Christmas.—Falling on a Monday, the festival commenced, as the church designs that such great days should, with a well attended evensong on the eve. Worship, as always, occupied the forenoon of Christmas day from an early hour and for the rest of the day the home asserted its strong and customary claim. May church and home hold our affections all the more deeply for the Christmas that is passed.

The Christmas parties, too, have carried on the tradition of the season. Miss Moore, with her staff gave the infants a jolly time on the breaking up day, the Sunday School teachers gathered their children for tea and games on the Saturday after Christmas, and the adult party, on the 28th, was made merry with the Bric-a-Bracs and dancing that followed.

The Annual Meeting.—The annual Vestry and Parochial Church meeting will be held on February 5th. But it is not too early to mention three resolutions in connection with it which were passed at the last meeting

of the Church Council: (i) "That electors be invited to nominate members of the Church Council in writing beforehand." Forms of nomination will be found in the church. They should be signed by two electors and the nominee should also sign his or her consent to be nominated. These forms should be sent to the secretary. Of course a nomination made in order at the time of the meeting will also be valid. (ii) "That the affairs of the Church Room be in future under the management of the Church Council through a sub-committee. And that the present Church Room Committee be asked to submit to the Church Council a constitution of the committee." (iii) This relates to the belfry which has lately been inspected by John Taylor and Son. In a very careful report the firm recommends considerable repairs, amounting to a cost of over £100. The Church Council, with the assistance of the superintendent of the bellringers' guild and the steeple keeper, have adopted the report as satisfactory and will recommend its adoption by the electors and will refer to them the question of procedure.

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My dear Friends,

I think you will have received by this time a notice of the Annual Vestry and Parochial Church Meetings, to be held on February 5th, at 7-0. You will see that in addition to the normal business there are some other matters of unusual importance to be brought forward. We have Messrs. John Taylor's report of the bells to consider; also the question of putting the management of the Church Room on a proper constitutional footing. The consideration of the Treasurer's statement of accounts will be facilitated by their insertion in this magazine, which please bring with you. I hope we shall have a large attendance.

I am grateful to the members of the Council who have revised the electoral roll in their districts. Forty-six new names have been added and the usual necessary alterations made. This has enabled the Keeper of the Roll, Mr. H. J. Hicks, to bring the roll up to date and keep it in his usual exemplary manner.

In Lent we should enjoy a comparative rest from the social and institutional claims which in the season just passing have been very insistent. We have yet a few days to think how we will use this Lent, so that hereafter we may have cause to be thankful for it. I have asked the Ven. J. Mackay to give a course of addresses on the Wednesdays, beginning on the 21st, at 7-30. This he has consented to do. I hope that the members of the Mothers' Union will attend this service. They are at present listening to what is called "The Call to Renewal," and there is perhaps no better phrase in which to describe the meaning of Lent for us all. The prayer in the Christmas collect that we may "Daily be renewed by Thy Holy Spirit" is oddly enough as suitable for Lent as for Christmas. Shall we make this our special Lenten prayer and aim?

I am preparing 15 candidates for the Confirmation to be held at Woodhouse Eaves on March 1st, at 8-0. Please give them the benefit of your prayers.

The Church Room Programme.

There is one more social event, namely a Whist Drive and Dance on Shrove Tuesday,

February 13th, at 7-15, price 1/3 inclusive. The Church Workers' Party, on January 9th, was a very happy affair. Including helpers there were in all about 90 present. Colonel Toller (people's warden) presided and Mr. Murray Rumsey was M.C. for the games that followed refreshments. These were in the capable and willing hands that the Church Room Committee can always put into its kitchen.

The Debates have maintained their popularity. The series of six, just over, has continued to draw large attendances, and the last was followed by a demand for more. Those present have expressed their appreciation of the efforts of the principal speakers and of those who have followed. Fresh speakers have come forward. A considerable number still refrain from voting. By a very close majority the following decisions have been arrived at in the second half of the series: "That the value of sport is over-estimated," "That conferences have not proved themselves useless," "That summertime is not an unnecessary evil."

The Church Room statement of accounts for 1933 will be found below. One big item of expenditure has been the cost of the fence, which now completely encloses our ground. On the receipt side there has been a falling off of private lettings, but the handsome contribution of the women's afternoon whist drives has cancelled this deficiency and gone a long way towards paying for the fence. The Committee has recently thanked its Secretary (Mr. C. Joiner) for his services. Those thanks are most thoroughly deserved.

G.F.S.—Two unusually pleasing events have taken place this month. On January 17th a welcome was given to Mrs. Farnham, a president of bygone days, whose return to Quorn has been hailed with pleasure on all sides. The presence of many old girls who remembered our guest nearly half a century ago was a very pleasant feature of the evening. So also was the display of work which the present members have made, as in other years, for the lying in Hospital. Mrs. Toller reported on the Society's work and offered Mrs. Farnham the welcome, to which, in her charming manner, she replied. The other

Sunday Schools.—We have welcomed a new teacher in Mr. Arthur Markham, and we are hoping shortly to fill one of our vacancies in the girls' classes. Will someone volunteer for the other? Teachers' classes have been re-opened and the response so far is encouraging. The Prize-giving took place on Sunday, the 14th. The superintendents had made the usual preparations, which are a considerable tax upon their time and thought. The carols were from the University Book, and were quite well sung.

A Parcel for the Mission Field.—In addition to the work mentioned above for home needs, the Missionary Working Party have just sent off to the S.P.G. the results of their work since they were formed last autumn. The articles were on show the other afternoon in the Church Room and a fine useful lot they were. The S.P.G. will send them abroad, where they will be of the greatest use.

The League of Nations' Union.—At a recent monthly meeting some of the secondary and less known branches of League activity were dealt with by the speaker, Mr. G. Keith Thomson. Amongst these was the drug traffic. A new drug convention had been framed in 1933, which had subsequently been ratified by most nations. By this for the first time the manufacturing of a product would be completely subordinated to humanitarian and moral consideration. In the matter of the health activities of the League, the speaker quoted Italy's testimony that they had helped them to wipe out their malaria and Roumania's that they had helped them to halve their infant mortality.

My dear Friends,

The first Communion of the newly confirmed will be at 8 o'clock on Sunday, March 18th. May I invite you to come with them. Some of you will be reminded of your own Confirmation and first Communion. Will you too, especially if you have grown careless, prepare yourself and come.

Our annual meeting recorded below has once again launched us upon the work of the year with faithful workers about us and with two most trustworthy Churchwardens. The deficit reported on our general account was disquieting. The best way of avoiding this in future will be to build up the Free-will Offering Fund. By this means members of the Church become regular subscribers to the Church Expenses Account to ensure an income irrespective of the collections made in Church. My Warden is for the time being acting as secretary for this, and has already made some progress since the meeting.

The meeting also had to consider the report on the bells made by John Taylor and Co. Nothing of any great account has been done to the bells since the peal was completed in 1886. Now, as a result of general wear and tear, repairs and improvements (such as ball bearings) are required which will cost £120. The meeting adopted the report and instructed the Church Council to consider ways and means and summon a general meeting. The Council is considering the launching of an appeal after Easter.

Holy Week and Easter come early this year. Through the Lenten devotions and disciplines we approach them. May our reverent thankful observance of these days be a witness to the world of that loyalty to our Lord which embraces but surpasses all other loyalties. The Annual Vestry and Parochial Church Meeting was held in the Church Room on Monday, February 5th, at 7-0. Present: 54 electors. The Vicar nominated Mr. W. Branford to be his Warden and Colonel W. S. N. Toller was elected People's Warden. Both these gentlemen were thanked for their past

services. The People's Warden read a statement of accounts for the year 1933. The general account showed a deficit of £20 17s. 11d., the Fabric Fund a balance of £55 10s. 3d., the Sick and Poor a balance of £8 1s. 11d., the Auxiliary Fund for care of the Churchyard a balance of £16 6s. 4d. Mr. Murray Rumsey, on behalf of the Missionary Sub-Committee, read a statement of the amounts from box-holders, etc., which passed through his hands, and Mr. H. J. Hicks stated that the Bishop's Fund in the parish had received up to date £127, and that outstanding promises would bring it up to £140. The accounts as audited were received with thanks to the auditor, Mr. W. Shenton. The Church Council and Sidesmen were duly elected, and their names appear above. Two resolutions of which notice had been given were carried.

The DISMANTLING and RE-HANGING of the CHURCH BELLS.

Many people in the Parish are already aware:

1. That the well-known firm of Bellfounders, John Taylor and Co., of Loughborough, have recently inspected our bells on the invitation of the Church Council.

2. That they have issued a very carefully prepared report which recommends the renewal of the pivots on which the bells swing, the replacement of the bearings by new ones of the ball-bearing pattern, and other repairs and replacements connected mainly with the rope wheels and iron fastenings. All this amounts to the dismantling and re-hanging of the bells. Nothing short of this, they say, will really place the bells in safe and proper ringing order.

3. That the Church Council have, with the assistance of the ringers, satisfied themselves that the report should be adopted, and that on their recommendation the Parochial Church Meeting passed a resolution adopting it on February 5 last.

The Church Council has now given careful consideration to the matter and has decided forthwith to invite donations towards the sum of £120, which is John Taylor's estimate for all the repairs which they consider necessary to place the peal in really good order for many years to come.

At the wish of the Council the Vicar launched the appeal in church on Sunday, April 15. It is hoped that this circulation of it in the magazine will further bring it to the notice of parishioners.

It is perhaps not to be wondered at that we should be faced at the present with a heavy expenditure of this kind, for since the year 1886, when Mr. W. E. B. Farnham gave the two bells which completed the peal of eight, and the parish at the same time raised a considerable sum for repairs, no very great expense has been laid upon us in the matter of the bells.

Moreover we are confident that the bells play a part in Church and village life, in the hands of our keen band of ringers, the discontinuance of which would be much lamented. So will as many of you, please, as feel this, help us to get the work done quickly by sending to one of us your contribution, large or small.

NOTES FOR MAY.

May 7, 8, 9. — These are known, for centuries past, as *Rogation Days*. As days of prayer they form a fitting approach to Ascensiontide. We should use them by asking God's blessing on the fruits of the earth. Other subjects of prayer suitable to the season may be found in the different verses of hymn 142.

May 10 is *Ascension Day*. It is the one great festival of the Church which falls on a working day. On it we commemorate the event thus described by S. Luke (xxiv 51): "It came to pass while He blessed them, He was parted from them, and carried up into Heaven."

According to our custom we shall keep it as a day of *Prayer and Gifts for Missions Overseas*. Please try to be present at one or other of our services or put your name down on the chart in the porch for a period of private prayer. And please place an offering in the envelope which has been left at your house. We received the gospel from missionaries such as Aidan and Augustine in days gone by. We should in our turn send missionaries to gather in the harvest of souls to-day.

Services on *Ascension Day*.—Holy Communion 6-30 and 8-0, Mattins 10-0, Litany 12-0, Mothers' Union 3-0, Children 5-0, Choral Evensong 7-30.

May 20 is *Whit Sunday* (or *Whitsun Day*). It is the festival of the Holy Spirit. Hymns 156, 157 or 209 are beautiful prayers of preparation for it. As a day of Communion it might well rank as high as Easter.

Holy Communion 7-30, 9-30 (choral) and 12-0.

May 23, 25, and 26.—These are known as *Ember Days*. Men called to the Ministry of the Church are about to be ordained, and we should give them our thought and prayers.

May 27 is *Trinity Sunday*. It concludes the first half of the Church's year. For our understanding of God, as Creator, Redeemer, Sanctifier, given us in Jesus Christ we render thanks.

The Churchyard. — As the result of the response to our appeal for an auxiliary fund for the care of the churchyard we have been able for some months past to employ Mr. Cecil Clarke for one extra day a week. Already a large amount of levelling has been done and by degrees we hope that the scythe, and in parts the mowing machine, will be able to do their work much more effectively than in the past.
