PARISH NOTES.

JULY, 1915.

With reference to the Bell-ringers' Guild which as we mentioned last month is in process of formation, a development has occurred which calls for the following brief statement of facts. For some time past the Church Committee has had under its consideration the question of bell-ringing reform. On two occasions the Vicar has met the ringers and talked the matter over with them. Nothing very practical was the outcome of these meetings, so the Church Committee, as already stated, decided to form a guild of men to study the art of bell ringing, and to fill up vacancies as they occurred in the belfry. The Vicar told the ringers what was being done, and they expressed themselves as satisfied on the understanding that the new learners were not to take the place of the old ringers, but were only to step into vacancies. On Sunday, May 30th, however, they told Mr. Herbert that they should not ring again, and since

that date the beginners have taken their place. We regret that the ringers considered that the circumstances justified their resignation, but that need not hinder us from recording our gratitude to them for having rung the bells for so many years, and for having thus rendered valuable service to the Church.

The Vicar and Church Committee have asked the learners to occupy the belfry. When the rules for the bell-ringers guild have been finally made, and those who can accept them have been admitted at a service in Church, the guild will be in existence. At present we can only speak of it as being in process of formation.

The Diocesan Inspector, The Rev. F. C. Stocks, paid his annual visit to the National Schools on May the 11th, for the inspection in religious knowledge. He was assisted by the Rev. A. M. Cott, the Vicar of Ashby Magna. He reported that the Mixed Department was G. to V.G. throughout; and the Infant Department V.G. throughout. And he added the following remarks:

MIXED DEPARTMENT. Most of the answering in this department was very good. The top group did not remember the lessons quite as well as the others, but they have so much more to remember, a very wide syllabus having been taken. I doubt whether the latter part of the Acts of the Apostles is suitable for children of this age, only one or two portions are prescribed in the Diocesan Syllabus.

INFANT DEPARTMENT. The infants did very well in all the groups. The tone is as high as ever, and great care is taken to present the lessons in a form appropriate to young children. The Repetition which we heard was said well and very distinctly.

The Sunday School Treat will be held in Quorn on Saturday, July 17th.

Mr. Robert Bancroft thanks the many kind friends who shewed him sympathy in the serious illness from which we are glad to say he is now completely recovered.

PARISH NOTES.

AUGUST, 1915.

Tuesday, August the 24th, is S. Bartholomew's Day. We shall not attempt to carry out the full programme of our Patronal Festival. But the following services should provide us with ample opportunities for giving thanks for our Church and the ministrations of the Church in the parish, and for re-dedicating ourselves and our work to Almighty God. Tuesday, Aug. 24th, Holy Communion at 8.0 a.m.; Choral Evensong, 8.0 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 29th, Parochial Corporate Communion, 7.0 and 8.0 a.m., and 12.15.

On the afternoon of Sunday, Aug. 29th, at 3.0, there will be a parade of the combined forces of the C.L.B. in the Loughborough District. The Regimental Colours will be brought under an escort from Leicester, and will be presented at the Altar. It is hoped that the Quorn Volunteer Training Corps will also be present.

On the day appointed for the Sunday School Treat, July 17th, the floods rose to such a height that one-half of the village was cut off from the other, and the treat had to be postponed. On Monday, July

19th, the children assembled in the Vicarage Garden, at 2.30. The weather was fine and warm, but after an hour it clouded over, and there were constant showers for the rest of the afternoon. There was tea in the Village Hall at 4.0, and afterwards those who were brave enough to face the elements adjourned to the Grammar School for the races. These were run off as quickly as possible, the prizes were distributed, and everything was over by 6.30. We are sorry for the disappointment felt by the children. Perhaps another year we shall do well to go back to the first week in September for the treat.

On Sunday Evening, Aug. 1st, after Evensong, the Bell Ringers' Guild will be inaugurated, and the first members will be admitted. The service will be a short one, and we shall be glad if members of the congregation will remain for it.

Great sympathy is felt for Mr. George Brewin in the loss of his wife, who passed away after a painful illness on Sunday afternoon, July 18th. Mrs. Brewin had been a faithful Church-worker for many years past, and her great skill in cutting out garments was always at the disposal of the different working parties which have been held. She will be much missed in her home and in the parish. May she rest in Peace. Mr. Brewin and his sons wish to thank the many kind friends whose sympathy has been so ready and so real.

The Vicar will be away from Aug. 2nd—Aug. 7th, and from Aug. 9th—Aug. 14th. There will be no Daily Services during that time, and no Communicants' Guild.

Those who can remember the time when the Rev. R. C. Faithfull was Vicar of this Parish will wish to express their sympathy with him and Mrs. Faithfull in the loss of their only surviving son, Second Lieutenant F. W. A. Faithfull, of the 3rd Seaforth Highlanders, who was killed in action, in Flanders, on July 4th.

The name of Samuel Martin has also to be added to the list of the "killed in action." J. W. Stevenson has been wounded. Sydney Lovett and Charles Hole have enlisted. And the D.C.M. has been awarded to Sergeant-Major J. P. Swain, for conspicuous bravery on May 15th.

A French Flag-Day was organised by Miss Firr and Mrs. J. Clarke on July 24th. The sum of £14 14s. 5d. was collected by the sale of flags. And to this has been added 11/6 from the staff and children of the National School, 15/7 from the collection in Church at 8.0 on July 25th, and £5 from the Employees War Fund at the Factory; and £7 collected by some girls of the Rawlins' Grammar School in the School and some neighbouring villages. £28 1s. 6d. in all.

Two Guineas have been sent from the Wednesday collections to the Serbian Red Cross. The collections are now being given to the fund for providing comforts for the Prisoners of War.

A large number of men were entertained by Mr. Hayward at a Smoking Concert, on Wednesday, July the 14th, with a view to enlisting recruits for the Volunteer Training Corps. A stirring speech was made by Major Stanhope Rolleston, and 17 recruits gave their names in.

The number of eggs being collected for the wounded soldiers is rapidly approaching 200 a week. The Misses Camm have joined the Misses Firr in this good work, and would be glad to hear of new egg-subscribers upon whom they may call.

PARISH NOTES.

SEPTEMBER, 1915.

To encourage the use of the Church for private prayer a table has been placed in the Church near the Font with some forms of prayer for various objects upon it. We hope that these may serve to guide the devotions of private worshippers.

The first service for the admission of members to the Bell Ringers' Guild was held on Sunday, August 1st, after Evensong. The following were admitted—Robert Bancroft, Alfred Burrows, Thomas Herbert, George Horspool, Albert Rennocks, Albert Thompson, and on August 22nd—Basil Langrish, Bertie Maiden, John Martin. Practices are being held twice a week and there is evidence of very distinct progress. At the early celebration of Holy Communion the bells will always cease to ring two minutes before the hour.

We regret to announce that two more of our men have been killed in action. Private Alfred Blackshaw in Gallipoli and Private George Edward Brown in France. For each of these a memorial service has been held. Lieutenant Harold Wright has been seriously wounded and lies in hospital Alexandria, and Private Horace Gamble has received a wound in the forehead which we are glad to hear is only slight. We have been glad to see Private Ben Williams and Corporal Thirlby Hack home on a short time and making good recovery from their wounds.

The name of Robert Sharpe should be added to the list of those who have joined the Navy.

On Wake Sunday an Open-air Service will be held at the usual place at 6 o. The Barrow Band will accompany the hymns. Members of the congregation are asked to assemble in Church at 5 o. and to accompany the Choir to the place of service. The chief feature of the service will be the offering of prayers for the present needs of the Allied Nations.

A very inspiring Church Parade was held on Sunday, August 29th, at 3 o. The C.L.B. Company of the Loughborough District and the Volunteer Training Corps of Quorn and Barrow assembled at the corner of Barrow Road at 2.30. Preceded by Battalion Colours of the C.L.B. under an escort from Leicester and by a strong bugle band, the Companies, about 180 strong, marched to the Church by way of the High Street and the Cross. In Church there was a large congregation. The colours were presented at the altar,—hymns 540, 274 and 165 and God Save the King were sung, the creed was said, prayers were offered and the Vicar gave a short address. Captain and Assistant Adjutant P. Liaster is to be congratulated on the care with which he organised the parade. The aim of such a service, which was indicated by the presentation of the colours, is the dedication to Almighty God of national service which the men and lads present are prepared to undertake. A collection of £2 16s. was made for the C.L.B. Khaki Equipment Fund.

The Choir Boys had a very successful and enjoyable outing to Belvoir Castle, on Thursday, August the 19th. At 9.0 we left the Cross on a nice still autumnal morning and in a most comfortable wagonette provided by Mr. Wordsworth. We drove straight away through Six Hills, Eastwell, Eaton and Branstone, and after stopping a few minutes at the last place to arrange for tea on our return journey, to have a look at the lovely Church and to rest the horses, we drove on and arrived at Belvoir at 12.30. The Castle quite came up to our expectations, and after a cold spread at the Peacock, we were able to enjoy it to the utmost. Its unique position, its treasures of tapestry and painting, and its famous Duchess' garden have left memories with us, and there was more than one boy who craved to be the heir of Belvoir. On our way back we stopped for tea at the Branstone Inn, and wandered about the Rector's garden waiting for his leave till after we had taken it. Then we made straight for home and arrived at the Cross at 8.15. It was a great day and we were all agreed that we had suffered nothing for the absence of railway trips. The boys would like to thank all who subscribed to the outing.

The Harvest Festival will be held on Thursday, September 30th at 7.30 and on the following Sunday, October the 3rd. The Preacher on the Sunday evening will be the Rev. W. G. Brocklebank, the Rector of Long Whatton. The Preacher for the Thursday will be announced later. There will be Celebrations of Holy Communion on Thursday at 8.0, and on Sunday at 8.0 and 12.15. The collection on Thursday will be for the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Association, and on Sunday for the Hospitals.

We propose to ask members of the congregation at the Harvest Festival to make offerings of eggs. Let it be mainly an Egg Harvest, eggs for the soldiers. Receptacles for eggs will be placed in the Church on Thursday and will remain till Sunday, when they will be offered, and on Monday they will be sent to the right quarter. How many eggs can we manage? Say 500 at least!

We regret to hear that a member of an old Quorn family, in the person of Silas Cross, passed away at Santa Susana, California, on July 2nd, aged 50 years.

The first Winter Meeting of the G.F.S. will be held on Monday, Sept. 20th, at 7.45, in the Schools.
