PARISH NOTES.

JULY, 1918.

The Vicar and Mrs. Rumsey with their family will be at Sutton-on-Sea from July 1st to 27th. The Vicarage during that time will be occupied, and the duty taken by the Rev. H. Shrubbs, Assistant Curate of Christ Church, Spitalfields. There will be no change of any kind in the Sunday Services except that there will be no Celebration of Holy Communion after Morning Prayer on Sunday, July 7th. There will be no Week-day Services, but Mr. Shrubbs will be responsible for all occasional week-day duty.

The Vicar was interviewed by the Assistant Chaplain-General in London on Wednesday, June 5th, with a view to an appointment to a temporary Army Chaplaincy. After a medical examination he was passed as "fit for military service in garrison duty at home and abroad." He heard subsequently from the Chaplain-General that he was unable to offer him an appointment at the present time as what he needed was Chaplains fit for General Service who can proceed for duty overseas. The Vicar has now

sent in his name to the Bishop of the Diocese for (i) Work in Church Army huts, (ii) Work in Y.M.C.A. huts, (iii) Any branch of Non-combatant Service, in order of preference.

After many contradictory reports, all of them founded apparently on good authority, we are glad to know that Sergeant George Harris is alive and making a good recovery. Corporal Ben Williams, previously reported missing, is a prisoner at Parchim. Amongst the wounded to whom we have hitherto made no reference, are Corporal Arthur Squires, whose left leg has had to be amputated; George Sykes, gassed, in France; Sydney North, wounded in the jaw and chest, at Parkhurst; Charles Henry Teagle, gassed and wounded, in London; George Horsley, gassed, in France; Percy Ottey, wounded in the shoulder, at Shepherds Bush.

So far as we know prisoners from Quorn are six in number: Colonel Toller, Percy Clowes, Jack Martin, John William Daft, Frederick Tyler, and Ben Williams. We have forwarded £2 from the Wednesday collections to the Leicestershire Prisoners of War Committee.

PARISH NOTES.

AUGUST, 1918.

My dear Friends,

On July 11th the Bishop wrote to me to say that in consultation with the Bishop of Leicester and the Archdeacons of the Diocese he had accepted me for Y.M.C.A. hut work.

The Clergy of the Rural Deanery some time back, after consultation, considered that in war time the Parishes in our immediate neighbourhood ought to be able to carry on with one clergyman short. It is not unnatural that ultimately the lot should fall upon me, as one of the youngest clergy, to be the one to be spared.

I have postponed the writing of this letter to the last moment possible in the hope that I may be able to speak as definitely as possible about the future. I have now (August 8th) heard from the Y.M.C.A. that they wish me to go to their Workers' Training School in London for a fortnight from Saturday, August 31st, and then to proceed to Salonika, where the Secretary says they are in desperate need of help at the present time.

On the recommendation of the Bishop I am consulting the Rural Dean at once in regard to the provision for duty during my absence and I shall announce the plans that have been made in an early publication of the September magazine.

May I say now what a great pleasure it will be to me personally if as many of you as possible will be with me at the altar at 8.0 or 9.30 on Sunday, Aug. 25th, our Patronal Festival. There is no time for more now.

Sunday August 25th (the day after S. Bartholomew's day) will be observed as our Patronal Festival. There will be celebrations of Holy Communion at 8.0 and 9.30 (choral). At 3.15 p.m. there will be a Church Parade for the C.L.B. Companies of Loughborough and District.

The list of funerals printed below shews also a distressing number of deaths among children. Our sympathy especially goes out to Mrs. Bowler, who, with her husband away in France, has lost three out of her four little children.

Mr. and Mrs. Smithard wish to thank their friends for many kind expressions of sympathy at the time of the death of their son, Harold.

After many months, during which he was amongst the missing, Bertie Maiden is now reported to be a prisoner of war.

The C.L.B. Lads are in camp with Captain Hayward this week at Little Stretton. The Vicar has paid them a flying visit and found them all well and happy.

As the result of the Inspection of the Schools in Religious Knowledge, held on June 21st, we have received the following report from the Diocesan Inspector:—

Mixed Department.—The cumulative method has been carefully carried out with very good results. Many of the children were able to give intelligent answers as well as shewing a knowledge of facts. The Repetition consists chiefly of 12 Psalms, which are chanted. The Singing and Pointing were very good.

Infants' Department.—Very good work has been done throughout. The children are being sympathetically taught. Several children were absent through illness.

PARISH NOTES.

SEPTEMBER, 1918.

My dear Friends,

I must apologise for writing to you once more about myself, but having written in the last magazine to the effect that I was to go to Salonika, I must write in this number what I have already had many opportunities of telling you, that by my Doctor's orders I am not to work abroad, and that consequently my work with the Y.M.C.A. will be in a camp somewhere in England. I need not say that though I regret being disqualified for service which in many respects would be more attractive and interesting, I am glad at the prospect of being in closer touch with my home and parish.

May I say a word or two about the affairs of the parish during my temporary absence, and refer you for further details to the notes below. The services of the Church will be taken by neighbouring clergy, the Rural Dean being responsible in conjunction with myself for the arrangements. The services will of necessity be fewer in number, but in this respect neighbouring parishes will suffer also, and it may reasonably be hoped that the services being fewer in number will be better attended. The occasional

week-day duty will be taken by different clergy who will kindly hold themselves responsible in turns for a week at a time. The Rural Dean, the Rev. W. A. King, Vicar of Woodhouse, will be at the Vicarage every Monday evening from 6 to 7 o'clock, when any matter may be referred to him, and care will be taken that the sick who desire the ministrations of the Church will be visited. In this respect the District Visitors may, if they will be so good, be a considerable help, by keeping the Rural Dean in touch with the spiritual needs of the parish.

May I venture to ask you to adapt yourselves to changed circumstances. As in other departments of life, so in the Church, business cannot be quite as usual. But there is every prospect, I think, that with the kind co-operation of the neighbouring clergy, nothing which is essential to the care of souls in the parish will be unattended to. May I ask all Church workers to hold fast to their allotted tasks, for a great deal will depend upon their faithfulness.

Although these temporary changes will involve difficulties and sacrifice, and will be accompanied by some anxiety for all concerned, I have great hope firstly, that when I return I shall be qualified by new experiences to minister to you more faithfully, and more efficiently than in the past; and secondly that the Church during my absence will grow in self-reliance, and will realise more fully that very true Priesthood of the Laity, which is the vocation of every communicant.

You will be constantly remembered in my prayers, and I ask of you the benefit of yours for me. If any of you will write to me it will be a great encouragement to me.

At a Church Committee Meeting on Wednesday, Aug. 21st, at 8 o, matters arising out of the Vicar's temporary absence were considered, and the following business was done. The administration of the Sick and Poor Fund was entrusted to a Committee of three, consisting of Mrs. Woodward (Treasurer), Miss E. Thornton and Mr. C. Adams. Mr. A. Burrows was appointed Treasurer of the Bell Ringers' Guild, and Mr. E. C. Laundon Treasurer of the New Vestry

Fund in the place of Mr. E. W. Hensman. Mr. A. Burrows was appointed Choir Master. Mr. Murray Rumsey was entrusted with the Treasurership of the Magazine and with the work of distribution. Magazine bags will be received from him and should be returned to him. Mr. Rumsey also consented to manage the Clothing Club, and the meeting appointed Mr. R. Hickling to assist him in the Annual Accounts. The Vicar announced that Mr. G. E. Dexter had consented, on his invitation, to be Sacristan, and that all matters connected with the altar would be under his care. He will be glad to hear of ladies who will arrange the altar flowers. The Vicar thanked the meeting for so readily undertaking their different tasks.

The Harvest Festival, as notified in the list of services below, will be held on Sept. 15th. There will be no week-day service. For the bountiful harvest which is now being gathered in we have cause to be more than ever thankful. The collections as usual will be for the hospitals. Flowers and fruit and vegetables should be brought to the Church early on Saturday morning, the 14th.

We must once again announce with great sorrow that two more Quorn men have been killed in action. James William Dockray was a Sunday School boy but a short time since, and Reginald Backhouse, before he went to live in Canada, whence he came at the country's call, had many friends in the village. Once more we offer to the departed our tribute of respect and gratitude, and to their mourning friends our sympathy.

We are very sorry indeed that Mr. E. W. Hensman has been compelled, on account of ill health, to resign the Headmastership of the Rawlins School, and is consequently leaving the village to live in London. Mr. Hensman has been for many years a member of the Church Committee. His counsel at Committee Meetings has always been wise and valuable, and his Churchmanship has always seemed to us to be marked by conscientiousness and a firm sense of duty. Mrs. Hensman will be missed in her district, where she has always been a consistent visitor. We wish them both much happiness in the future, better health, a comfortable home, and some congenial sphere of work where their gifts may be exercised to the advantage of the new circle of friends in which no doubt they will soon find themselves. *Valete.* Mr. Keith Thompson, the Second Master of Market Bosworth Grammar School, has been appointed by the Trustees to succeed Mr. Hensman. He and his wife will no doubt be warmly welcomed.

Mr. Hayward will receive many congratulations—and not the least hearty will be those of his fellow Church-workers—on his engagement and forth-coming marriage. While we join most cordially in these congratulations we regret that Mr. Hayward will be away from Quorn at any rate for some considerable time, and that meanwhile much of the Church work must be put into other hands. We wish him and Miss Lilian Holland Buddicom many years of happy married life. They are to be married on Sept. 18th.

Mr. G. White asks us to state that he and Mr. T. Shenton are responsible for flowers being placed every week at the War Memorial at the Cross, and that they will be glad to receive (i) names of those who are willing to undertake a week, (ii) more contributions of flowers, which should be delivered at Rose Cottage on Saturdays before noon.

The Sunday Schools will re-open on Sunday, Sept. 8th.

The Sunday School Treat will be held on Saturday, Sept. 21st.

A further sum of £3 7s. 8d. has been sent to the Leicestershire Fund for Prisoners of War.
