After wandering round the castle grounds and an exceptionally good tea the party attended choral evensong. By the kindness of the senior assistant curate the magnificent church was explained after the service.

Bell Ringers Guild.—A meeting was held on June 23rd. Mr. G. Horspool whose much regretted departure took place six months ago attended and handed over his superintendence of the Guild to Mr. R. Bancroft, who was appointed to succeed him. The report of the attendances showed five of the ringers to have reached well over 90 per cent. The three probationers, E. Adkins, G. Turner and F. Walton were elected members of the Guild and are to be admitted at the 9-30 service on Sunday, July 10th. Names of possible new probationers were suggested and a practice fixed for July 7th.

Church Council, June 27th.

(i) Consideration was given to the following suggested regulations issued by the Diocesan Advisory Committee for the care of Churchyard Extensions. It was unanimously agreed to recommend their adoption.

1.—The surface of the Churchyard will be of grass, kept level and trimly mown.
2.—The Incumbent will sanction the placing of memorial monuments:—
(a) Headstones up to 4ft. 6in. in height.
(b) Crosses up to 5ft. 0in. in height.
(c) All Memorials shall be of English Oak, or of some stone or slate quarried in Great Britain.
(d) All designs, measurements, foundations and inscriptions on monuments shall be submitted to and approved by the Incumbent in writing, *before the order for them is given*. The Roman style of lettering is recommended.

3.—All Churchyard memorials, including inscriptions, in strictness require the grant of a faculty; but, where the Incumbent consents, a faculty is not in practice insisted upon. Should any permanent memorial be desired, which is not included under Paragraph 2 and is not Approved by the Incumbent, an application for a faculty must be made.

(ii) After Canon Lyon had explained the "New Churches Fund" the Council pledged itself to the support of the Fund and fixed July 25th as the date for a further meeting to consider ways and means.

My dear Friends,

We are glad to welcome Miss Callis back to her place at the organ after some twelve weeks of absence on account of illness. We trust that she will find that her health is sufficiently restored to enable her to carry on. Our two helpers, Mr. S. Cotton and Mr. Boothby, have fallen into our ways very efficiently, and we are very grateful to them.

I have been to Scotland for ten days since I last wrote. The most abiding memory of that holiday will be the boat trip round the island of Mull, landing at Iona and Staffa en route and returning by Tobermory and the sound of Mull. I did the trip 30 years ago in the opposite direction. The restored cathedral and other remains of early Christianity on Iona make a visit to the island well worth while. The name of Columba, to whom we owe so much of our Christianity, as it came to us from a Celtic source, is remembered with gratitude by all visitors to Iona. The cathedral lingers in the view for many miles as one travels northwards till it becomes a tiny speck before the north-west corner of Mull hides it from view. For this trip the weather and visibility were excellent. For the rest one realised at least that the glorious intervals of a rainy season show the West Highlands at their best. Stephen left me to complete his holiday in Skye, and on the way to repeat my own far-off experiences of climbing Ben Nevis in the pouring rain with no visibility whatever. This I did in 1908 on two successive days, but Ben Cruachan's view of the sunset on the same holiday left a kind and beautiful memory.

I hope the New Churches Fund will engage our serious attention in the near future and that we shall support it to the best of our ability according to the pledge of the Church Council recorded last month. Will you please take note below the steps which we propose to take.

My dear Friends,

When I last wrote we were passing through what has come to be known as "the crisis". Many of you came to prayer for ten minutes on the evenings of that most anxious week. On Friday, when our prayers for the aversion of war had been answered in the affirmative, we gave thanks from the bottom of our hearts. Indeed, we could do no other, for war under modern conditions could not be contemplated but with the utmost dread.

While, however, armament drives are the order of the day, our present peace is nothing much more than the aversion of war for the time, possibly no more than its postponement. Certainly it is not a trustworthy peace, much less is it the Peace of God. For this we have yet to pray.

I am wondering whether our experience of prayer in the recent crisis might bear the fruit of more sustained effort of that kind. The state of the world is such that we do not need to wait for what we call a crisis. Nor for very shame should we be like those of whom Isaiah wrote, "In trouble have they visited Thee, they poured out a prayer when Thy chastening was upon them."

So I make this suggestion: As we met every evening of the crisis week at 8-0 for ten minutes of prayer, let us have a similar prayer meeting every Wednesday evening this month at the same time. The state of the world in general will be our subject. Will you come?
