Christmas Decorations and Parties.—The church was beautifully decorated by willing hands on the Friday before Christmas.

The Christmas parties in the Church Room have passed off very happily. The room could not comfortably have held many more than assembled for the adult party. Many new games were introduced by the secretary and his committee; these, with dancing, cards and refreshments, provided a most enjoyable evening.

The Sunday School parties followed on Saturday afternoon. Every child had a present from the Christmas Tree. The superintendents and teachers carried through a brisk programme of games, and there were refreshments, crackers and oranges in abundance.

All these things entail a great deal of work, given, as always, most willingly, and for the evergreen for Church and the Christmas Tree we are indebted to Captain and Mrs. Nihell Preau.

Electoral Roll.—The Church Council have in hand the annual revision of the roll, and any who wish to be enrolled should give in their names to the secretary or one of the members.

Flag of St. George.—The Vicar has received an anonymous gift of a new flag, which flew for the first time on Christmas Day. This was badly needed, and is a most welcome gift.

Day Schools.—With much regret we have had to say good-bye to Miss Lofthouse. For ten years she has had the care of the babies' class and has done her work with a devotion which has earned the gratitude of many mothers. Her removal to another school is due to the decision of the County Council to reduce the number of the staff.

The Jewish Refugees.—Retiring collections amounting to £4 12s. were made on Sunday, December 11th. This has been sent through the secretary of the Board of Finance towards the sum of £50,000 being raised by the Church Assembly.

New Churches Fund.—A slight increase in our Parochial contribution since last month is recorded below by our local secretary. We hope there will soon be evidence of a far wider interest in this great diocesan effort.

Charities.—The Vicar and Churchwardens have had their usual Christmas session for the allocation of the Prior's, Ansted's and Miss Farnham's Charities, and the distribution of these was made on Monday, January 2nd, together with an expression of thanks to the departed donors and good wishes for the new year, which are customary.

Church Room.—The secretary and committee are carrying through their programme with enthusiasm, and beg to call attention to the January items mentioned below. They are also aiming at adding tables and trestles to the properties of the room. The announcement of a gift of one of the tables was recently made.

Sunday School Prize Giving.—This, together with the customary carol singing, will take place on Sunday, January 15th, at 2-30. Captain Edwards is coming to speak to the children. Parents and others will be welcome.

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My dear Friends,

The words are serious enough in all conscience, and yet as we say it we shall feel hopeful and cheerful and strong.

The Annual Vestry, sitting jointly with the **Parochial Church Meeting** (at which all on the Electoral Roll are entitled and invited to attend and vote) for the election of Churchwardens, will be held on Monday, February 6th, at 7-0 p.m., in the Church Room. This will be followed at 7-15 by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting for: (1) The Secretary's Church Council Report; (2) Treasurers' Statement of Account for 1938; (3) Election of Ruri-decanal Representative and Parochial Church Council; (4) Election of Sidesmen; (5) any other business.

Nominations of Church Councillors and Sidesmen may be made at the meeting, but it is hoped that they may be forwarded on the printed form (attached to the notice) to the secretary, Mr. J. Martin, before the meeting. In either case the consent of the nominee must have been secured.

The Accounts for 1938.—These are published herewith, and we hope they will be studied by all before the meeting. The ups and downs of finance are at least some indication of the degree of faithfulness with which the Church in Quorn is playing its part. They may also suggest self-examination questions, individual and corporate, e.g.,

How far have I personally been responsible for an increase here or a fall there in the various amounts recorded?

Lent Services.—On Wednesday evenings (beginning on Ash Wednesday) the Vicar of St. Peter's, Leicester, will give a course of addresses. It will be best to put this service at 7-0 instead of 7-30, so that those who wish to go on to the A.R.P. lecture at 8-0 can do so.

There will be occasional special preachers at the Sunday services, of which notice will be given in the notes below.

Amsgiving.—Lent Savings Boxes for the S.P.G. will be available, and should be asked for on the Sunday previous. The collections at the Wednesday services will be for the Police Court Mission (C.E.T.S.).

Sunday Schools.—There was quite a good attendance at the prize-giving on January 15th. We were sorry not to have Captain Edwards with us. The superintendents had made careful preparations for the occasion and carols had been practised on the Sundays before. Mr. W. Prevost presented a report relating to the senior school, which dwelt on many interesting points. Compared with three years ago, the number of children has shown an increase (though not by comparison with a more distant date). We have a few more boys than girls. One of our greatest needs is a separate afternoon Bible Class for boys from school-leaving age upward. The opportunity was taken to thank the teachers for their work.

Social Gatherings, etc.—Those arranged by the Church Room Committee and the G.F.S. have attracted large numbers, and have been most enjoyable. Miss Facer's friends acted a farce entitled "A world without men," which, most deservedly, met with great success. The Church Room has two more social events noted below (Feb. 9 and 21) and the last of the Bible talks will be on Feb. 8th (please note change of date). The Church Room balance sheet gives cause for congratulation to secretary, treasurer and committee.

Annual Meetings.—There was a fair attendance and a good spirit prevailed. The Vicar nominated Mr. J. Martin his warden for the second time and the people re-elected Col. W. S. N. Toller. While discussing the accounts, which were passed, a question was asked about the insurance of the Church, which was referred to the Church Council. Nominations were forthcoming for the exact number of Church Councillors required, so the meeting was not prolonged by a ballot. Three previous members were unable to stand for re-election. Their places were filled by Mr. R. Bancroft, Mr. C. Joiner, Mrs. G. Joiner. The number of sidesmen is one less than last year, two having retired and Mr. Hugh Woodcock being newly elected. At the end of the meeting a few matters of general interest were raised and appreciation was expressed by one and another of different branches of Church work. And so in a com-

fortable atmosphere of mutual congratulation the meeting was brought to a close.

Church Council.—The first meeting was held on February 20th. The following officers were elected: Treasurers, Col. W. S. N. Toller and Mr. J. Martin; Vice-Chairman, Mr. Leon Morley; Secretary, Mr. J. Martin. Sub-Committees for Churchyard, Church Room and Missionary were also elected. Under other business electoral roll districts were allotted to the members, and the question of insurance which was raised at the annual meeting was discussed. No resolution was proposed, but the general opinion expressed was that the sum of £17,600 for which the Church is insured is adequate. On the question of the advisability of third party insurance the Secretary was asked to make inquiries. Next meeting, March 27th, 8-0.

Lent Services.—The first of the special Wednesday evening services has been held. It was a cold wet evening and many are still on the sick list, so probably many who intend to be present at these services were away. We hope that will not discourage them from joining up later in the course. Mid-week worship has a value all its own. The third of this series will be on Thursday, March 9th (owing to the Confirmation being on March 8th).

On the Sundays in Lent the Vicar will be exchanging from time to time with some of the neighbouring clergy. Announcement of these arrangements are made in the notes below. Particulars of the Cathedral services on Wednesdays and Fridays are to be found in the porch. Why not fit these in with shopping expeditions?

Mothering Sunday, March 19th.—The newly Confirmed will make their first Communion then. No doubt their relations and friends will join them then. It is much to be hoped that they will. At Evensong again the idea is to encourage people to come and worship in family groups. If this could be done more and more on other Sundays too it would surely do much to keep the young folk true to their Churchmanship after they have left the Sunday School. So often they have no one to come with. Because parental authority can no longer say "Go" and is not willing to say "Come" the adolescent drifts from the Church and becomes gradually a stranger.

So at least let Mothering Sunday collect us together as families in God's House.

The Bible.—A word of thanks is due to the Rev. H. Hodgkins for his four talks on the Bible. "Stimulating" is, I think the right epithet to give them. Certainly those who came, an average of 20, expressed themselves as deeply interested. Probably what will remain is the conviction that the Bible contains the progressive revelation of God to man, are a true but a gradual unfolding reaching its climax in our Lord Jesus Christ. The realisation of this should wonderfully deepen our interest in Bible reading.

They have been typical of the variety of Church Room activities, viz. a Bible lecture, an old-time dance, a lantern talk on the Church Assembly, a no-prize whist drive. My dear Friends,

Although May sunshine seems to have been above the average, Ascensiontide was damp and cold, and so the children did not come for their games on the Vicarage lawn. This was a disappointment to me and to them. We must try and find another Ascension Day in the near future.

The Missionary Exhibition occupied our thoughts for a large part of the past month. Throughout the ten days there was a steady stream of people coming and going. Interest was deepened because so much knowledge was imparted, and as a consequence many must be better prepared to answer the question, asked even by Christians sometimes, strange though it may seem, "Why should we interfere with other peoples' religion?"

As to the harvest to be reaped from the Exhibition, each parish will probably be making its plans. I hope all our workers will feel that some "follow-up" is essential. As to methods they can be quite simple. By an odd coincidence, the initials of the old S.P.G. suggest the way and the right order, viz., to Study, and Pray, and to Give. The more we can add to the number of those who are doing these things the more rapid will be the achievement for which we pray so often in the words "Thy Kingdom Come".

The message of Whitsuntide this year was very clear and appropriate. It came at a time when we are all speaking of power in terms of armaments and alliances and the mobilisation of material forces. It came to remind us that the power of God's Holy Spirit is supreme and that spiritual resources are of the first importance. The tension of these last few weeks has not been so severe, but there must be no relaxation of prayer and self consecration if out of discord is to come the harmony and agreement for which we hope.

Your Church Council has appointed Mrs. J. Facer to succeed Mrs. Joiner as cleaner of the church. She has already got well into her work, and we hope that she will be happy in it for many years to come. It is not a light task to keep an open church always worthy of the presence of God and eloquent of that presence to all who enter. Those are the traditions, and we do not doubt that they will be maintained.
