My dear Friends,

You will see that the pointing of the Tower is finished and that now the work is being extended to other parts of the church. While this is being done we feel all the more sympathy with those parishes whose churches have been so badly damaged by lightning in the recent storms.

Also you will notice below that the Organ Cleaning Fund is mounting steadily. We hope that it will be possible to put the work in hand not later than the early autumn.

The notes that follow suggest that the children are to have the greater part of our attention this month. For different reasons it has seemed good to put the Sunday School Treat into this month instead of making it a part of the Patronal Festival as in the past. In this connection I owe an apology to the Church Council for prematurely asking their consideration of dates which subsequently have been altered. The prolonged daylight of July compared with late August seems to justify the change, in fact our Patron Saint's date is a difficult one to accommodate ourselves to.

The Children's Festival remains at its accustomed time, the last Sunday in July. Our own Sunday Schools and their children are our chief thought on that day. The children will be in full evidence at the services, they will sing the hymns they are practising and the collections will be for the Sunday Schools. But I hope we shall remember the object we set before ourselves when we started these festivals in 1928, which was that we might have a day on which all that concerns child-life everywhere should be the subject of our thanksgivings and prayers.

I should be grateful if the members of the Church Council will take note of the paragraph below that chiefly concerns them. We shall need quite these two meetings if we are to give really thoughtful consideration to the questions which the Bishop has suggested to us.

I hope to be away on holiday from July 13th to 25th.

A Disappointment.—As already recorded the Missionary Working Party, during last winter, made a lot of beautiful articles and forwarded them to the S.P.G. who in their turn undertook to place them according to their suitability in different parts of the Mission field. Unfortunately the parcel on its way to London was involved in a railway accident due to a latent defect in a coupling and the package, the Railway Company tell us, was rendered unrecognisable, and the contents badly damaged. Our Secretary valued the goods at £15 and made a claim to that amount. The Company, however, as carriers, say that they were fully protected, but they have met us in the loss, without prejudice, to the extent of £7 10s. The S.P.G. have written a most sympathetic letter and have acknowledged with thanks the £7 10s, which they have added to their freightage fund.

My dear Friends,

Since I last wrote, our organ, with its all but a thousand pipes, has been scattered all over the church, and the dust of 39 years has been evacuated. In addition to this tuning slides have been fixed to the pipes, which will enable the yearly tuning to be done in a more up to date manner. You will remember that the cost of all this is £40, and that we appealed in May for a sum of £60 to cover this and the purchase of new cassocks and surplices. We are very gratified by the steady and unsolicited response which has been made to this appeal. Progress has been reported in the last three magazines and the statement below shows how much remains to be done.

Also the greater part of the fabric of the church has been repointed and various necessary repairs carried out. This is all that will be done for the present. The cost of this is met, as I think you know, from the Fabric Fund that has been accumulating since 1929 when the last big demand was made upon it for interior cleaning. We shall now have to pursue our policy of building up this fund by quarterly collections in church so that we may be ready when occasion arises, as it must, again to make and keep good the sacred building entrusted to us.

Writing in Patronal Week I feel the appropriateness of these matters. At such a time our thoughts are rightly of our own concerns and responsibilities. Anything we have been enabled to do by way of keeping our house in order is a subject of thanksgiving and the resolve to continue to do so a good one to make in Bartholomewtide. But another thought claims attention. It is this. The Kingdom of God has claims upon us far beyond the bounds of the parish. The stronger any Church is locally the further afield is it able to extend its sympathies. When stakes are strengthened cords can be lengthened, so even in Patronal Week may we think and pray imperially!

The Wake gives us again an opportunity for open-air witness. The service will be in the usual place at 6-0, and the hymns will be accompanied by the Barrow Band. Please assemble in church a few moments before 6-0 o'clock. Shortened Evensong will follow at 6-30.

The Harvest Festival.—This will be held on Sunday, September 27th. Offerings of fruit, vegetables, eggs, etc., will be gladly received in church early on Saturday morning. Horspool is gradually carrying it to perfection on the experience of previous years.

Outing to Cleethorpes.—A party of 54, including the choir boys went in two of Allen's buses to Cleethorpes on August 12th. Our last visit was in 1920. The weather was fine but not bright except for the drive home, when the sun shone brilliantly. Our route was via the Durham Ox, Newark, Lincoln and Caistor. We broke our outward journey at Lincoln and spent a short time in the cathedral. The far east of the building is hidden behind heavy scaffolding, being mended as one of the boys put it. Coming back we paused awhile at the Half-Way House between Lincoln and Newark.

Patronal Festival items.—The Mothers' Union assembled in good strength for their devotional service on the 25th. Afterwards Mrs. Toller most kindly entertained us to tea at Quorn Court, and thence we went on by invitation of Mrs. Farnham to Quorn House—a most delightful afternoon.

The same evening on the cricket field, very kindly lent to us by the Quorn C.C., Mr. J. Martin produced a team to meet the Old Quornians. The latter had matters well in hand with 92 to their credit and our wickets falling fast with runs still in the 30's, and the light failing fast, when John Rumsey, ordered to hit out or come out, scattered the ball

Parochial Outing.—Two bus loads of parishioners left the Cross on Saturday 29th August in glorious sunshine for a drive to Ashby, Melbourne and Breedon.

At Ashby we were shown round the church of St. Helen by the Vicar, who gave us an interesting account of the chief points of interest. We were also shown the valuable and unique collection of communion plate which this Church possesses.

Reaching Melbourne there was time for a look round before tea and then we visited the church—a fine example of Norman work—where again we were met by a guide, this time a past vicar, who evidently, by the vivid description he gave us, loved every stone of it.

Mr. Murray Rumsey conducted a shortened form of evensong and then we left for Breedon.

The Vicar met us as we completed our arduous climb, and described to us many points of absorbing interest in this ancient church. Some of the party climbed up into the organ loft and sang one or two hymns before leaving.

My dear Friends,

I once called at a house, and having asked if I might see Mrs. So and So was told, "She is busy resting." Well that is what I am doing these few weeks. You can't rest without giving your mind to it. You can rest all day long and go to bed tired at the end of the day. Moreover when you rest you generally read and then your mind gets busy. For instance I have been busy wondering whether the Christian religion and those who profess it and particularly the clergy are really so ineffective and in some case so ugly as some modern novelists hold them, and whether those who sit loosely to moral standards are really the best and sweetest people. It may be so. Of course, it is good to see yourself as others see you and bad to have too good a conceit of yourself, but all the same I think I shall write to one of these people and ask him if it is from experience or from hearsay that he paints us so disparagingly. If I do and he answers me I will tell you what he says. Of course a layman should do this for me, but I haven't got one by me at the moment. So you see it is busy work resting, and I hope my Doctor will soon send me back to the more restful daily round and common task, moreover I want to redeem the mis-spent time that's past.

Although November generally behaves far better than its reputation leads you to expect, and quite likely St. Martin will give us his little summer, still it is not a month that makes any great claims to beauty, damp fog being rather what it promises us. It makes up for this however in other ways. At the moment I am not thinking of the fire-side which comes into its own with this month, though that is certainly one of its charms, but I am thinking of the November calendar and its days of commemoration, bidding us mingle our present with the past and gain from remembrance of days that are gone

new strength and hope for those that are yet to come.

All Saints' Day is the 1st of the month and this year is a Sunday. St. Andrew brings the month to an end. The Armistice Anniversary comes in the middle. And may be in this, as in most months, there is an awakening of personal memories too.

The month then, for all its inclemency, has its beauties that may stir us deeply. But I do not suggest that our reaction to them should be merely emotional. My dear friends,

I am sorry to have been inactive for so long and not even yet am I released from my doctor's orders to take things quietly. I am most grateful to many friends and neighbours for the help they have given. As a consequence many new voices have been heard in church and messages given which I know have been warmly appreciated. This I am sure is all to the good. My brother, being as you know licensed by the Bishop to lead such parts of the worship as do not belong exclusively to the priesthood, has taken a full share of my work and is always unfailingly ready to fill gaps. Other workers, in Sunday School and at the altar and elsewhere, carry on with their usual devotion, and my warden, who is 16 years my senior, fills me in nothing.

One advantage to me of being unable to get about is that many of you have been to see me. To be the visited instead of the visitor is a pleasant change and should I be a little time longer before recovering my proper locomotion I hope it will continue. My diary normally contains the names of the people I go to see and usually they find their place into my prayers before the day is over. Lately their place has been taken by those who have been to see me, though not of course by them alone.

And now, though it is hard to believe, Christmas is very near. As always, home and church, hearth and altar will claim our presence, our love, our loyalty. If we will be trustworthy and trustful the festival will renew our own peace and confidence and will surely help to allay our world-fears and world-anxieties and guide our feet into the way of peace. I propose to have two administrations only of the Blessed Sacrament, namely at 7-30 and 9-30. If those of you who value the mid-day communion would come to one or other of these two services I should be grateful. On the Wednesday in the Christmas Octave, December 30th, there

will be a celebration at 10-0. I wish you all a very happy Christmas.

The result of the House to House Collection for the Empire Cancer Research Campaign was, I think, remarkable. I had undertaken, with some misgiving, to be in the first instance personally responsible for it some months ago. As the event proved there was no need for anxiety.
