Loughborough Hospital Contributory Scheme.—The Quorn Committee are anxious that the scheme should be understood, especially as it affects those who are not contributors through their place of business. A contribution of 2d. a week paid by the head of a working-class family secures treatment at the hospital for all the non-working members of the family. The Quorn Committee meets on the first Wednesday of each month at the Mills Institute at 7-30, at which time Mr. J. J. Stirling, the Hon. Sec., or Mr. F. W. Bailey will be glad to enrol members and receive contributions which, however, may be paid weekly or periodically if so desired. The Governors of the Hospital wish it to be understood that only in exceptional cases (when vouchers may be obtainable from personal or corporate subscribers such as religious bodies) can treatment at the Hospital be received by non-contributors without payment of two guineas per week. To join the Contributory Scheme is therefore greatly to the advantage of all concerned.
