The Secretary's suggestion that there should be a Flower Show in connection with this did not at first seem to be practicable, but after enquiries it appeared that with the co-operation of many keen allotment holders, such a show might be held with every prospect of success, and the Committee consequently adopted the suggestion. The Fête and Show together should form a very pleasant attraction. There will be much hard work to be done in various departments, but we are blessed with many good workers. There are others who, I hope, will in time be ready to assume definite responsibility in the different branches of Church work, but that there are so many such already is a great encouragement.

PAROCHIAL OUTING: Sub-Committee appointed to arrange on August 23rd. OFFICIAL RECOGNITION BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CHURCH ROOM FUND: The following to be placed on the minutes, "The Council notes that the Church Room Fund now amounts to £515 10s. 11d—that Mr. E. C. Laundon was appointed treasurer at a meeting held on May 27th—that a full statement of

the Church's impending commitments was made by the Vicar's Warden to a public meeting held on May 19th. DIOCESAN QUOTA: Resolution passed that a sum of £10 be set aside during the two remaining quarters to meet a possible deficiency in the quota collection, £8 13s. 4d. (representing 40 penny a week subscribers) being taken from the Free-will Offering Fund, and the balance of £1 6s. 8d. from Church Expenses Account, the whole to be placed on deposit in the names of the Secretary of the Quota Collections and one of the Churchwardens. Should there be no deficiency in the sum of £10 to revert to the Church Expenses Account. OPEN-AIR SERVICES: The Chairman asked the Council to consider the organising of a series of Open-air Services. No steps were taken. Next Meeting, July 17th.

Thomas Herbert.—Our old friend passed away on July 1st, and was laid to rest on July 4, his body being borne by four ringers to the grave, and the organist and choir solemnizing the occasion by their presence. Since his resignation over a year ago he had been very poorly, and an attack of bronchitis hastened the end. He had been our Clerk and Sexton for 36 years, and a ringer of the bells for 55 years. There are many amongst us who think of him with real affection and remember to his honour the unfailing fidelity and reverence with which he performed his duties. We offer our sympathy to his widow and family, and for him, together with all God's servants departed this life in His faith and fear, we bless God's holy Name.

Diocesan Quota Collection.—Those who have become known as the "Friends of the Diocese" are to be congratulated on a very successful half year's work, the sum of £33 7s. 1d. having been collected and remitted to the Diocesan authorities. The strong endorsement and support of Mr. Murray Rumsey's scheme by the Church Council, and the establishment of a reserve to meet a possible deficiency, will no doubt be an encouragement to the collectors. Direct collection of the quota may now be regarded as a permanent feature of our Church Finance, and it is hoped shortly to add to the number of subscribers by a systematic canvass of newcomers. It is hoped that the congregation will realise that the reasonable and equitable course is to support the scheme which the Council and the majority of our people have approved.

were again entertained by Mrs. Firr at Charnwood House. The superintendents and teachers managed things very efficiently, and very happy times were spent.

Flanders, who have for some time been most dependable teachers and who are prevented by other duties from continuing their work. So we have vacancies to fill, which we hope will not be the case for long.

My dear Friends.—

At this season, when holidays are over, when the sun resumes his authority over the clock and the leaves begin to fall and the days to darken, the time has come, as the walrus said, to talk of many things. Church life has not, we may hope, been idle during the summer, none the less the passing of summer suggests the taking up with new vigour of activities which have rested for a while. The suggestion is a timely one, may we have grace to follow it, and to seek in all things the Glory of God, and the benefit of His holy Church!

Church life has not, we may hope, been idle during the summer, none the less the passing of summer suggests the taking up with new vigour of activities which have rested for a while. The suggestion is a timely one, may we have grace to follow it, and to seek in all things the Glory of God, and the benefit of His holy Church!

One thing in particular occurs to me to be worth saying. It is that each part of our Church work should at stated times have the blessing of God asked upon it. For of what value, of what avail, will it be without that blessing? You have become accustomed to some special intercession being connected with the Wednesday in each week. For the next two months I propose to put down the different needs of the parish on these days, and to ask you to join with me in prayer for them, either at the celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a.m., or at Evening Prayer at 6.30. Below, under the heading "Wednesday Intercessions," will be found particulars. I should like to think that our work is being laid before God in this way. If only two or three are gathered together it will be worth while. But as our numbers increase, as indeed I hope they will, the efficacy of our prayer should increase also. Will some of you try to join in these special prayers? and will those who would like to, but cannot, offer on the same day and for the same object their prayer at home? Only when work for God is accompanied by prayer to God for His blessing can we hope that it will advance His Kingdom upon earth.

My dear Friends,—

The time draws near the birth of Christ. I wish you all a happy Christmas. There are two centres of Christmas happiness, the Church and the Home. Both alike are decorated with the evergreen, and both are the proper spheres of peace and goodwill. The normal Christian will go no further afield on Christmas Day than the altar and the fireside. Christ will be present at both to those who seek Him, and His presence then and at all times will secure to us the joy that no man taketh from us.

I must say a word about the Division of the Diocese, or, as the scheme is alternately and correctly called, the Restoration of the See of Leicester. I read the Bishop's Pastoral Letter to you on November 16th, and also at the Bishop's request, did my best to explain and recommend to you the enterprise in which the whole Diocese is now called upon to take its part. There is some very clear information on the subject posted in the Church porch, and the coloured map shows Leicestershire with the city of Leicester at its centre to be an ideal area for a Diocese. There is every sign of keen interest being aroused in the parish. For this I am very thankful.

Now we have to consider what contribution we ought to try to make to the capital sum of £65,000, which the whole of the Diocese (Peterborough as it now is) has set itself to raise by the end of 1926. We are asked to make our offer by Jan. 1st. The Church Council met on Nov. 27th, and considered a sum which they would recommend to the parish. It was resolved to disseminate information amongst and to make a personal canvas of the electors on the roll, and every member of the Council present undertook to take his or her part in the canvas.

No doubt we have a big task before us, and we have many other commitments. But we are only standing shoulder to shoulder with the rest of the Diocese in the conviction that the restoration of the See of Leicester is God's will for us at this moment, that it will enable the Church in this area to do the work of her Lord and Master with greater efficiency. Moreover, if the number of givers is large and offerings are spread over the two years by quarterly or more frequent payments, the sum should be raised without an undue burden

falling on any. Prayer will be offered often in Church, and we hope, too, in the private devotions of many, for the blessing of God. Your faithful friend and servant,
