PARISH NOTES.

APRIL, 1917.

Summer-time begins on Easter Day so we must be very careful to put our clocks on the night before, so that they may tell us correctly the time of the Easter morning services. The Celebrations of Holy Communion will be at 6.0, 7.0, 8.0 and after morning prayer. Those who have recently been confirmed will make their first Communion at one of the early services, and we hope that there will be no Communicant absent from the altar without sufficient reason.

The Holy-Week Services will be as follows :— Holy Communion on Monday and Tuesday at 8.0 and on Wednesday and Thursday at 7.0. Mattins at 7.30 a.m. and Evensong with short reading at 6.30 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday. Intercession Service at 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday and preparation for Holy Communion at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday. Good Friday, short service at 5.30 a.m., 9.30 children, 10.30 Mattins, 12.0-3.0 Three Hours' Service, Evensong 7.0, Lantern Service 8.0. Easter Eve, Mattins and ante-Communion 9.0, Evensong 6.30.

PLEASE NOTE.

(i) The story of the Lord's Passion as it is told by the four evangelists forms the gospel on the

different days of Holy Week. We may either hear it at the celebration of the Holy Communion or read it at home.

(ii) There will be a box in Church throughout Holy Week for S. Mary's Refuge in Leicester.

(iii) The Service at 5.30 a.m. on Good Friday will be over by 5.55.

(iv) The hymns sung at the Three Hours' Service are 114—122. Will those who attend a part of this service please enter or leave the Church during the singing of a hymn.

We have all been glad and proud to hear of the successes that have attended our arms in the last few weeks. May our men and especially those who have gone from amongst us be endued with strength of body and spirit to carry on. And may we at home be content to share willingly at least some part of the nation's burdens.

Another magazine will be published before the Rogation Days, but we should like to say now that we propose to organise at that time a solemn procession along the outskirts of the parish with prayers at different stations for God's blessing on the crops and fruits of the earth. It may not be possible entirely to revive the old custom of the beating of the bounds of the parish at Rogationtide, but we think that it will be appropriate at this time to restore its essential features.

Another preliminary notice must be given. Arrangements are being made for a two-days' Convention to be held at Loughborough on May 8th and 9th. The Bishop of the Diocese will be in the chair and amongst many other well known speakers who have promised to come is Mr. Creighton.

The King's Messengers meet every Thursday at 5.30 and on every first Thursday in the month there is a service in Church at that time. We have to thank those who have given material for work. The children are now well provided with various kinds of work that will be turned to good account. Miss Mabel Gamble has been appointed K.M. Secretary and Miss Emily Thornton, Treasurer.

We have lost a very faithful old servant of the Church in Mr. George Brewin, who passed away on Sunday, March 11th, at his sister's home in Leicester. For many years he had been a sidesman, and from the inauguration of the C.E.M.S. one of its keenest and most regular members. As a worker he was thoroughly reliable and we were wont to turn to him on many occasions. He is much lamented and missed. To his two sons serving in the Army we offer our sympathy. The death of their father follows close upon that of their respected step-mother, and they have lost two good friends. May he rest in peace.

The Easter Vestry meeting will be held on Friday, April 20th, at 7.30 in the School.

SELF-GOVERNMENT FOR THE CHURCH.

PARISH NOTES.

MAY, 1917.

Never probably has there been greater anxiety about our food supply than at present. This anxiety is due to a serious shortage of the staple foods. And unless the matter is taken in hand this shortage may develop into something bordering on famine, which would spell for us national disaster.

How to make the soil of England yield its utmost is a problem which the country is setting itself to solve on all sides. We look to our rulers to guide us, but a true democracy rules itself and sets its own house in order. Therefore we have all to determine upon two things, (i) to eat less (ii) to produce more. About the former we have already spoken. Now a word about the latter.

With splendid enterprise men are working early and late upon their allotments, and farm hands are enjoying a minimum of rest. Summer-time is all in their favour, and soon it will be possible to go straight from the soil to bed.

But all the time it is well to remember that we are "workers together with God" and that it is He who "giveth the increase." We should therefore go to our work with all the pride of those who are co-operators with God, with a sense of dependence upon Him from whom "cometh every good and perfect gift," and with the prayer that he may prosper the work of our hands, for "in Him we live and move and have our being."

Bearing all this in mind we propose to hold, on Wednesday, May 16th, during the evening, a solemn procession through certain parts of the Parish during which the Litany will be sung, and prayers will be offered at different places for the blessing of God upon man's labours, and that He will give us the kindly fruits of the earth in their season. We hope that a large number of people will take their part in the procession which will leave the church at 7.30, and that all bodies of Church-workers will be fully represented. We should mention that the day chosen is one of the three Rogation days which were of old set apart for this purpose, and that what we propose to do will be some sort of revival, though in a modified form, of the "Beating the bounds" of the Parish.

The Annual Vestry Meeting was held in the Schools on Friday, April 20th, at 7.30. It was not possible to present the Accounts owing to the recent serious illness of the People's Warden. A message of sympathy was sent to Mr. Hayward. We very much regretted, as did he, his enforced absence, but we are glad to say that he is well on his way to recovery, and we wish him a complete restoration to health. The Vicar presented the Sick and Poor Account which is printed below, and stated that at the Wednesday Intercession Services during the year (with the exception of the Wednesdays during Lent and Advent) the sum of £14 4s 6d. had been collected, of which £12 4s. 6d. had been sent to the British Legation at Berne, for bread for prisoners, and £2 to the fund for workshops for Disabled Soldiers and Sailors. The Vicar nominated Mr. W. Moore as his warden, and the people again elected Mr. J. A. Le M. Hayward. Before the election of sidesmen reference was made by the chairman to the death during the year of two sidesmen of long-standing, Mr. O. S. Brown, and Mr. G. Brewin, and the meeting stood for a moment in respect to their memories. The list of Sidesmen and Church Committee is to be found below. We beg to welcome as a new sidesman Mr. H. Salter, and as new members of the Church Committee Mr. W. B. Beardsley and Mr. J. Nevitt.

The date of the adjourned meeting of the Vestry for the accounts and for the election of a representative to the Rural Deanery conference by duly qualified electors, will be announced in due course.

We hope that a wide interest will be taken by Church people in the parish and neighbourhood in the two-days' Convention which is to be held in Loughborough on May 8th and 9th. The following are full particulars of the meetings. The result of attending such a Conference should be to inspire one with a sense of the great and important part which the Church has to play in the life of the Nation and Empire.

The Rogationtide procession took place on Wed-
nesday, May 16th, a cold but fine evening. We left
the Church at 7.30 and returned at 9.15. We visited
the allotments in Church Lane and Loughborough
Road, turned into the Bridle Road opposite Westfield,
through the farmyard of Moorfields Farm and out into
Barrow Road, across the fields to Mansfield Street,
through Mr. Warner's allotments, along Soar Side,
School Lane and Mountsorrel Road to the Wood
Lane allotments, and back by the main road to the
Church. There was an appropriate prayer and a
blessing at the various halts, hymns (142, 143, 166,
165, 512) were sung at different parts of the route, and
the whole of the Litany was sung as we moved from
Wood Lane back to the Church. We were particularly

glad to have the opportunity of praying for the labours
of the boys scouts, whom we found digging in Mans-
field Street. We should have been glad to have had
a larger number of Church-people in the procession,
but we do not forget of course that for many the hour
was an impossible one.

There are two things worthy of note to be said
about the C.L.B. In the first place the King has been
pleased to sanction the affiliation of the C.L.B. Cadets
to the Kings Royal Rifle Corps. This is a great
distinction to have been conferred on the Brigade.
In the second place we are very proud to say that a
composite squad of 12 Quorn and Barrow lads was
awarded the Warner Cup by Colonel R. E. Martin at
the competition at Bardon, on Whit-Monday. We
congratulate them most heartily and believe that this
will be an incentive to further progress in the Company
in the immediate future. The squad was commanded
by Sergeant Horace Waling, who is also to be con-
gratulated on winning the bugling competition of the
North Leicestershire Battalion.

We were very sorry indeed to learn that Sergeant
Albert Burton was killed in action on April 27th. He
is one of four, a father and three sons, who have all
served the colours. He was marked out for a com-
mission and would soon have received it had he not
been killed. A memorial service was held on Satur-
day, May 20th, at 5.0. The C.L.B. were present from
Quorn and Barrow, and the Last Post was played.
May he rest in peace. May his family be consoled
in their grief.

Lieutenant Cecil White and Private J. W. Wesley
are both at Netley, wounded. Private C. Winterton
is at King George's Hospital, London, wounded in
the thigh. We are glad to hear they are doing well.

A Mothers' Union Service will be held on Wed-
nesday June 20th, at 2.30. An address will be given
by the Rev. R. H. Fuller. At the service will take
place the admission of those who have not already
been admitted.
