PARISH NOTES.

AUGUST, 1914.

The event of the month is the Patronal Festival. S. Bartholomew's Day, August 24th, falls on a Monday. The most suitable time, therefore, for carrying out our usual programme will be the Saturday and Sunday that fall within the Octave, the 29th and 30th.

Saturday, Aug. the 29th—

4.30, Parish Tea in the Vicarage Garden, followed by Music, and Games (in the Village Hall if wet).
7.30, Choral Evensong.

Sunday, Aug. the 30th—

Corporate Communion. Celebrations at 7.0 and 8.0 (Choral).

These arrangements are intended to emphasise the social and religious sides of the Festival. We

should like to see a large gathering at the Parish Tea, for such occasions tend to unity and good fellowship. We should like to see an equally large gathering at the Altar, for at the Holy Communion grace is given us "to continue in that Holy Fellowship and do all such good works as God has prepared for us to walk in."

A Meeting of the members of the Church Committee and the C.E.M.S. and their wives will be held in the Schools on Monday, August 10th to make the necessary arrangements.

In order to facilitate the preparations for the Tea, tickets will be on sale a fortnight before-hand and the number of those sold should be to hand no later than Tuesday, August 25th. The cost of ticket will be 6d. But for those sold on the day of the Tea an additional charge of 2d will be made.

The Sunday School Treat took place on Saturday, July 25th, in the Grammar School field. There were the usual sports, cricket matches, and games to the accompaniment of the Barrow Silver Prize Band. The Tea took place in the Vicarage Garden. This was a new departure, and was carried out successfully, though not without considerable anxiety. The morning broke stormy and cold, and a high wind, with occasional showers, continued throughout the day. Many of the children arrived in winter coats, but these were soon thrown off when games got into full swing. The tea, for 300, was set out under threatening clouds, but they cleared off as we sat down, and the sun shone for the greater part of the time. We were very thankful, indeed, that neither children nor victuals got a wetting. Mr Adams superintended all the sports and games, and Miss Harris, with plenty of teachers, provided the tea.

We have been asked by Mrs. Grant and Mrs. Noon to thank the many friends who have shewn them sympathy in their recent troubles. Grace Grant, after a long and wasting illness in the Leicester Infirmary, died shortly after her return home, and Lily Noon, the youngest of seven sisters and a member of the G.F.S. and Young Women's

Bible Class, after a partial recovery from a previous illness, followed by a relapse and meningitis, died on July 13th. To their families, and to many others who have lately suffered bereavement, we offer our sympathy.

The Woodhouse Eaves Branch of the Girls' Friendly Society, which comprises the parishes of Woodhouse Eaves, Woodhouse, Quorn, and Christ Church, Mountsorrel, held their Annual Festival in Quorn, on Saturday, July 18th. There was shortened Evensong in the Church at 3 o'clock. Tea was held in the Vicarage Garden at 4 o'clock, and an address given by Mrs. Rudd. After tea the Grounds of Quorn House were opened to the Girls by Mr. Farnham, and a pleasant evening was spent, while music was played by the Woodhouse Eaves Band.

PARISH NOTES.

SEPTEMBER, 1914.

The outbreak of War at the beginning of the month has occupied all our thoughts, and given a special character to all our Services.

On Sunday, August the 2nd, prayer was offered for the success of British efforts to preserve peace, and the Holy Communion was celebrated on the following morning with the same intention.

Subsequent disclosures have shewn how persevering were those efforts, but they were frustrated by Germany's violation of Belgian neutrality, and on the morning of August the 5th, Great Britain was declared to be at war with Germany.

Notice was given of a Special Service of Intercession on Thursday, August the 6th, at 7.30, which was well attended. Full use has been made of the form of Prayer authorised by the Archbishops. A few strokes of the bell daily at 1.45 are calling people to prayer, and a few in the Church, and doubtless many others in their homes, are obeying the summons. A Celebration of Holy Communion on Wednesdays, at 7.0, gives the opportunity for pleading the sacrifice with special intention. On Friday, August the 21st, a United Intercessory Service was held in the Village Hall, and all the religious bodies in the village were well represented. The Service was conducted by the Rev. G. E. Payne and the Vicar.

Working parties, for the equipment of a Hospital for the wounded, are being held every Wednesday at 2.30.

Our village is one of eleven which in connection with the Leicestershire Voluntary Aid Society, is providing all the necessaries for one hospital of 25 beds in the District.

A collection of £18 was made in Church on Sunday, August 23rd, for the Prince of Wales' National Relief Fund.

Our country is now involved in all the horrors of war. Not a village but plays its part in a great world-movement, and yields its contribution of men. A Reservist here, and a Reservist there, says good-bye to his wife, and goes off alone to his Regiment. Not a single village cross but feels some tremor of the vast upheaval, as it assembles and speeds on its way just a sample of the nation's manhood. Not a place without at least a few homes where all the thoughts are fixed upon a sailor or a soldier, nothing perhaps but a lad, on unknown waters, in unknown fields. Not a Church but rings out its appeal to prayer, more alluringly, more winningly, than in days of peace and safety. Not a community, however small, but lends a hand and gives its share against the day when the tale of casualties begins to be told.

God be with us and our allies. God be with our King and his counsellors. God be with our sailors

and our soldiers. God be with the wounded, the anxious, the bereaved. God have mercy on the fallen. God give us success and victory. God give us peace, with honour and justice. God in His wisdom overrule the present distress, that we may be brought through strife to a lasting peace; that the nations of this world may be united in a firmer fellowship for the promotion of His glory, and the good of all mankind.

The arrangements for our Patronal Festival are inevitably curtailed. But Sunday, August the 30th, is the Sunday within the Octave of S. Bartholomew, and we must not forget on that day to thank God for our Village Church, and to pray for His blessing on the work of the Church in our parish. There will be Celebrations of Holy Communion at 7.0 and 8.0; the services throughout the day will be of a festal character.

The Harvest Festival will be kept on Thursday, September the 24th, and the following Sunday. The usual Collection will be made for the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution on the Thursday, and the Hospitals on the Sunday.

A Girls' Friendly Society Admission Service was held on Monday evening, August the 24th, at 8.0. Six new members were admitted.

On Wake Sunday, September the 6th, there will be an Open-Air Service, near the Fair, at 6.0. Will Church People please assemble in Church at 5.45.

We had intended to publish a general appeal for the New Vestry in this Magazine. But it is thought advisable to hold it over.
