My Dear Friends,—

A happy New Year to you all and may it find us ready and willing for whatever service or sacrifice God may ask of us, also "forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forth unto those things which are before."

One or two matters of importance call for attention very early in the year. I beg all who receive notice of the Vestry and Annual Church Meeting on January 20th to respond to it by being present. Churchwardens, Councillors and Sidesmen will then be appointed for the year and the retiring council, through its treasurers, will present its statement of accounts for the year past. It is always a gathering of great interest and importance, and the larger the number present, the more invigorating and effective it is. One reminder I should like to offer concerning the elections to any office. It is that those who wish to propose any name should ascertain beforehand the willingness of their nominee to stand.

With regard to the Confirmation on March 24th, I made a brief reference in my last letter. Now I should like to ask all who wish to present themselves to see me in Church after evensong on Sunday, January 16th. I should be grateful, too, if parents or god-parents or guardians would bring to my notice any unconfirmed in whom they have an interest. Also I should be glad to be of use to any who have passed the usual age for confirmation and are now considering the matter. May the time of preparation be hallowed to God's glory, and may many stretch forth the hand of faith for God's gift of His Holy Spirit.

Our Missionary School came to a close with its sixth session on December 8th. The attendance was quite encouraging, the average number present being 28. The threefold group discussions into which the school broke itself up at four of the sessions were productive of many practical proposals, which the group reporters presented to the whole school. The question that now arises is "What next?" Well, a "follow up" conference was agreed upon by the school before it broke up. The date is Monday, January 17th, at 7 o'clock. At this conference, some of the outstanding suggestions made should take definite shape and become part of our future missionary policy. That in view, I hope all the members of the school will take careful note of the date.

But remembering that the school did not by any means (God forbid) include all the missionary hearted people, we beg others than members also to be present.

We may thank God for another happy Christmas, for the services, particularly, of course, the Communion (though many were absent), the special music, and the very happy spirit prevailing at the Christmas parties. May goodwill be carried forward into the new year and be in all relationships its most conspicuous feature.

Dear Friends,—

Once more our annual Vestry and Church Meetings have been held and a new year of office has begun for our Churchwardens, Church Council, and Sidesmen. I am very happy in being able to retain the services of Mr. E. B. Fewkes as my warden and your choice has for the third time fallen upon Mr. C. Adams, who no doubt will fill the office with conspicuous diligence as in the past. The Church Council holds its place more firmly year by year as the chief instrument of all Church activity and I rejoice to think that I am to preside in the coming year over a body of men and women worthy to be fellow-workers unto the Kingdom of Heaven.

In the past year's accounts, it was noticeable that the collections on normal Sundays showed a drop of 6 per cent. on the previous year. It is not safe to argue that the congregations at Morning and Evening Prayer on Sundays were smaller by proportion, and yet I think that such was probably the case. It was not a big drop, perhaps, but any drop is serious when steady progress is what we should be looking for. Two features in the accounts which give us cause for thankfulness are that the quota to the Diocese has been paid in full, and that for the first time receipts are shown from a day of prayer and gifts for missions for which the Council was responsible.

The coming month will be a great one in the history of the Church, for the Hallowing of the diocese and cathedral church is to take place during its last week. In the magazine you will find a "hallowing leaflet." Please study it well. It sets forth in detail a great series of services at S. Martin's, at one or other of which I hope we shall be able to take a part. It shows too, in every case, how admission may be obtained. At some of the services you are directed to apply to the clergy for tickets. If you are able to attend any of those, please do not hesitate to bombard me with requests. Also a medal has been struck, and is obtainable in various sizes and prices—to be worn as a token. I hope that many will secure one during the week.

The preparations for the Hallowing Week have entailed enormous labour upon our

Archdeacons and others which I hope will be rewarded by a large and enthusiastic response.

The Annual Vestry and Church Meetings.—Held in the Schools on Thursday, January 20, at 7 p.m. Present: 40 (20 men and 20 women). The Vicar nominated Mr. E. B. Fewkes his warden and the meeting elected Mr. C. Adams as theirs. This with the usual, but none the less appropriate and well deserved expressions of confidence, concluded the business of the Vestry. The annual Church Meeting followed forthwith. The secretary of the retiring Council gave his report of the Council's work. Mr. C. Adams, as one of the joint treasurers appointed by the Council, presented the Council's statement of accounts for the past year. This is published overleaf. **SIDESMEN:** Resolved that the number be 12. Nominations were 15, and a ballot followed. The names of those returned appear above. **RURI-DECANAL REPRESENTATIVES:** Three were nominated; a ballot followed and the two whose names appear above were returned. **COUNCIL:** In addition to the Vicar, Churchwardens, and Ruri-Decanal representation, who are ex-officio members, ten were required to be elected. Nominations were 12; a ballot followed. The names of those returned appear above. The meeting closed with open discussion of various points of interest, and with prayer.

Missionary School Follow-up Conference.—This was held on January 17th. 20 were present. The following definite points were agreed upon as the outcome of the school:

1. A Missionary circulating library to be formed. 15 present agreed to join. Mr. Mervyn D. Jones accepted the secretaryship.

2. A service of Missionary Intercession (with collection) to be held on the 1st Wednesday in each month at 7-0.

3. The distribution of further missionary boxes to be pressed and the Sunday Schools be asked to have a box for each class.

4. The proposition to be laid before the Church Council that the Missionary Committee for the parish should be a sub-committee of the Council, to report periodically.

My dear friends,

Writing in the midst of Hallowing Week, I must express the general feeling of thankfulness that prevails. God has enabled us of this county to accomplish the task which was undertaken in the belief that it was His will. In the cathedral which has now been hallowed we are taking part in a series of crowded and inspiring services. In every parish of our compact and workable diocese now hallowed we should feel a new movement of the Holy Spirit. Eastward, westward, northward, southward, the Bishop in the act of hallowing made the sign of the cross in token that there should be no part of the Diocese to which there should not come the grace and salvation of Christ's Holy Cross.

Very fittingly, Lent follows immediately upon the Hallowing. So let us think of our Lent as a time of individual self-hallowing. Corporate activity and a corporate spirit are splendid things, but it is all so much megalomania unless the individual draws nearer to God. Let us one and all do that in Lent. Let us each put a finger upon some very weak spot (be content with one) in our life and by God's grace make it strong. The weak spot may be in respect of morning prayers, Bible reading, or communions. It may be some habit that already too long we have allowed to insult us. Whatever it is, think it over quietly and make some plan of attack upon it. "Be still then, and know that I am God."

Below will be found a summary of offerings to Missions Overseas during 1926. I am very thankful that during the year of the "World Call" our amount is considerably in excess of previous years. It is interesting to note the two causes to which the increase may be traced. They are entirely different in character. One is the introduction of a "Day of Prayer and Gifts" (long may it continue!); the other is that the Secretary of the Missionary Guild opened the boxes twice during the year instead of once! I have said that I am thankful for the increase. I cannot say less, but I dare not say more in the face of the far greater sacrifices to which we must yet attain.
