My dear Friends,—

I speak with a sense of personal loss because Mr. Walton has been my warden and friend, valued by me in both relationships. But you too have learnt their worth and would, I believe, wish me to express your feelings. It is very rarely that in so short a time, less than five years, two people can so firmly establish themselves in the esteem and affection of new friends. Mr. and Mrs. Walton, I believe, have done so because of their fine sense of devotion to duty, so happily combined with gifts of disposition which make for friendship and which enable workers to co-operate so happily. I know enough of what many of you think of them to say this quite freely and I could say much more without exaggeration. Let me assure them of our feelings towards them, of our gratitude for the standard they have set, of our very great sorrow that they must go to live elsewhere, and our hope that they may have in the future, wherever they may be, that double experience that God promised His people of old and of every generation in the words, "I will bless thee, . . . and thou shalt be a blessing."

I hope to be away with my three eldest at Hunstanton for the first fortnight of September, including Sundays, August 30 and Septem-

ber 6. The rest of the family will probably be paddling elsewhere. I hope all who will be holiday making this month will have a very happy time.

My dear Friends,—

I want to ask you all to turn your thoughts to our Church Day Schools, in fact, as churchpeople, to give them the first place in your thoughts for some little time, and to come to a meeting on Monday, September 21st, at 7-0 p.m. in the schools, to consider important matters connected with them. The Managers, with the approval and help of the County Education Authority, have carried out certain alterations during the holidays with a view to the better accommodation of the various classes. There are other steps, long overdue, which we ought to take, both for the maintenance and improvement of the buildings and their surroundings. There is always before us, of course, the alternative of surrendering our schools and leaving the County to take what steps they will. I hope we shall not contemplate this. But I hope too I that we shall not allow the continuance of present conditions to entail any educational loss upon our children. This will mean that we must take a greater interest in the schools and be prepared to face a greater expenditure upon them. May I ask you to consider this matter with the seriousness which it deserves and to come to the meeting on Monday the 21st at 7 p.m.?

The news of Mr. E. H. Warner's death did not come as a surprise to those who knew of his long illness. He passed away on August 16th at Bragbury End, Knebworth, where for the last few years he and Mrs. Warner had lived, after leaving Quorn Hall. We made remembrance of him on the Sunday following his funeral, as one who had played a conspicuous part in the life of the village and the Church. His interest in Quorn and in every good cause continued to be shown long after his health was broken up, and many will remember with gratitude their indebtedness to him. To Mrs. Warner we offer our sympathy in her widowhood. May he rest in peace.

The Vicar, as chairman of the managers, expained in detail the alterations that had been carried out and stated that the total cost was about £100. In answer to a question, he stated that the work had not been done under pressure from the County Education Authority, but with the approval and help of that body. He also said that there were other improvements which the managers felt they ought to make for the sake of educational efficiency, but that these would not be undertaken without referring them first to the church people of the parish. He emphasised the point that while we value the opportunity for definite Christian teaching given us in our school, we must not allow the children and staff on this account to suffer educational disadvantages. He asked the meeting to raise the £100. Asked if the appeal should be made to the whole parish, he said that the contributions of other than churchpeople would be gratefully accepted, but that we must recognise that the sole responsibility and obligation rested on ourselves. After some discussion upon the merits of direct or indirect giving, it was resolved to amalgamate both methods and the following means of raising the money were decided upon:

1. An appeal to be made (a) for donations; (b) for new annual subscribers.
2. The following events (a) Rummage Sale,

My dear Friends,

Sunday, December 6th, will be one of our two definitely Missionary Sundays, and once again Our Lord will claim our thoughts and prayers and offerings for the preaching of the gospel of salvation and the planting of His Church amongst those who know Him not as yet. The collections on that day will be for the Church Missionary Society, and will those who have missionary boxes please bring them to church at one of the services that they may be offered. May I remind you that the joint secretaries of our Missionary Guild are Miss Moore and my brother who are always ready to provide missionary literature and boxes for those who desire them.

Another Christmas is rapidly drawing near. The prospects of international peace were splendidly advanced at Locarno, for which we

thank God. Industrial peace hangs in the balance and must continually be the subject of our prayers. If at Christmas time we have the peace of God in our hearts we shall each be a contributor to that wider peace because we shall know that it is a gift which we can only lose if we keep it to ourselves. To all who read this may God give first His gift of peace and then the honour of being a peacemaker.
