Quorndon (Infant)	172	This School keeps up its high character. The Children are in excellent order and passed a very creditable examination.

A Meeting will be summoned of the Subscribers to the School, when the four Managers will have to be elected to act with the Vicar and Churchwardens. In accordance with the trust deeds of the School, those who are qualified for election, are all subscribers of one guinea and upwards, who are also Members of the Church of England, that is, baptised persons; while the electorate is all Subscribers of over half-a-guinea.

Extract from the Will of the late Rev. JOHN PRIOR, of Quorndon, who died 1st February, 1833.

"I direct my Executors to set apart the sum of Two Hundred Pounds at the end of Twelve Calendar Months after my decease and invest the same free from Legacy Duty in the purchase of Stock in one of the Public Funds of this Kingdom in the names of the officiating Minister and two substantial land owners or Parishioners of the Parish of Quorndon aforesaid, and which Stock shall be held by the persons in whose names the same shall from time to time stand upon Trust to apply the annual dividends or produce thereof to the best advantage in the purchase of good and wholesome bread to be given and distributed annually on the twenty-fifth day of December or within fourteen days thereof by the Minister and Churchwardens of the said Parish for the time being to such poor Inhabitants within the said Parish of Quorndon (whether legally settled there or not) as they shall think proper. And I expressly declare my intention to be that the benefit hereby intended for the said poor Inhabitants shall not go or be considered as part of or in diminution of any relief or advantage of any of them would be entitled to receive from the rates or other aids existing for their use. And I further direct that the Minister of the said Parish for the time being shall always be one of the said three Trustees and that the other two shall on vacancies be appointed by the majority of the Inhabitants of the said Parish rated and paying to the Church Rate at not less yearly than Ten Pounds assembled at a Vestry convened for that purpose by at least four days previous notice given thereof publicly in the said Parish Church on a Sunday during or immediately after Divine Service."

Afterwards at a meeting of the ten pounds rate payers, Mr. James Bolesworth was appointed a trustee of Hyde's Charity in the room of Mr. Charles Smith, disqualified by non-residence.

A legacy of £200 has lately been left to the poor of Quorndon, by Mr. Anstead, which will bring in about five guineas per annum.
