My dear Friends,

The subject of the Revised Prayer Book is very much in everybody's minds. Indeed it should be. It is a very momentous thing to revise a book which is such an old and treasured possession. But it is hardly to be expected that a living Church could be completely satisfied with a book for worship which has seen no revision since the year 1662. We should all familiarise ourselves well with the ideas underlying the present revision and with the contents of the Book as revised. These were fully discussed at our recent meeting and I cannot speak in any detail of them now. But there are two things to be quite clear about. 1. The revised Book will contain our present book unchanged as well as the proposed alternatives, and each Parish (through its incumbent and Church Council) will decide whether it will hold to the old or adopt the revision. 2. The Revised Book has yet to go before the Church Assembly for approval and after that to Parliament, probably in the late Autumn, before it will receive authority. The issue is a very grave and far-reaching one both for Church and State and I hope that the most serious thinking and praying will be given to it.

The Provost of the Cathedral, in order to bring the Diocese into closer touch with the Cathedral is inviting parties from the Parishes to pay visits to the Cathedral. These parties will be referred to as "Parochial Pilgrimages." The Provost or one of the Canons will give a talk about the Cathedral, its history and architecture and a service of intercession with an address will be held. Our Church Council have considered the matter and arrangements have been made for a Parochial Pilgrimage from Quorn on Thursday, July 21st. Conveyances will leave the Cross at 7 p.m. The Pilgrimage will afford a useful opportunity for associating ourselves more closely with the wider life of the Diocese and I hope that a great many will join the party. Members of the Church Council will be gathering in names.

We hope to have a concert on the Vicarage Lawn on Monday, July 25th., at 7 p.m. This is becoming a very enjoyable summer event. If it could be enjoyed apart from the anxiety of money-raising I should be very thankful. But,

alas, that cannot be. There is that £40 which the Managers want for the proper heating of the Infants' School before the Autumn Term, of which I spoke to you last month. It is an urgent need.

Parochial Church Council.—Notes of meeting held on June 10th. All present but one, who was excused. (1) Collections fixed, September 11th, Fabric Fund; September 25th (Harvest Festival). Hospitals. (2) Parochial Pilgrimage: Letter from Provost of Cathedral read. Resolved to fall in with proposal and dates suggested. (3) Day of Prayer and Gifts: Amount received, £14 4s. 1d.; allocated thus, two-fifths to C.M.S., two-fifths to S.P.G., one-fifth to St. Cuthbert, Tsolo, after subtracting ear-marked contributions. (4) Revised Prayer Book. Resolution passed as recorded. (5) Next meeting, September 22nd.

The Revised Prayer Book.—The Vicar introduced the subject at a meeting held on June 15th, at which 23 people were present. Questions were asked and a discussion took place. A resolution of general approval was passed, nobody voting against it, but a few abstaining from voting. At a subsequent meeting of the Church Council at which all were present but one the following resolution was carried unanimously, "That this Council approves the proposed revision of the Prayer Book as a whole, and believes it is in the interest of the Church and nation that the Prayer Book measure should become law." At a meeting of the Diocesan Conference held on June 23rd, when a whole day was given to the subject, a resolution to the same effect, moved by Colonel R. E. Martin and seconded by Canon Linwood Wright was carried. Clergy for 135, against 28; Laity for 87, against 28.

Intercessions.—The mid-week intercessions have lapsed somewhat of late. Let us pick them up again during July. Every Wednesday there will be a celebration of Holy Communion

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My dear Friends,

The Choir Outing.—On Thursday, August 11th the choir boys had their annual outing to Skegness, going by 'bus. We started from the Vicarage at 6 a.m. and arrived at Skegness at 10-15. The ride was very interesting; we went through Mountsorrel, Syston, and then through Melton and from Melton to Grantham. Before we got to Grantham we had a good view of Belvoir Castle. Another interesting place was the Grantham aerodrome. From Grantham we went to Boston and stopped at Boston Stump, but the church was not open; we stopped about 10 minutes in Boston and then went on to Skegness. About a mile out of Skegness we saw the soldiers of the Leicestershire Regiment who were in camp. When we arrived at Skegness we all walked down to the sands and found a place to put our things. When we had stayed there a few minutes and the Vicar had told us the arrangements we all went for a paddle till about 11-30, which was the time fixed for our dinner. After dinner we went for a bathe and I am sure we all enjoyed it very much. After the bathe we all went where we liked, some of us to the amusements and some to the boating pool. Down the road to the amusements the Skegness U.D.C. are building an open-air bathing pool; when we saw the workmen last they were building the cabins. At 3-30 p.m. we all assembled at the Clock-Tower and then went down to Greenwood's cafe for a meat tea. After tea we went again to the amusements, this time the figure eight being the chief interest. Before we went down to the amusements we saw Mr. L. Facer, of Quorn, who was giving an exhibition on dancing in the Cafe Dansant. After we had been down to the amusements we went to the Lifeboat house and saw the Lifeboat, which was all in readiness: it is called "Samuel Lewis" and is manned by fifteen men, whose appliances are hung up ready to be put on at a minute's notice. The Lifeboat is pulled by a caterpillar tractor from its shed to the sea, and a practice is held every quarter. At 6 p.m. we started for

My dear Friends,

I think it may be worth while to print here the following words in the preface to the Prayer Book, written in the year 1661: "The curate that ministereth in every Parish Church, being at home, and not being otherwise reasonably hindered, shall say the Morning and Evening Prayer in the Parish Church where he ministereth and shall cause a bell to be tolled thereunto a convenient time before he begin, that the people may come to hear God's word and to pray with him."

It has always been my aim to obey this regulation daily at 10 a.m. and 6-30 p.m. Many of you who are observant will know that I very often fail to do so, and you will conclude that the reason is some hindrance, reasonable or otherwise. That is so. There are many reasonable hindrances, such as extra parochial engagements, and these tend rather to increase, and there are sometimes hindrances which might be overcome. But I feel very strongly that such a regulation should not be treated as obsolete, and I intend to continue to observe it to the best of my power. It is good for me to have my regular hours, and I do not give up cherishing the hope of finding one or more to pray with me.

I am very glad that the Church Council, as you will see in the notes below, have adopted the recommendation of their Missionary Committee to organise another Missionary School in the near future. The school will be similar in its general plan to that held last year, but the lectures will be of a different character, being based upon the World-Call reports. The School will consist of six sessions, held on the Thursdays, beginning Nov. 10th. As before, we shall begin early to make up our membership, and we shall encourage as many as possible who have a reasonable hope of attendance throughout to enrol as members. I very much hope that the lectures, dealing as they will with Africa, the Far East, India, the Moslem world, and our own people overseas, will appeal to a large number.

Those who saw the Folk Dancing of Miss Bailey's pupils at the Summer Fête will be glad to know that she is going to give an entertainment in the Village Hall on Oct. 26th, in aid of the Church Room Fund. This should prove a very happy and profitable event.

In the departure of Mr. W. Spencer we are losing a very regular worshipper and dependable sidesman. We wish him and such of his family as go with him to St. Ives, Hunts., every happiness in their new home and Church life.

My dear Friends,—

The month opens with All Saints' Day, closes with St. Andrew, and has in its course the modern commemoration known as Armistice Day. It is a month indeed in which our thoughts are attracted far beyond the near circumference of the Church Militant here in earth. May they travel thither freely and gladly, not merely in contemplation of that communion and fellowship which is ours with those who have finished their earthly course, but with the resolve that all the examples of sacrifice which enrich the history of the past shall encourage and inspire us to-day.

On Armistice Day, we shall meet together at the Village Memorial. A few minutes before 11 we shall sing, "O God, our Help in ages past," the two minutes of silence we shall use for our silent prayer, and a very short united service will follow, led by the Baptist Minister and myself. At 7-0 p.m. we shall have a service of remembrance and thanksgiving in Church.

The programme of the Missionary School will be found immediately below. I confess to a little anxiety as to the membership. It has been difficult to fix a suitable evening and we know that the Thursdays chosen have excluded some who were keen to be members. But there should be many left who desire to

hear the call to our Church sounding in Our Lord's name from the distant parts of the world. The procedure adopted at these schools is somewhat different from that of ordinary meetings. We do not merely announce them and leave the attendance to chance. We approach individuals, we ask them to enrol themselves as members if they have a reasonable prospect of attendance throughout the course. Moreover, each session has the nature of a school. After each lecture we are subdivided into groups, each with its special question arising out of the lecture, for group discussion. I think that a membership of 30 is the least that we should be satisfied with and I hope that many who read this will seriously consider, both from the point of view of duty and advantage to be gained, whether they should not set aside these six Thursdays as sacred to the Missionary cause and come to the School.

I have written some notes on matters concerning our Day and Sunday Schools to which I ask your attention.

My dear Friends,

The movement of events keeps our minds from stagnating. Ever-changing times and seasons make for great variety of emphasis. Look now this way, they say, and now that, and again upon some quite other view of life and truth. "Keep moving" is the advice of the Calendar to our minds in the language of the traffic controller, and in the language of Holy Writ, "Gird up the loins of your mind."

And so we move on once more to Christmas. We prepare our minds to receive the particular message. We shall specialize, for a time, on the thought that peace comes to men of goodwill; at least, that where there is good will there is the atmosphere in which he who labours for peace may have good hope of success. Let us pray for good will in every individual heart, sweetening all personal relationships, and for the same in the corporate heart of every group, and party and nation. This latter is not so easy, and yet it is surely right that a body of Christian people should have the conscience of one Christian man and woman, and it certainly is not beyond the power of the Holy Spirit to create such a conscience.

The falling of Christmas Day upon a Sunday is, I believe, more welcome to Clergy than to Churchwardens. Personally, I am glad of it, for reasons that are perhaps selfish, but I believe that something, too, may be gained by the coincidence. The religious character of the day stands a better chance of coming into its own. May I submit the following as the order of the day in an average home? Parents and elder children will come to one of the early Communion. In the middle part of the day, from 12 a.m. to 6 p.m., everybody will be at home. Then fathers and mothers with their children, a little satiated with home by this time, will sally forth to Church, where the worship and the old hymns and carols will speak peace and gladness to their hearts.

Some of our minds have been rather active lately in this matter of hymn singing. Our choir, with some other choirs in the Deanery, having learnt certain chosen hymns from the book, "Songs of Praise," attended a hymn festival in Loughborough Parish Church and

listened to a lecture, which our singing was to illustrate, by Mr. Martin Shaw. It was a very delightful and helpful occasion, though I dare say some were provoked when old friends were attacked. We do not, of course, pretend that henceforth we can pass an infallible judgment on the value of any hymn tune. But we did at least get a clear idea of some of the essential features of a good tune which will assist our judgment. Moreover, the improvement of congregational singing was dealt with by the lecturer and some methods suggested. I do love to hear a congregation sing and wish that many of you would sing more lustily. Loudness, of course, is not everything, but the present volume of sound heard in the church might well be doubled without any harm. Of this perhaps more anon. One definite direction may I be allowed to give. When you hear a descant introduced into some of our Christmas favourites, i.e., when you hear the trebles forsaking the melody and singing unexpected notes, you must one and all hold fast to the melody, no harmony, please, but just the melody firm and strong.
