After the Tea "Aunt Sally" drew a large crowd, and racing, cricket, and other games were played until eight o'clock, when the racing prizes were given, the children then dispersed, after having had a most enjoyable treat.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CLOTHING CLUB which used to be paid out in clothing in the end of the year has been converted into a savings' bank, the interest to be paid at the end of June when it is hoped the money will either be left in for another year or will be transferred to the post office savings' bank. It is well to train children early to lay by their pence and to keep, if possible, untouched a small and increasing sum in each child's name, so that when they begin to earn money, they will be less likely to foolishly squander it. Prizes for good attendance will be given at Christmas instead of adding a bonus to the interest. The interest paid at the end of June, will be at the rate of 1d. in the shilling on the first pound, or part of a pound; 1s. in the pound on the second pound; 8d. on the third pound.

QUORNDON CHORAL SOCIETY.—On Monday evening, August 19th, a Meeting was held in the National Schoolroom, to discuss the desirability of forming a Choral Society in the Village. The Meeting was convened by Mr. J. J. Callis, and presided over by Mr. W. E. B. Farnham. Amongst those present were Messrs. James Wright, J. Spencer, B. Fewkes, W. H. Fewkes, T. North, H. H. North, W. Y. Swain, Tom Firr, G. White, A. Sanlt, G. Cook, O. S. Brown, T. Lucas, H. Backhouse, A. Squires, &c. The Chairman having stated the object of the Meeting, Mr. Geo. White explained the aim of the Society, and outlined a plan for working such a Society. The following gentlemen were unanimously elected:—W. E. B. Farnham, Esq., as President; Mr. James Wright, Treasurer, and Mr. H. H. North, Hon. Secretary. It was decided to fix the ordinary Members' subscription at 2s. 6d. for the season, and Hon. Members at a minimum subscription of 5s.; the appointment of a general Committee, Conductor, Pianist, &c., to stand over until Monday next, when a Meeting of all interested in the welfare of the Society should be held in the Schoolroom. A vote of thanks to the Chairman for presiding terminated the proceedings. On Monday, August 26th, a public Meeting was held in the National Schoolroom, under the presidency of W. E. B. Farnham, Esq., for the purpose of enrolling Members, &c. The following Gentlemen were elected upon the Committee:—Messrs. G. White, J. Spencer, Philip Wright, Robert Thompson, Tom Firr, B. Fewkes, G. Cook, Reuben Orson, T. North, and H. Disney. Mr. J. J. Callis was appointed Conductor, and Mr. H. H. North Pianist. It was also arranged for the Society to meet for practice in Messrs. Wright's room, until the completion of the Village Hall.
