A few explanatory notes may be added to the above list of services.

At the Holy Communion on the week days of Holy Week, the full story of the Passion is read from the different evangelists in the appointed Gospels. We hope that any who would like to be present without wishing to communicate will do so.

To the preparation for Communion on Maundy Thursday evening, the members of the Communicants' Guild and all other Communicants are invited.

The Service at 5.30 on Good Friday, is chiefly though not exclusively, for those who are at work during the day. It will be over punctually at 5.55.

The Hymns sung at the The Three Hours Service on Good Friday, are 114—122. There will be a congregational practice of these hymns after Evensong on Palm Sunday. Those who come for a part of the "Three Hours" are asked to enter and leave during the singing of a hymn.

To the Lantern Service on Good Friday evening at 8.0, will everybody try to bring somebody else?

Throughout Good Friday there will be a box in Church for contributions to St. Mary's Refuge.

All communicant members of the Church, unless they are hindered by any grave cause, should receive the sacrament on Easter Day.

The Lent Saving's purses should be returned at one of the services on Easter Day, and will be offered at the altar.

The Easter Vestry Meeting will be held on Friday, April the 9th, in the National Schools, at 7.30. All, both ladies and gentlemen, who wish to see the affairs of the Church conducted in a business like and satisfactory manner should be present.

We are sorry to have to say good-bye to Mr. and Mrs. Atter. It is true they are going no farther than Woodhouse Eaves, but we shall no longer be able to reckon them as fellow workers and fellow worshippers with us. Mr. Atter served as a Sidesman for many years, has been one of the most consistent of our C.E.M.S. members, and has been a very welcome visitor in many homes in the parish.

The next meeting of the C.E.M.S. will be on April 12th (not the 5th) Mr. Adams will bring forward his subject of Bible Difficulties. Undoubtedly there are many such. So we hope that more men will be present than has been the case at recent meetings. Certainly we gave our old friend Mr. Wakeling a very poor welcome when he came to speak on "The Growth of Mohammedanism."

The C.L.B. is gradually being placed upon a very satisfactory footing. Captain Lidster is a hungry enthusiast for rule, and no detail of organisation escapes his notice. We congratulate him on his appointment as Assistant Adjutant for the Loughborough District. We are sorry that the Warner Cup Competition has fallen through this year. Our Company was the only competitor. Surely therefore we ought to have had the Cup! Some new buglers are being trained. We beg to remind them, and to assure the public, that they are forbidden to practice on their bugles in any place where they might be a nuisance.

Are there just a few members of the Free-will Offering Scheme who need another nudge before Easter?

The name of Corporal Ernest William Ward, of the Leicestershire Regiment, has to be added to the roll of honour. Having been wounded early in the month of October, he died at a place not stated on October the 27th. His death was reported by the American Embassy.

Two names of men who are serving have hitherto been inadvertently omitted, Cecil Kendall, and Walter William Teagle, both of the Territorials.

With the departure of the Territorials for the front, our thoughts are carried away to the fighting line even more frequently than before. But their letters are cheery and bright, and we have no doubt that they will serve their country well.

A Meeting with the purpose of inaugurating a Volunteer Training Corps in Quorn, is being held this week. In a place where many men are not qualified to serve owing to the Government orders which they are executing, this movement should meet with a good response.

This reminds us of the important part which is being played at the present time by our village in the supply of khaki accoutrements. The factory is busy day and night, and every hour of over-time is of service to the country.

When Lent is over we shall resume the practice of reading out the names of our sailors and soldiers at the Wednesday evening Intercession Service at 7.30. We continue to plead the Holy Sacrifice on Wednesday mornings at 7.0, on behalf of all the needs arising out of the War.

Another Easter has come and gone, giving us its message of encouragement and hope, so particularly appropriate to this year of anxiety. On the morning of Easter day there were 283 communicants. Last year there were 305. Many of our men we are glad to know were able to receive the Sacrament at the Front; and some of them heard the Bishop of London's message, and were cheered by his memorable visit to the army.

The Annual Vestry Meeting was held on Friday April the 9th. The Churchwardens were able to give a satisfactory account of the year's finance. We need only refer our readers to their Statement, which is printed in this Magazine, and remind ourselves that the Free-will Offering Scheme, which has enabled us to receive for Current Church Expenditure £2 12s. 7d more than has ever been received in the past, must be kept going by all the present members fulfilling their obligations with regard to it, and by constant effort to bring in new members. When such a scheme is in thorough working order no undue burdens need fall on any individuals, and there need be no anxiety as to our financial position.

Mr. J. A. Le. M. Hayward was unanimously re-elected Peoples' Warden, and Mr. W. Moore again accepted the Vicar's nomination as his Warden. We wish these two gentlemen every success in the management of our finances, and we must give our constant support both to them and to Mr. J. Nevitt, the Secretary of the Free-will Offering Scheme, so that at a time when great demands are made upon the purse for national purposes, we may meet our liabilities without difficulty.

The Vicar presented the Sick and Poor Accounts. He said that the average amount contributed at the Early Celebrations of Holy Communion fell short of the last few years, and that he had spent more than he had received. The deficit however which appears on the Statement printed in the Magazine is considerably less than that which was announced at the meeting, owing to some donations given with the object of reducing it.

We beg to welcome three new Sidesmen, Mr. C. H. Nurse, Mr. S. Platts, Mr. M. Rumsey; and two new members of the Church Committee. Mr. J. Cart, and Mr. S. Wisehall. Major W. S. N. Toller and Private E. Bancroft, who are at the front, were unanimously re-elected without ballot, amid the general good wishes of the meeting. But seeing that we can hardly hope to have them on duty with us for some time to come, the number of Sidesmen for the year was increased from 10 to 12.

Two very welcome offers were made at the Vestry Meeting. A Flag of St. George was offered by Mr. G. Farnham, and a Union Jack by Mr. A. B. Hanford. We tender our thanks to both these gentlemen, and we hope that before long we may have cause to hoist the flags.

The Vicar thanked the meeting for his Easter Offering, which amounted to £19 12s. od.

During the current month of May there is a sequence of Church Seasons, each with its particular purpose, and each requiring of faithful churchpeople, faithful observance. The dates and services are set out in the notes of the month. Rogation-tide is a time of prayer for great national needs. The season is followed immediately by Ascension Day, when we commemorate the fact of our Lord's return to Heaven, and what that fact signifies, namely the exaltation to God's right hand of our perfected humanity.

Following the chronological order of events Whit-Sunday comes 10 days after Ascension Day, and then we remember that Jesus sent, and still sends, the Holy Spirit to illuminate, guide, and sanctify His whole Church and every individual member of it. After Whit-Sunday, in anticipation of the Trinity ordination, we have the Ember days with the special pleading for those who are and shall be Bishops, Priests, or Deacons, in the Church. On Trinity Sunday we gather together all that we know of God—The Father who made us, The Son who redeemed us, The Holy Ghost who sanctifies us, and bending before the great mystery of the Holy Trinity we sing the Ter-sanctus, "Holy, Holy, Holy, is the Lord of Hosts."

A careful note should be made of the fact that the collection on May the 9th will be for the Diocesan Board of Finance. That is to say, what is given on that Sunday is towards our Parochial Quota. It is well known that the way in which the Quota may be raised is left to the discretion of each parish, but the Bishop recommends that in any case one Sunday's collection be devoted to it. In this connection we may mention that the Diocesan Board of Finance has issued an abridged report for the year 1914. A copy of this will be sent to the members of the Church Committee, and a copy may be had for the asking from the Vicar or Churchwardens.

To those who have recently been confirmed, the Vicar wishes to express the hope that they will join the Communicants' Guild. The next meeting is in Church, on Thursday, May 6th, at 7.30.

We would remind the members of the C.E.M.S. that the whole Society is asked to observe as a special time of prayer the week beginning May the 9th, and that Ascension Day or the Sunday after is the recognised season for the C.E.M.S. Corporate Communion. On April the 12th, Mr. Adams read an interesting and exhaustive paper on 'Bible Difficulties' which led to a fair discussion. On Monday, May the 3rd, Mr. Burrows will speak on "Christian Socialism."

The Annual Field Day and Sports for the Leicester Battalion of the C.L.B., will be held at Syston, on Whit-Monday. The reason for the change of place is that there are no excursions to Quorn or Beaumanor this year. The Battalion will make a grant of 6d. a head to lads going from Quorn. Entries for sports will be taken shortly. Friends will be admitted on payment of a small charge at the gate.

The Commandant is Mr. Chilton, the Secretary Mr. M. Rumsey, the Treasurer Mr. B. Clarke, and there is a good supply of Instructors.

We have started now at our Wednesday Services at 7 o a.m. and 7.30 p.m., to have collections for the Lord Roberts' Memorial Fund being raised by the Incorporated Soldiers and Sailors Help Society, for the Extension of Workshops, in which men who have been partially disabled on Active Service, may learn various trades.

The Vicar will be glad to receive any contribution to add to these collections.

# Quorn Churchwardens' Accounts

FOR THE YEAR ENDING AT EASTER, 1915.

THE Churchwardens in presenting the subjoined Accounts are glad to announce that they consider that, so long as the Free Will Offering Scheme is fully maintained at its present level, the finances of the Church have at last been placed upon a satisfactory basis.

At the Easter Vestry seventeen years ago, Mr. Hayward advocated the adoption of a voluntary system of regular payment by Churchpeople to the maintenance of their Church, and the matter has been brought up and discussed on many subsequent occasions, but it was not until the adoption of the Free Will Offering Scheme proposed by the Vicar last year that any decision was come to. Last Easter the acceptance of the principle of a Parochial Quota towards Diocesan Finance and the proved failure of the old system of obtaining the money necessary for the upkeep of the Church solely by means of collections in Church brought matters to a head, and thanks to the perseverance and energy of Mr. Wakeling, the Free Will Offering Scheme was started under favourable auspices and has been almost carried on by his successor, Mr. J. Nevitt. The Churchwardens warmly acknowledge their indebtedness to the Vicar and the above gentlemen and point out to Parishioners that so long as the present system is maintained they think that enough money will in future be obtained for all requirements, but that a slackening of effort or diminution of contributions will result in the old state of being constantly in debt. They, therefore, appeal to Churchpeople to keep up their contributions so far as they are able during this trying time of War, and assure them that they on their part will keep down expenditure to the lowest possible level, consistently with keeping things going and preventing deterioration.

The adoption of the Free Will Offering Scheme has rendered the tabulated analysis of the Church Accounts impossible in the form presented for the last four years, but the Churchwardens point out that the total amount of money received for Church Expenses and Choir and Organ Fund, together with the Free Will Offerings, comes to £188 16s. 7d., which is £31 14s. 2d. more than last year and £25 12s. 7d. more than has ever been received in the past. The Expenditure under the above heading has been £160 1s. 2d., leaving a balance of £28 15s. 5d., which has gone towards the payment of the Parochial Quota of £18 and the reduction of the debt of £11 1s. 2d. at the Bank, leaving a small debt to the Bank of 6/11.

It will be seen that owing to the necessity of paying off the debt to the Bank on the Churchwardens' Accounts it has not been possible this year to allocate any money from the Free Will Offerings to the Fabric Fund, and consequently this Fund has suffered temporarily from the adoption of the Free Will Offering Scheme, for people have not subscribed so liberally to it, thinking that part of their Free Will Offerings would go to the Fabric Fund, which would have been the case if there had been any balance available after paying off the debt on the Churchwardens' Account. This is unfortunate, for it is very desirable that a large sum should be accumulated in the Fabric Fund to meet extraordinary expenditure on the structure, furniture, or decoration of the Church.

The amount received by collections in Church for Special Objects is £100 1s. 6d. and by box in Church and other means £24 6s. 5d., making a total of £124 7s. 11d. which is very satisfactory, especially considering that the War has made it more difficult for people to give to charitable objects.

The **Easter Vestry** will be held at the **National Schools** on the **Friday** in Easter Week, April 9th, 1915, at **7.30 p.m.**, when it is hoped that there will be a good attendance of ladies and gentlemen, as business of great importance to Churchpeople will be discussed and transacted.

Collected and paid away to Special Objects on Thirteen and Half Sundays, and Twelve Weekdays, and by Six Collections by Boxes placed in Church.

## Epitome of the Work of the Church Committee.

There have been six meetings of the Church Committee, with an average attendace of seven members. Messrs. E. Bancroft, A. B. Hanford and W. S. N. Toller are serving their country with the Colours and Mr. L. Wakeling left the village in October. Two former members of the Committee, Messrs. J. Atter and J. H. Johnston have also left the village. Mr. William Thornton, who has been Churchwarden for the past 23 years, was obliged on account of deafness and failing health to decline the Vicar's invitation to again act as his Warden, and Mr. William Moore was appointed in his place. Mr. J. Nevitt was elected Secretary to the Free Will Offering Scheme, and Mr. W. H. Atter elected Auditor in Mr. Wakelings place.

The North Wall of the Churchyard has been well repaired by Mr. Thomas Herbert at a cost of £10 10s.

The Asphalte paths leading to the South Porch and to the Tower Door have been relaid by Mr. W. Nunn, of Leicester, at a cost of £5 1s. 3d.

The Urban District Council have re-gravelled the two main paths through the Churchyard.

Mr. H. Wesley having sent in his resignation of the post of Caretaker of the Churchyard in March, Mr. Thomas Herbert has been appointed in his place for six months commencing April 5th.

The prosecution of the scheme for the New Vestry has been postponed until the close of the war. Subscriptions to the amount of £233 have already been promised.

A meeting of Churchpeople to consider the Free Will Offering Scheme was held on May 27th, 1914, and the Scheme was started on June 14th, under the Secretaryship of Mr. L. Wakeling, with 119 contributors, whose promises amounted to £127 1s. od. per annum, of which £101 os. 9d. has been received up to March 29th, 1915.

The question of having a survey of the Churchyard made and the graves plotted on a plan has been discussed and enquiries are being made as to the cost.

Attention has been called to the fact of stone throwing in the Churchyard and damage to the face of the Church Clock and it has been decided to try to catch and punish the offenders.

A Sub-Committee was appointed to confer with the Bell Ringers, and to suggest means whereby the ringing of the Church Bells might be improved.

War with Germany and Austria was declared on August 5th, 1914, and there are now 134 men from Quorn serving with the Colours, about 80 per cent of whom are Churchmen, and besides a great many are serving their country at the Factory on Government work.

Attention is called to the need of two new flags for the Church. The Churchwardens possess half a Union Jack and about three quarters of a St. George's Ensign, both beyond repair, and as these were the gifts of kind friends, it is hoped that some others may come forward to replace them, especially as new flags will be required for the rejoicings which will take place at the termination of the War.

## THE WAR.

The Village has been bearing its share of the national sorrow during the last month, and many who were well known to us have fallen in battle. Cecil Chapman was killed on April 21st. He had written from hospital in Rouen on April 16th, saying that he had been confirmed by the Bishop of London during his visit to the Army. William Clay who had previously lived in Quorn and is remembered by many, was killed by the shelling of his hut on April 24th.

On Sunday, May the 16th, news began to arrive of the splendid fight put up by the Leicestershire Yeomanry on Ascension Day, May the 13th, and of the sad losses sustained by them. Gradually it became established that four of our men had met their death, Harold Adams, Henry Hickling, Daniel Moore, and Frank White. Of two nothing is known save that they are missing, Jack Lucas and William Moore; and to the last number must be added the name of William John Steer who is connected by marriage with a Quorn family. Albert Edward Bunker and Thirlby Hack are wounded and making good progress. Need we say to the bereaved and anxious that we are grateful to them for having given their sons, that we are proud of their sons for having given their lives for their country's honour, and that all that prayer and sympathy and respect can do for them shall be done for them by those upon whom no such heavy cross has fallen.

A Memorial Service for those fallen in the war was held on Tuesday, May the 25th, at 10.0, and there was a celebration of Holy Communion on the same morning, at 7.30.

We should like to take this opportunity of stating that a Memorial Service, not necessarily of a public character, may always be held for those who from time to time may fall in the war, at such a time as may be convenient to the relations and friends.

Tom Gamble has been home with a bayonet injury to his arm, and he is now helping in recruiting work until he is fit to return. Ben Williams was wounded in the ankle, and news has just arrived that having returned to the fighting line he was wounded again in the arm, and is now in hospital at Woolwich. Sam Davis whom we mentioned as wounded in the back, has been in hospital at Norwich, and is doing well.

To the list of Quorn men serving must be added the names of Hubert Moore, R.F.A.; Albert Edward Holmes, British Columbian Horse; and Samuel Martin, "Princess Patricia's" Infantry; and Harry Daft, Transport Service.

Sergeant-Major Swain of the Imperial Yeomanry has been home on a short leave. We were glad to see him and to express our gratitude to him for the difficult part he has had to play during the past two weeks, and to congratulate him on being offered a commission in the Regular Army as a recognition of his gallant conduct.

At the Wednesday Services since Easter we have collected £2 for the Lord Roberts Memorial Fund

for disabled soldiers and sailors in connection with the Soldiers and Sailors Help Society. This sum has been forwarded. We propose now to ask for the collections at these Wednesday Services for the British Field Hospital for Serbia. The Vicar will be glad to receive and forward any donations for this cause to be added to the collections.

The collecting of eggs for the wounded men at the Leicester Base Hospital is a very praiseworthy movement. It provides eggs for tea on Tuesdays, and we suppose on other days if there are enough. Miss Firr is collecting 50 a week from Quorn. She wishes to thank the contributors.

Prayers in connection with the war are said daily at noon. If the Vicar is sometimes away those who come can offer private prayer. On Wednesday the Holy Communion is celebrated at 7.0 a.m. with special intention, and on Wednesday evenings at 7.30 there is an Intercession Service at which the names of those who are serving are read out, and mention is made of the casualties that interest us.
