My Dear Friends,

I wish you all a very happy new year. May all the things that matter most be yours in great store.

I am glad to tell you that the Bishop will hold a Confirmation in our church on March 25th. I hope I may have the privilege of preparing a large number of candidates. Confirmation is described in the Prayer Book as "the laying on of hands upon those that are baptised and come to years of discretion." I do not like to press confirmation on any, but I do very much welcome all opportunities to speak about it to those who approach me either on their own behalf or on behalf of others. After evensong on Sunday, January 12th, I should be glad to see all who wish to be confirmed so that we may talk over the times for the preparation classes.

On Sunday, November 24th, we remembered before God a former vicar of this Parish of whose passing on we had just heard. Robert Colquhoun Faithfull was inducted to this living on S. Peter's Day, 1828, by Bishop Mitehinson, Archdeacon of Leicester, and he held the living till May, 1892. Of recent years he endured much physical suffering and at the time of his death, which took place at a nursing home in Bournemouth on November 18th, he had been bereaved of all who were nearest to him. His ministry here is now far distant and was brief in duration, but there are amongst us those who have happy memories of it and him. May he rest in peace.

You have all, I believe, received a full statement as to the purposes of the Bishop's Fund with a red slip attached to it setting forth what we propose to do in this parish towards it. Some welcome contributions have already been received and from time to time a statement as to these will be published. We have now a full five years in which to raise our £250 and I hope and believe that if we set our minds to it we shall have no difficulty in achieving our purpose. Dedication of the Church Room.—On S. Thomas' Day, December 21st, the new Church Room was dedicated by the Venerable W. P. Hurrell, Archdeacon of Loughborough. Evensong was sung in Church at 3.0 and after the lesson the congregation, led by the cross and choir, proceeded to the Church Room, singing hymn 215. The morning had broken wild and stormy, but at the time of the service the wind had fallen and there was quite a good sunshine for the time of the year. Inside the Room hymn 189 was sung and after the offering of prayer by the Vicar, the Archdeacon dedicated the building with the words, "In the faith of Jesus Christ we dedicate this building to the glory of God in the Name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, Amen." After the singing of hymn 261, we returned to Church for the conclusion of Evensong. The address of the Archdeacon before the closing hymn and blessing, struck a very helpful and practical note. He spoke of the part which a Church Room should play in the family life of the Church and emphasised in particular its value for recreation and education. Tea was ready when the service was over and once again the congregation adjourned to the Room and sat down, a party of 86. The Vicar, during tea, thanked the Archdeacon for his friendly and helpful visit. He expressed the thanks of all to those who had any part in the building of so splendid a Room and the hope that it would be of great usefulness in the future. He also referred to an old friend, Ernest Clarendon Laundon, whose zeal for the cause had been mainly responsible for the forward push in the year 1922, without which the work would be still far from accomplished. Later in the evening, from 7.0 to 10.30, a social gathering took place and by the time the day was over we felt that the room had been thoroughly warmed and was admirably adapted for its purpose. And so to bed, tired and thankful.

Church Room Furnishing, etc.—We asked for 120 chairs. These were ordered in faith and were in the room at the opening. Actually promises of 129 have been received; our best thanks to all the donors. On the building itself there is no debt, which is a great cause

of thankfulness. There are, however, other things to be done to make the surroundings of the room worthy of it and the neighbourhood. The Committee have two events in view which we hope will be remembered. There will be rummage sale in the room on Friday, January 24th and a social and dance on Shrove Tuesday, March 4th.

Asphalting of the School Playground.—We are able to go forward to the tune of £30 during the holidays. For this the managers are indebted to Mr. J. Martin for the proceeds of his entertainment on November 27th which amounted to £11 and to the Mothers' Union for £20, the proceeds of their sale on December 10th. To those who were responsible for both these undertakings we wish to express our great thanks. There will remain much to be done before the work is completed, but there is at least a prospect that the County Education Authority will help us with it before long. Here let us remember that there is only one argument for our voluntary expenditure on our schools, namely, that we value and wish to maintain their definitely religious character.

Church Room.—At a meeting of the Committee, held on January 20th, the important office of Church Room Secretary was offered to and accepted by Mr. C. Joiner. We welcome him to this office most gladly. Applications for lettings should be made to him. The temporary appointment of Mrs. Waling (4, Post Office Yard), as caretaker has also been made and she is proving most helpful and efficient.

A Whist Drive towards the further funds needed is being organised by Mr. F. Halford, Mrs. Penfold and Miss Bradley for February 13th, and a Social and Dance for Shrove Tuesday is in the hands of Mr. T. Pilkington, Miss Firr and Miss Flanders. Meanwhile the G.F.S. candidates and members have thoroughly established themselves in the Room as their headquarters and the room is gradually finding its use in our ordinary parochial life.

Some notes of the past month.

The programme of Christmas music given by the choir on the afternoon of the Sunday after Christmas appears to have been very much enjoyed. Mr. Murray Rumsey's "Comfort ye" and "Every Valley" gave him his opportunity and was finely sung. In "Nazareth" Mr. C.

Joiner revived an old favourite and he rendered it well and faithfully. At the organ Miss Callis was dependable and true, as she always is, and the choir were well on the spot in their choruses. Two new descants were introduced in "O Come all ye Faithful" and "See amid the Winter Snow."

The Christmas party for the Sunday School children was held in the Church Room on the Saturday after Christmas. We were in some doubt as to the room's capacity for the party. We have always anticipated that for our largest gatherings the Village Hall would be in request. We were certainly all very near together, but there is something to be said for that, and it was undoubtedly a very happy party. The children did most of their own entertaining, short recitations were fired off one after another in a most amusing manner. Many thanks to the superintendents and teachers and to Mrs. J. Martin for her supervision of the tea.

The adult party was held in the Village Hall on Monday, the 30th. It was voted to be one of the happiest of these Christmas gatherings of recent years. It certainly is arranged year by year in a manner which helps sociability and draws together people of all ages. The main responsibility of getting up the party was kindly accepted by Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Fewkes and the Mothers' Union once again earned our gratitude by both providing and serving the refreshments. All the items of the variety entertainment were much enjoyed and no one will mind if we make special mention of Le Butt's violin solos (surely he will do well) and Peter Brookman's lightning sketches, a welcome novelty. During the holidays 230 square yards of tar-granite was laid in the school playground, the portion already laid in the girls' playground being extended to just beyond the infants' door, the boys' playground receiving the rest. The surface has yet to be sealed, which will be done at the proper time. There is still as much again of the playground to be covered and made serviceable.

The Sunday School prizegiving service took place in Church on Sunday, January 19th, at 2.30. Our aim at present is to make these

The children are becoming quite familiar with Merbecke's responses and the singing of psalms and magnificat without the lead of a choir is quite creditably done. We welcomed the Rev. G. E. Alvis, who came in the middle of a busy Sunday and spoke a few helpful words to the children on the boyhood of Jesus.

Always on the first Sunday in the month at 2.30 we hold a general children's service. May we say how much we should welcome the attendance of parents with their children, also of any children who do not belong to our Sunday Schools.

On Sunday, the 19th, we offered prayer at every service for the blessing of God upon the labours of the conference about to assemble in London to consider the reduction of naval armaments. This is another of those great post war international efforts to strengthen and establish the foundations of peace and goodwill. May the delegates be given in full measure the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

The name of Dr. Nansen is one of the greatest of our generation. Known well to us in days gone by as scientist and explorer he is now devoting his later years, as High Commissioner for Refugees to the League of Nations, to the relief of suffering with utter impartiality wherever it is found. His life's story was brought before us at a recent meeting of the League of Nations Union by Mrs. Alun Jones. For such men we should thank God.

Adams, was absent through illness and a very hearty vote of thanks to him for his faithful and conscientious services for the last five years was passed. My dear Friends,

The Church Council of 1928, you will remember, was unanimously opposed to the extension, and its opposition was supported by a majority of a general meeting of Churchpeople. The present Council has, by a majority, re-affirmed its opposition, but, as you know, has expressed its willingness that another Parochial Church Meeting should be called to ascertain whether it has the general support of Churchpeople. This meeting will be announced in due course, and all who are on the Electoral Roll will be summoned to it. I do most earnestly pray, and I ask you to pray too, that we may be guided aright, and that we may ultimately do what will be good both for the church and the village.

May I express the hope that you will all unite in observing Ascension Day once again as a Day of Prayer and Gifts for Missions Overseas. Will you help to make it a day of prayer, either by being present at one or other of the services or by putting your name down on the chart which will be in the porch for a period of private prayer? And will you help to swell the day's offerings by bringing with you the envelope which you will shortly receive with an offering in it worthy of the greatest of all causes, namely, the growth of God's Kingdom unto the uttermost parts of the earth?

We have had a very happy Easter, and I thank you all once again for a substantial Easter offering.

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My dear Friends,—

I think my notes below will serve as a general comment on affairs. You will see certain important matters referred to in the Church Council minutes. Especially I ask you to note the day and time of the Parochial Church Meeting for the further consideration of the Churchyard Extension question. I hope that the meeting will be well attended and that we shall all bring to bear upon the discussion the very best of our judgment. The Bishop's Fund, you will see, is rather slow in getting its grip upon us, and it may be that we shall have to take other steps to command the rightness and urgency of its appeal.

I hope that Whitsuntide, the Festival of the Holy Spirit will be faithfully observed by us. "He shall lead you into all truth," was the promise of Jesus concerning the Holy Spirit, so we who wish to be led thither know to Whom to turn. The early Christians, I think, laid great stress upon this. They seem, if we understand the 'Acts' aright, to have been moved this way and that by the Holy Spirit. Perhaps S. Paul sums up the earliest idea of what a Christian is, when he said "As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the Sons of God." If that is so, we can test the reality of our own religion. At least we may be thankful that we have the root of the matter in us if we are looking for, and following, the promptings of the Holy Spirit. This Whitsuntide thought I offer you.
