year by year, to grafting on to the Guild our Confirmation candidates.

The C.E.M.S. discussed "Church Music" at its last meeting. Mr. Percy Moore had evidently taken considerable trouble with his subject, and a good many controversial points were raised. An excellent syllabus for the year ending September, 1913, has been drawn up, and we hope that every member, as well as other men in the Parish, who are welcome to a copy of the syllabus on payment of 2d., will make a careful note of the fixtures before making other engagements.

At the Diocesan Conference of the C.E.M.S., in Leicester, six of our members were present. The subjects were the C.E.M.S. in relation to Foreign Missions, and Sunday Schools. Under the former of these our Secretary suggested a system of correspondence with missionaries as a way of becoming acquainted with work abroad.

The Monthly Meeting during November will be on the 4th. Mr. Thornton will introduce the subject "How everyone may become a Church worker." Mr. Laundon will occupy the chair. On Wednesday, November 20th, there will be a Devotional Meeting in Church at 8-o.

A Church Parade of the National Reserve took place on September 29th, at 3-30. The number of those attending was as follows—Imperial Yeomanry 15, Territorials 3, Reserves 59, C.L.B. 71, Boy's Scouts 16. These together with the congregation filled the Church. The collection which amounted to £2 8s. od., was given to the Veterans' Association. The Officer commanding, Major F. R. Griggs, expressed his pleasure with the service, and desired the writer to express his gratitude to all such as the Choir and Church Officers and others who helped in any way in the conduct of the service.

The friends of the late Mr. Thomas Judd and the late Mr. Henry Judd, his brother, who passed away within a fortnight of one another, desire through the medium of the magazine, to express their gratitude for the kindness shown to them by many friends during their time of trouble.

On Sunday, December 1st, the first Sunday in Advent, there will be three Celebrations of Holy Communion, at 7-o and 8-o and 12-15.

The Mothers' Union will meet, by kind permission of Dr. & Mrs. Unitt in their Billiard Room,

on Monday, Nov. 25th, at 2-30. All mothers in the Parish, whether they are members of the Union or not, are invited to the Meeting.

The Members of the Temperance Society are invited to a Devotional Service in Church, on Saturday, November 16th, at 7-o.

An appeal was made on Sundays, October 20th and 21st, for the British Red Cross Society, to assist in sending out Nursing Expeditions to the centre of war. The sum of £4 13s. od. was contributed. During the war the Collect for the 5th Sunday after Trinity will be used at all Services.

We are very pleased to be able to announce that Mr. Seal will resume his work as Head of the Senior Young Men's Bible Class, on Sunday, Nov. 10th, at 2-30. We hope there will be a good rally of Members.

The Clothing Club will re-open on Monday, November 4th.

PARISH NOTES.

There will be Special Advent Services on the three Thursdays in Advent, the 5th, 12th, and 19th of December. Addresses will be given by the Rev. L. H. Lethbridge, Assistant Curate of S. Peter's, Leicester. The Collections will be given to the Universities' Mission to Central Africa.

On Christmas Day the Celebrations of Holy Communion will be at 6-o, 7-o, and 8-o (choral), and after Morning Prayer. There will be Evensong and the Catechism of Children at 5-30. The Alms throughout the day will be given according to custom to the Church of England Waifs and Strays Society.

There will be a Short Service in preparation for Christmas Communion after Evensong on the Sunday before Christmas.

We do hope that those who go out Carol singing and playing on Christmas Eve will do their utmost to make sweet music, and that there will be no repetition of the unseemly noises that disturbed the peace of last Christmas Eve.

In the writer's opinion the music of Christmas Eve should be over at a much earlier hour. Our first duty on Christmas morning is to be at the altar for the helpful solemn communion with Him "Who was made Flesh and dwelt among us." What help is the racketts of a night out? Surely no help but a hindrance.

There will be a Christmas Party for Sunday School Children, for the 4th Christmas in succession, on Tuesday December 31st. There will be tea, and a Christmas Tree with a good present for each, and games. The children's tickets, 3d. each, barely cover the cost of their tea, and the presents on the Tree as well as the other expenses cost a lot. We have a few regular annual subscribers, but we should like a few more. It is really a downright holiday for the children, and one of the jolliest gatherings that we have throughout the year. We are obliged to limit the number of children to those who have not yet left the Day Schools.

On October 29th an appeal was made by the Rev. R. J. Keble for that most important branch of the Home Mission work of the Church, the Waifs and Strays Society. The Hall was crowded with children at 6-o, and there was a very fair attendance of adults at 8-o. On both occasions some very telling Lantern Slides were shewn; Mr. H. Wiseshall managed Mr. S. Wright's lantern, and to both gentlemen we are indebted. The children brought their coppers to the amount of 10/-, and the collection at 8-o realised 24/- The Society is able to realise as a result of its 30 years work that of the 17,000 children rescued 85 % are doing well, 10 % are doubtful, and only 5 % are failures. This work of the Church is carried out by her Master's command "Suffer little children to come unto Me." Our Local Secretary is Miss Amy Thornton. Contributions will always be most gratefully received by her.

"How every one may become a Church worker" was the subject for discussion, introduced by Mr. W. Thornton, at the monthly meeting of the C.E.M.S. on November 4th. Few people are so well able to indulge in interesting reminiscences of Church life in the Parish as Mr. Thornton. Various ways and means of doing active service for the Church were dealt with during the evening. On Wednesday, November 20th, 13 men came to Church for a devotional meeting. To join in Prayer and Bible reading is the object of these meetings. We hope that the numbers attending them will increase, and that we may see our way another year to holding them once a month instead of once a quarter.

On Monday, December the 2nd, the subject will be "The report of the Archbishops' Committee on Church Finance," introduced by Mr. Laundon. It is a subject very much to the front at present, and is likely to prove far more important, interesting, and controversial, than might at first sight appear.

At a Church Committee Meeting held on Tuesday, November 19th, Mr. Ernest Bancroft was elected a Sidesman in the place of Mr. G. Frisby.

Thirteen members of the local branch of the C.E.T.S. attended a devotional meeting in Church on Saturday, November 16th, at 7-o.

Captain Jenkinson, of the S. Peter's Company, Leicester, inspected our C.L.B. on Friday, November 8th. He expressed his pleasure at finding that the Company had made such good progress since his last visit, and commended the lads very highly for their proficiency. The first part of drill night is now taken up with Indian Club and Dumb-bell Exercises. We are very much obliged to Mr. H. Wesley for his help in this. The lads are busy getting ready their sketch "A Day in Camp," under Mr. Murray Rumsey's supervision, and we hope soon to be able to announce an occasion on which it will be given.

It may interest some of our readers to hear that John A. G. Farnham, son of the late Mr. William B. Farnham and Mrs. Farnham, of The Heights, Witley, Surrey, is engaged to Miss Swinfen-Broun, only child of Colonel and Mrs. Swinfen-Broun, of Swinfen Hall, Lichfield. The marriage will take place at St. Peter's Church, Eaton Square, London, on Saturday, February 1st, at two o'clock.

Mr. Stephen Waite passed away after a very long and trying illness, patiently borne, on Saturday, November 9th. His widow wishes to express her thanks for the help and kindness of many friends during her time of trouble.

The Balance Sheet of the Parish Tea held on S. Bartholomew's Day, August 24th, presented by Mr. A. Burrows, is very satisfactory. One observation is worth making. Notice had been given that a higher price would be charged for tickets taken at the door than for those taken beforehand. Consequently tickets to the amount of £7 os. 6d. were sold beforehand, and 2/- only was taken at the door. This reflects great credit on those who sold tickets, as well as on the Committee who adopted the method. The balance was voted by the Committee to the Crockery Fund.
