PARISH NOTES.

JULY, 1916.

The Meeting announced in the last magazine for the purpose of arranging open-air services during the summer months was used, after the making of a further announcement, as an opportunity for conferring upon the subject of the National Mission of Repentance and Hope and the part which should be taken in it in this Parish. The meeting was held on June 19th, at 8.0. There were 57 present, 42 ladies and 15 men.

A copy of No. 5 of the National Mission Papers was handed to everyone in the room, and this being read through by the Vicar formed the basis of information and discussion. What we learnt was briefly this. That the Mission is a movement of the whole Church of England to which she has been called by the Archbishops and Bishops. That

the Mission is a call to repentance and a message of hope. That it is a united mission of witness, not only of a few Missioners but of all the Clergy and Communicants individually and corporately. That special services and meetings will take place throughout the country in the months of October and November. That the preparation begins now and when the preparation has begun the Mission has begun. That the Mission will not end in November but will be the beginning of newness of life and service.

The following were among the definite suggestions which were the outcome of the meeting:—

- (i) The setting aside of Wednesday with its Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.0 a.m. and its service of Intercession at 7.30 p.m. as a day of prayer in preparation for the Mission.
- (ii) The use of private prayer for God's blessing on the Mission.
- (iii) The formation of a Bible Study Circle.
- (iv) The issue of the Bulletin which is the Monthly Publication of the Mission. (Orders for 27 were taken.)
- (v) The holding of occasional open-air services after the Wednesday Evening Service.

At the end of the discussion the Vicar asked if he might take the unconstitutional course of selecting a committee from those present, and on the proposition of Mr. Hayward, seconded by Mr. Laundon, it was resolved "That the Vicar be asked to nominate an executive for the work of the Mission."

Subsequently to the meeting the Vicar invited eight men and nine ladies to form a committee, all of whom were present at the original meeting and were representative of the different parochial organisations. The first meeting of the Committee was held at the Vicarage on Saturday, June 24th, at 8.0 p.m. It was agreed that great emphasis should be given to the weekly day of prayer. It was resolved:—

- (i) That the meeting would welcome the formation of a Bible Study Circle, awaiting information and suggestion from headquarters.

(ii) That a weekly series of open-air services be held from July 12th to August 30th inclusive, on Wednesday evening after the Service of Intercession at about 8.15. (Please note—July 12th, New Quorn; July 19th, Meeting Street; July 26th, Freehold Street.) Different members of the Committee offered to visit each district with an announcement of the service, and others undertook to bring and distribute hymn books.

(iii) That Mrs. C. H. Nurse and Mr. C. M. Rumsey represent the Parish (in addition to the members of the R. D. Conference) on the Ruri-Decanal Committee for the National Mission.

A Memorial Service for Lord Kitchener and those who fell in the Naval battle on May 31st, was held on Tuesday, June 13th at 8.30 p.m. The form of service used was that compiled by the Bishop of Stepney and authorised for use in this Diocese. Hymns 437 and 140 were sung at the beginning and close of the service. The latter hymn was followed by the Dead March in Saul, the Last Post by two members of the C.L.B., and the National Anthem. The Quorn Companies of the C.L.B. and the V.T.C. were present in uniform. The Church was nearly full. A muffled peal was rung before the service, and the Union Jack flew half-mast.

There is a point of order in the conduct of public worship which calls for attention. At some of the early celebrations of Holy Communion on Easter Day and Whitsun Day last a large number of those present left the Church before the service was over. This is an innovation which we hope will not be repeated. The service is not over until the Celebrant has left the altar. There may be here and there a communicant who must get home quickly to release another member of the household to come to the next celebration. For such a one to leave the Church quietly immediately after the blessing is quite reasonable. The rest of the congregation should not follow suit, but should be occupied in their thanksgiving till the close of the Service.

At a Meeting of the Church Committee held on June 6th, Mr. Robin Hickling was elected a sidesman in the place of Mr. O. S. Brown.

The Meeting of the Communicants' Guild during this month will be on July 6th at 7.30.

On Wednesday, July 5th, the Rev. Herbert Barnes, the Principal of S. Augustine's, Penhalonga, Diocese of Southern Rhodesia, will give an address on Foreign Missions and the War, at 7.30 in the Church. Afterwards at 8.30 he will address a public meeting on the Vicarage Lawn, or if wet, at the Village Hall. The visit is being arranged by the local ward of the Guild of S. Augustine for Foreign Missions.

The Sacrament of Baptism will not be administered on Sunday, July 23rd.

The news of May Henson's death came as quite a shock to her many friends and fellow church-workers. Her health had been failing for some time past, but having come safely through an operation at Guy's Hospital, she was expected to be soon home again. She passed away however quite suddenly on Sunday, June the 18th, and was laid to rest on the following Thursday. Her cheerful and downright disposition made for her many friends, and she was a Sunday School Teacher with whom it was always easy to discuss the affairs of her class and the welfare of her children. May she rest in peace

PARISH NOTES.

AUGUST, 1916.

Since we last wrote a definite start has been made in preparation for the National Mission in the Parish.

The number of those attending the Wednesday Services of Prayer has considerably increased. But there are many more who should make an effort to be present.

The first two of the series of Open-air Services have been held and they have given us some cause for encouragement. In the coming month they will be held as follows:—August 2nd—Wood Lane; August 9th—Barrow Road; August 16th—Station Street; August 23rd—Church Lane; August 30th—Nursery Lane.

A Bible Study Circle is being held on Saturday evenings, at the Vicarage at 8.0. The general subject is "The two duties in the Catechism."

Some very useful and readable Mission Leaflets have been published. Samples will be found in the Church. They may be read in the Church, or orders for copies may be given to the Vicar.

The following two questions and answers will throw some light upon the methods of the Mission.

What are Bishops' Messengers?

Bishops' Messengers are clergy, laymen and women, who will be blessed and sent forth by the Bishop to "sound the call" in every parish during October and November.

What are Archbishops' Messengers?

Archbishops' Messengers are men who will be sent to selected centres to address large meetings of Church people and others on the purpose of the Mission, to voice the Church's appeal to the Nation.

August the 24th is S. Bartholomew's Day. We would suggest that there should be a *Parochial Corporate Communion* on the Sunday following, August 27th, when every Communicant in the Parish should be present at one or other of the two celebrations, at 7.0 and 8.0. On S. Bartholomew's Day the Holy Communion will be celebrated at 8.0 a.m., and there will be Choral Evensong at 8.0 p.m.

On Sunday afternoon August 27th, at 3.0, there will be a Church Parade of all the Companies of the Loughborough Battalion of the C.L.B., and we hope that the V.T.C. will also accept our invitation to be present.

Private Charlie Ottey, of the Sherwood Foresters was wounded in the right arm and left leg on July 1st. He is now in the War Hospital at Huddersfield. He writes that he is very happy in the hospital and that both his wounds are improving, though necessarily slowly.

Mrs. Taylor wishes to thank all who have sympathised with her in the loss of her husband.

May we please ask people not to throw dead flowers into the stoke-hole enclosure. There is a proper receptacle for them by the Nursery Lane entrance to the Churchyard.

There will be no Sunday School and no Children's Service on Sundays, August 6th and 13th.

PARISH NOTES.

On Friday, September 1st, the Rev. Sydney Marston, the Vicar of Dymock, Gloucestershire, will come with his family to the Vicarage, and stop there till Friday, September 29th. Mr. Marston will take the usual Sunday Services and any occasional duty that he may be required to take. Any who wish for the ministration of the Church during his stay in the Parish should apply to Mr. Herbert. The Vicar will be at Dymock with his family for the same period.

We are not yet able to state at what date or dates one of the Bishop's Messengers will visit this Parish in connection with the National Mission. The visit will probably be made in the latter half of October or in November. The services which we have been holding on Wednesdays, both in Church and in the open-air, as a part of the Mission, will cease during September, but we very much hope there will be many who will be praying in private for God's blessing on the Mission, and with this end in view we will leave on the table in Church some forms of Prayer, which may be taken by those who wish for one.

The Rev. Frank Theodore Woods, the Vicar of Bradford, has been nominated by the Crown and elected by the Dean and Chapter to be the Bishop of the Diocese. He will be consecrated Bishop in Westminster Abbey on S. Matthew's Day, September 21st. We should pray for him that he may be "Replenished with the truth of Thy doctrine and endued with innocency of life."

We are very fortunate indeed to have been able to find ladies in the Parish ready and willing to fill in turns the place of Mr. C. K. White at the organ. For sometime past Mrs. J. Clarke has only been able to play for evensong owing to the illness of her husband, and Mrs. Nurse has been taking her place in the mornings, and now during Mrs. Nurse's absence Miss Callis will play. It is no light matter for these ladies to undertake this work, for none of them profess to be experienced organists, but they all practise very diligently, so that we can safely leave the accompaniment of the services in their hands.

After reading the new Lighting Regulations it seems to us that we shall be able to continue to hold evensong on Sundays at 6.30 during September, but that some new arrangement will have to be made from Sunday, October 1st onwards. We will ask the Church Committee to meet and consider the matter.

The Harvest Festival will be held on Thursday, October 5th and on the following Sunday.

The first meeting of the new Session of the C.E.M.S. will be held on Monday, October 2nd, in the Schools at 7.30. We propose to confine our thoughts throughout the year to different aspects of the overseas work of the Church.

The Sunday School Infants Teachers' Class will not be held again till Tuesday, October 3rd.

Mrs. Rumsey's Bible Class will meet in the Schools during the Sundays of September.

The last payments of the Clothing Club will be taken on Monday, October 2nd.

There will be a meeting of the Mothers' Union on Monday, October 2nd, in the Church at 2.30 p.m.

There will be no Celebration of Holy Communion on Sunday, September 10th at 7.0.

Mr. W. Thornton was elected a Foundation Manager of the Quorn Church of England Schools on July 25th.

Mr. W. H. Atter was admitted to the Bellringers' Guild on Sunday evening, August 6th.

The Choir Boys went for their outing to High Tor and Ashby-de-la-Zouch on Aug. 29th. It rained most of the time but nobody seemed to mind very much. The boys wish to thank all who contributed.

Will the Magazine distributors kindly leave their bags and books this month with Mr. Murray Rumsey in Barrow Road.

After what we wrote in the last Magazine about Private Charlie Ottey, it was a great shock to learn on Sunday, July 30th, that though his wounds had been doing well, pneumonia had set in and that he had passed away at the War Hospital, at Huddersfield, early that morning. His body was brought to Quorn and was buried on Wednesday, August 2nd. The coffin was shrouded with the Union Jack, and had upon it a laurel wreath, presented by his comrades of the C.L.B. There was an escort of Quorn Companies of the C.L.B. and V.T.C. The Choir were present at the service and hymns 545, 540 and 221 were sung. The Dead March was played, the bugles sounded the Last Post at the grave, the flag of St. George flew half mast, and a muffled peal of bells was rung in the evening. Thus has passed away one who but a very short time back was the leading boy in the Choir and a young sergeant in the C.L.B. He joined the colours in November last, was drafted out to the front in June and while still only in his 19th year received the wounds that proved fatal on July 1st, the first day of the big offensive movement, which we trust will prove to have been the beginning of the end, though the time may not be yet. Mr. and Mrs. Ottey and their family wish to thank the large number of friends whose sympathy has been a comfort to them in their bereavement.

Other men of whom we have heard as having been wounded are—Horace Leonard Burton, who received a shrapnel wound in the arm on July 12th, and has now been discharged from Liverpool Hospital. Louis Brewin who was wounded in the foot is doing well in Huddersfield Hospital. John William Wilday who was seriously wounded during April in Mesopotamia, has left Manchester for a convalescent home. Walter Sutton is wounded in the thumb, and is at Huddersfield. Albert Wright is officially reported missing.

As a result of the Wednesday collections in Church for the Prisoners Bread Fund a second cheque (£4) was sent to the British Legation at Berne on July 28th. The committee informs us that bread sent from Berne arrives at its destination, anywhere in Germany, in five or six days, in excellent condition.

We are asked to state that Miss Grace Firr, on behalf of the Loughborough Women's Volunteer Reserve, is collecting vegetables (anything but potatoes) for the Fleet. Will people kindly send them to Mr. Hack on Wednesday evenings or before 10.0 on Thursday mornings. Already large consignments have been sent and grateful letters have been received.

The Quorn War Working Committee will commence work again on Monday, September 4th at the Conservative Club at 2.30. In view of the urgent demands for garments the committee hope that the Quorn women will work as they never did before. The net proceeds of the Fête held at Quorn Court on July 19th were £49.
