PARISH NOTES.

A Parish Meeting was held in the National Schools on Thursday, June 12th, at 8.0, to consider a scheme for a Vestry and Parish Room. The plans submitted by Messrs. Stockdale Harrison & Sons had been unanimously approved by the Church Committee, and were recommended to this Parish Meeting for their adoption, and a lithographed sketch of the proposed building had been circulated amongst the Church people of the Parish, and posted on the notice boards. The Architect's rough estimate of the cost was reported to be £485. The room would be 32ft. long and 14ft. 6in. broad. It would serve the purposes of a Choir Vestry, and would accommodate 40 people with comfort. A letter was read from Mr. Warner apologising for his absence and expressing his approval of the proposal.

The Vicar explained the scheme, and some discussion followed. It was suggested that the room would more fittingly be called a "Vestry and Church Room" than a "Vestry and Parish Room." There was general agreement with this suggestion. The first resolution was: "That this Parish needs a Room for the purposes of a Choir Vestry and for Church Meetings, and that the plans laid before it are a satisfactory way of meeting that need." This was proposed by Mr. Hensman, and seconded by Mr. Toller, and carried unanimously.

Further discussion was produced by the question being asked whether such a room built upon consecrated ground could be used for some of the purposes which had been mentioned, which were not of a directly devotional character, such as Mothers' Meetings or Sewing Parties. The Vicar expressed his opinion that within certain obvious limits any meeting that furthered the work of the Church could be held in the proposed room. The Meeting, however, wanted to be certain on this point. The proposition therefore that followed was: "That this Parish Meeting adopts the scheme laid before it, and determines to go forward with it, if it be ascertained that such a room could be used for the purposes for which it is

needed." This was proposed by Mr. Farnham, and seconded by Mrs. Woodward, and carried unanimously. The Meeting then adjourned.

We shall probably be well advised now to apply for a faculty for the building,* to the Chancellor of the Diocese. The full proposal, together with all that it involves, would have to be stated on the Petition for the faculty. Presumably the faculty would be granted or amended by those in authority. In any case the conscience of the Parish will be satisfied.

A Faculty cannot be applied for without a resolution passed by a duly summoned Vestry Meeting. Such a meeting will therefore have to be held at as early a date as possible.

A meeting of the subscribers to the Day Schools Foundation Managers' Fund was held on Monday, June 9th, at 8.0. The subjoined Statement of Accounts was read and adopted. Two points in this account are worth a little consideration. (i) The subscriptions should pay the Tradesmen's Bills. At first sight it will appear that they just about do so. But the cost of new apparatus in 9 out of 11 water closets had to be partly met by special donations. We may at any time have to meet a special expenditure of this kind. We ought to be able to do so without making a special appeal. Therefore it is quite clear that our annual subscriptions ought to amount to £20. (ii) Our receipts from lettings and from the County Council Education Authority ought to meet the cost of gas and payments made to the County Education Authority, and leave a little balance for Insurance payments. This they very nearly do, but not quite. Therefore we should be justified in making a slightly higher charge for lettings. The meeting after discussing these points in the accounts proceeded to the election of the Foundation Managers. Messrs. J. A. Le M. Hayward, E. H. Warner, and G. White were re-elected. These gentlemen stand for three years, and together with the Vicar, who is an Ex-officio Manager, the Rev. G. E. Payne, appointed by the County Council, and Mr. W. Turner by the Urban District Council, form the body of Managers. Mr. James Cuffling continues to act as correspondent.

About three dozen people, mostly members of the G.F.S., and C.E.M.S., attended the Anti-Welsh Bill Demonstration, held in Leicester, on Monday, 23rd June. Banners of the two Societies mentioned being carried in the procession, which left S. Margaret's Church, after a short service, at about 7.55. It was difficult to hear the speeches, but all present joined in the prayers and hymns, the latter being sung in procession through the town.

The Rev. F. C. Stocks, Diocesan Inspector of Religious Instruction, visited the Schools on May 28th, 1913. The following are his general reports:—

Mixed Department.

As far as one can judge from a very brief examination there is plenty to praise in the work of this Department. The children in the lowest Group seemed to be shy at starting, and the next Group could not be expected to do itself justice after the recent change of Teacher. Apart from these divisions, all the work which I touched upon had evidently been done very well and very thoroughly.

Infant Department.

General Department.—This Department did thoroughly well in every way. The teaching has clearly been extremely good in all the Groups, and the tone is as good as that of any school that I have seen. Real reverence is taught here as well as religious knowledge, and I congratulate the teachers on their excellent work.

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On behalf of the White Cross League, and under the auspices of the C.E.M.S., Lieut.-Colonel Bourne addressed a boys' and a men's meeting on Wednesday, May the 28th. It was perhaps a lot to expect of boys to meet on a fine summer evening at 7.0, for there were only 11 present. At the men's meeting, however, there were 28 present; and although this number was not worthy of the occasion, it was a thoroughly helpful and enthusiastic meeting, and a great deal of useful literature was sold at the close.

A Public Missionary Meeting, arranged by the Guild of St. Augustine, for Foreign Missions, was held in the Vicarage Garden on Monday, May the 26th. The Rev. H. A. Dempster spoke on some aspects of Missionary work in Australia, China, and India. It is still very difficult to find many who will take the opportunity of hearing how the Love of Christ is being made known to the Heathen. It is a strange apathy. There were 24 present.

Mr. Seal read a paper to a meeting of the C.E.M.S., on the Vicarage Lawn, on Monday, June the 2nd. It was a chilly evening, and the midges were very troublesome. Otherwise there would have been a longer discussion on a paper that had been well studied, and contained many points on which it would have been profitable to hear the views of those present.

We hope a good number of men, and of their wives or lady friends, will join the outing to Thurcaston, on Saturday, July the 5th.

Mrs. Woodward has kindly consented to succeed Mrs. Hayward as President of the Mothers' Union. She will be glad to meet all the Members, as well as any other Mothers, in her Garden on Monday, July 7th, at 2.30. We hope there will be a good turn up, to talk over plans for the future.

The G.F.S., both Members and Candidates, is now in good working order. 20 Members and 3 Associates were present at the Festival on June the 7th. There was a short service in Woodhouse Eaves Church at 3.0, and then the party drove on to Charley Hall, where they were entertained to tea by Mrs. Martin. 15 Members were present at the Corporate Communion on the following morning. Miss Marguerite Chilton is kindly taking the Members during Mrs. Rumsey's absence.

It is hoped that St. Bartholomew's tide, our Patronal Festival, will be observed as it was last year. Parish tea on Saturday, August 23rd, followed by Choral Evensong, and Corporate Communion on the Sunday morning, August 24th, St. Bartholomew's Day, at 7.0 and 8.0.

The Communicants' Guild Meeting will be held as usual on July 3rd, at 7.30. The Rev. W. A. King, the Vicar of Woodhouse, will take the Service.

Mrs. Cuffling was laid to rest on Friday, May the 30th, at 3.30, at the age of 82. She was only known to the writer in her last few failing years as an old lady of sweet and gentle disposition, but to many she was known as an earnest worker in the Church.

Mr. Hayward desires to express his grateful thanks for the deep sympathy he has received upon the death of his dear wife, and to say that he has been quite unable to reply to all the kind letters of condolence that he has had from upwards of two hundred of his friends, but hopes in time to be able to thank them personally.

The Patronal Festival passed off very happily, although there were not so many people present either at the Tea, or the Evensong, or the Corporate Communion as last year. At the 7.30 Evensong on Saturday evening, the 23rd, there was a congregation of 90, and the Rev. J. E. Potts preached on the duty of Self Sacrifice, using our Lord's words:—"I am among you as He that serveth" as his text. On Sunday morning, the 24th, S. Bartholomew's Day, there were 75 Communicants—42 at 7 o'clock, and 33 at 8 o'clock. The Vicar spoke in the morning of the maintenance of the Fabric of the Church, and of the devotion with which we use it, and of the extent to which it is used, as being matters of the deepest concern and subjects of most earnest prayer, at a Patronal Festival.

In the evening he spoke of the far-reaching influence for good of even a few keen and hopeful workers, and of the powerful example of those whose attendance at Church is regular and to be relied upon.

The Parish Tea was held in the Village Hall. There were 183 present. The weather was unsettled at the time when we had to decide where to have the tea. Had we known what a brilliant day it was going to turn out we should have decided otherwise, but we came along to the Vicarage Garden after tea and spent a very pleasant time with games and music.

Miss Emily Thornton with a band of helpers provided the tea, and Mr. Murray Rumsey worked hard as Secretary.

On Wake Sunday, September the 7th, there will be an Open Air Service at 5.45. We hope that a full congregation will assemble in Church at 5.30, and go in procession from the Church to the neighbourhood of the fair. The Open Air Service will last about half-an-hour, and we shall then return to the Church, taking as many people as we can with us, for a short service, taking the place of the usual Sunday Evening Service, also lasting about half-an-hour.

The Harvest Festival will be held on Thursday, September the 25th. The Church should be decorated on Wednesday, the 24th, because the Festival begins

with a Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.0 on Thursday the 25th. We shall be glad to receive offerings of Flowers, and Vegetables and Fruit on Wednesday morning. Evensong on the 25th will be at 7.30. and Mr. Kelcey will be the preacher. The collections, according to custom, will be given on Thursday to the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Association, and on the Sunday following to the Hospitals.

One of the four Ember Seasons of the Church occurs during September. The times of the seasons are set forth at the beginning of the Prayer Book, under the heading "Days of Fasting or Abstinence." We ought to pray at these times for those who already have been, and those who are about to be, ordained to one or other of the Ministry. Special prayers will be offered at the Evening Service on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, the 17th, 19th, and 20th, and at Morning Prayer on Friday, the 19th.

The G.F.S. is now in good working order. The candidates will resume their meetings now that August is over. "Wake Monday" will interfere with the next meeting of members. The meeting will therefore be postponed to the following Monday, September 15th. It is hoped that there will be a full meeting on this day as there are two members to be elected on the Committee. Miss M. Chilton has been giving great help in teaching the members some "First Aid" principles.

The C.E.M.S. General Annual Meeting will be held in the Schools on Monday, September 22nd, at 7.30. As on former occasions, when business has been disposed of, there will be music and refreshments.

There will be a Mothers' Union 4d. tea on Wednesday, September 3rd, at 3.30, on Mr. Woodward's lawn. We hope that this will be an opportunity of drawing the mothers together. Mothers who are not members will of course be welcome.

The eight C.L.B. lads who went to camp at Prestatyn had a splendid time, and once again Colour-Sergeant H. Beardmore distinguished himself. He was chosen as one of the escort of the Colours, and

as Sergeant of the Guard on Sunday evening he was very highly complimented by the Brigadier. He also won 2nd prize in the half-mile race.

A member of the Guild of St. Augustine for Foreign Missions is going to make up a bundle to send as a Christmas present to S. Faith's Mission, Rusape (Mashonaland).
