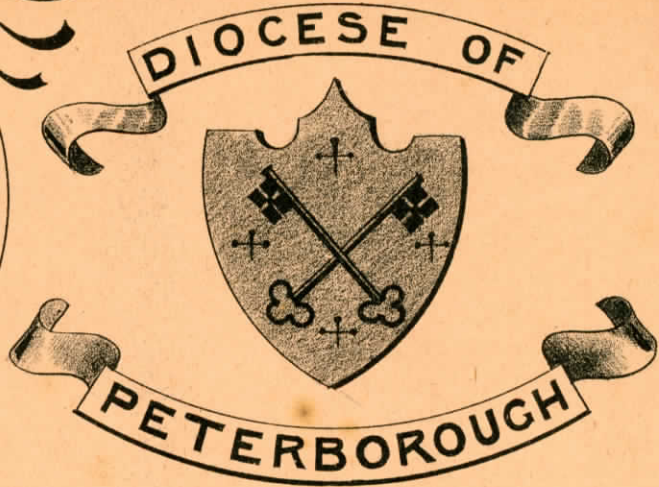
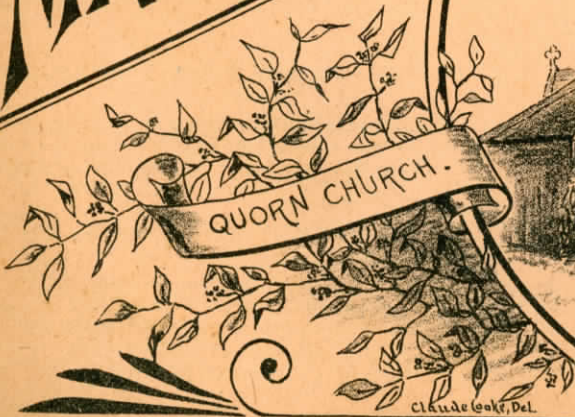

SUNDAYS & HOLY DAYS OF THE MONTH.

Saturday, Feb. 2nd.—Festival of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. (S. Luke ii 22-39.)

3rd.—Fourth Sunday after Epiphany.

10th.—Septuagesima Sunday. On this Sunday we begin to look forward to Lent and Easter. Septuagesima Sunday means Seventieth—it being about seventy days from Easter. On this Sunday we begin a new series of Sunday First Lessons with the 1st chapter in the Bible.

Our Lessons in Church are so arranged that any one who goes to Church on Sundays regularly has every year the whole story of the Old Testament, besides the passages from the New Testament in the 2nd Lessons and the Epistle and Gospel. Is there any other body of Christians who use so much of the Bible in their services?

17th.—Sexagesima Sunday. This is so called because it comes about the Sixtieth day from Easter.

24th.—Quinquagesima Sunday. About the Fiftieth day from Easter. This Sunday is also the **Festival of S. Matthias the Apostle** chosen to fill the place of Judas the Traitor. (Acts i. 15, &c.)

Wednesday, 27th.—Ash Wednesday. The first day of the solemn season of Lent, during which we commemorate our Lord's fasting and temptation. (S. Matt. iv. 1-11.)

The teaching of Ash Wednesday may be gathered from the special service appointed for that day alone—Communion Service (or Service of Warning) which comes in our Prayer Books just before the Psalms.

They should be brought to Church if possible (any Sunday Afternoon at 3.30), or in case of delicate children, or sudden sickness the Vicar is always ready, at any time, to attend at the home.

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Surely one of the most successful gatherings ever got together in Quorn, was that held at the Village Hall on Thursday, January 17th. The occasion was a Tea and Entertainment for the old people of the village, organized by Mr. George White. About 100 sat down for the meat Tea at 4.30, and from 6 till past 9 a series of Entertainments took place—first a short Concert—then an Exhibition of "Living Wax Works," conducted by Miss Wright—then a Theatrical Piece, acted by a lady and two gentlemen staying at Quorn Lodge—and last a Nigger Minstrel Entertainment. This last item proved most amusing, and though the faces of all the performers were properly blacked, yet it was interesting to make out a member of our new District in the chair, and a well-known official to the same body taking a leading part, with the children of both helping. This old people's Tea will not soon be forgotten!

On Septuagesima Sunday, February 10th, the annual collections for the Church of England Temperance Society will be made.

On Sunday, February 17th, the sermons, both morning and evening will be preached by the Rev. Canon Stocks, Vicar of S. Saviour's, Leicester and Rural Dean. On Sunday Evening, February 24th, the preacher will be the Rev. T. Pitts, Rector of Loughborough and Rural Dean.

Four Special Addresses on Wednesday Evenings in Lent will be given by the Rev. H. S. Gedge, Rector of Aylestone, on March, 6th, 13th, 20th, and 27th.

The Bishop has sent notice that Confirmations will be held in this neighbourhood during April and May. The Vicar will be glad to receive names of those wishing to be confirmed, and in special cases where it may be desired he will give private and individual help in the preparation.

The Working Party began on Tuesday, January 15th, and will be continued on Tuesday, at the Village Hall. We gave the time wrong, it should have been 3 to 7. Tea is provided at a small charge and anyone who can do work will be welcomed. The collecting for funds to start this work has been so successful that the proceeds will more than pay all the special expenses connected with the freeing of the seats in the Church. Whatever balance there may be, will be devoted to some other object in connection with the Church, such as repairing the tower or building an organ-chamber. This last improvement is sadly needed now. With the choir in the chancel it is very hard singing with the organ round the corner in the side aisle—but all in good time—we must not be in a hurry. We have been asked to give a list of subscriptions to the fund for supplying materials for the working party.
