MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY OF THE ASSOCIATION
OF CONSERVATIVE CLUBS TO THE MEMBERS OF THE
QUORNDON CONSERVATIVE CLUB ON THE OCCASION
OF THEIR CLUB'S DIAMOND JUBILEE.



I greatly welcome the opportunity on behalf of this Association and myself to congratulate the members of the Club on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee.

The Quorn Conservative Club as such, has a long and distinguished history. It stands on very sure foundations, both literally and spiritually, since the foundations of the present building, which the Club has occupied since 1920, are believed to date from the 14th Century and the building itself, as the Deeds reveal, since 1707.

Like so many of our Clubs, keen and dedicated Conservatives formed the Club for the purpose of meeting and with a view to developing their political and social contacts as early as 1912 when, in fact, they became members of this Association on 19th March in that year.

In due course the members found the need for a home of their own and today those of you who have the distinction of being members of the Quorn Conservative Club enjoy occupation of premises which you have occupied since 1920.

However, you the members will not wish me to tell you about yourselves but, as I understand it, would like to know a little more about the wider family of the Conservative Club movement of which you are, and have been for so long, a valued member. The Association of Conservative Clubs, in an unformed way, germinated in the brilliant minds of Benjamin Disraeli and John Gorst, the then Chief Agent of the Party, in the 1850's. It was they, bearing in mind the principle preached by Disraeli, which was to unite the different classes in the community into what he called the one nation, which led to various political developments of which one was our Club movement. Thus it was, that we had at one end, if you like, of political influence, such places as the Carlton Club, the Constitutional Club, St. Stevens and some of the great county Clubs and at the other, throughout the country, the Working Men's Clubs. They all had one thing in common, they discussed political and social questions which really are indistinguishable, since the first is much concerned with the second.

All of the good work that was being done needed co-ordination and a sense of unity between various parts of the country and the individuals in various Clubs. Thus the loose association which had been growing in strength and firmly coalescing found its mutual home in the foundation of the Association of Conservative Clubs in 1894. The original governing body consisted of twelve representatives of the West End London Clubs. They were therefore the founders of our movement, but those which have sustained it have been found primarily up and down the country in places like Quorn. The principal object of the Association then, and it remains so, was defined simply as: "to promote amongst Conservative and Constitutional Clubs co-operation for political purposes."

The Association prospered and was a considerable influence in the Conservative Party, the Clubs were rallying points, as so many of them are now, and all ought to be, for political activities.

The two great wars weakened some of the influence effected by the movement and by 1948 re-organization and modernisation was undertaken to enable the Association to fulfill those original purposes.

It was in 1933 that the composition of the governing body was widened to include representatives of all the areas and today I think it fair to say we have in our 1400 plus Clubs possibly three-quarters to a million members.

One of the fascinating trends, post the 1939-1945 has been the interest taken in Clubs by those hard-working members of the Party, the ladies. Responding to the trend, Clubs have spent vast sums of money on modernisation and improvements to accommodate in a fitting manner the advent of the ladies into membership.

Throughout this time the Association itself has recognised that a Conservative Club is or should be a comfortable meeting place for Conservatives. It is a Centre for social and political activities and, not least, a source of support in cash and in physical effort for the local Conservative Organisation. Most Clubs are run by the members voluntarily as Officers and Members of the Committee and many of the Club members help in specific and general ways. They are run on strictly business lines, indeed they must be if they are to be profitable and be able to make suitable reserves for future developments and one would hope to assist with the formation of other Conservative Clubs.

The Association as such is managed by the Council of the Association whose members are appointed from the Area Committees. They, in turn, delegate the day to day management of the Executive Committee whose remit is carried out by the professional officers and staff here at Headquarters. It is this chain of command and the response to it by the staff which enable us to serve our Clubs in many ways.

We advise Clubs on how to get started, we continually seek to help them keep on the right side of the law, how to overcome management problems and how to develop their finances. In particular we do a considerable amount of work in respect of the Rules of Clubs, advising and assisting in every way possible and principally by the use of our model Rules. These models are, we like to think the distillation of experience gained from our contact with hard working Club Committees. They are, in short, useful guides for those settling their own Club Rules which form the all important contract entered into between the members of a particular Club. We also advise on the formation of fund raising, political Committees, Federations and other local Club Committees, realising how important it is for our Clubs to exchange views with each other and for us to do so on a wider front.

We keep in close contact with government departments concerned with legislation affecting or likely to affect the life of the Club movement, and we have had a measure of success over the years in this particular work.

The Association provides supplies specially geared to the needs of member Clubs, such as account books and other Club books necessary to good management. We administer the inter affiliation ticket scheme, whereby our members throughout the country can enjoy the facilities of almost all the other member Clubs within the Membership of the Association.


We administer the Club Development Fund which lends money to establish and to develop Club premises. Our Chairman continually appeals for support for this fund since we should like to be much more helpful than perhaps has been the case in the past.

Other means of communication between the Association and its member Clubs is the Conservative Clubs' magazine which has recently undergone a transformation, resulting in a new look and a new approach which we think the members should like and find valuable to them. It is our hope that from the first edition coming out in October and thereafter far more general Club members will have an opportunity to read this publication. It will continue to include Club news, but it is hoped of a much more up-to-date interest. It will also continue to include the articles on Club law and Management as the law in practice evolves in the modern age. We produce the ACC diary, the particular value of which is that it includes an updated guide to legislation affecting Clubs.

Daily we answer the queries put to us by Conservative Secretaries on behalf of their Committees and their members and by telephone and correspondence seek to help to solve their problems.

It is our contention that no Constituency is politically, socially or financially complete without a Conservative Club, as I am sure the members of your Club would firmly agree.

I hope the celebration of your Diamond Jubilee will be of great success and another marker in your long march to future successes.


We can assure you all that making facilities available to us is a real contribution to the effectiveness of the Party as a whole and is greatly appreciated.

History of the building which houses QUORN CONSERVATIVE CLUB

Extracted from the original deeds by Joyce Elliott.

NO. 40 STATION ROAD

The first record held of the building is when it was sold on 1st November 1765. The building was owned by John Cook and his wife Mary. (The original indenture is framed and hanging in the club.)

John Cook mortgaged the building at various times and also leased it, eventually selling the property to Thomas Bradshaw (Frame Work Knitter) on 18th October 1787. The building was originally a dwelling house with a barn at the back and Mr. Bradshaw converted the barn into a hosiery factory.

In his will dated 16th May, 1788 Thomas Bradshaw left the property to his daughter Mary and her heirs. Mary married William Whitehead and she sold the property to Charles Briggs on 2nd November 1837 for £213. Charles Briggs sold to John Coates 12th May 1875 for £212.10s.

John Coates sold the property — now a bakehouse — to William Webster on 29th September 1877 for £218. William Webster, who was a baker, demolished the building and built a coffee house in its place. He died on 3rd September 1884 and in his will he left the coffee house to his wife Charlotte for her life and after her death to his executors on trust to sell the property and divide the proceeds between his two sons John and Thomas. Charlotte died 5th July 1895 but on 28th May 1886 H John Webster sold his share to Thomas for £300. The property called "The Havelock Coffee House" consisted of a club room, cart shed, yard and garden and stretched from Barrow Street (now Station Road) back to Nursery Lane. Thomas Webster sold on 19th July 1910 to Edward Handley Warner, John Davys Cradock and George White for £300 for use as a club.

On 30th December, 1919 Warner, Cradock and White sold the property to David Smith Hack, Henry Judd and William Hollingsworth and on 1st January 1920 they became trustees on behalf of the members of the club to be known as QUORN CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION. The Club was in existence as early as 1912, when it became a member of the Association of Conservative Clubs. Up to 1920, however it had no permanent premises. (The first registration certificate was issued some time in 1921). William Hollingsworth died 8th August 1930 and David Hack died 20th February 1946. Archibald Frank Tailby and Edward Cecil Russ became trustees on 1st April 1949. On March 27th 1953 Percy Selvester replaced Mr. Tailby. Henry Judd died 7th November 1953 and William Alfred Turland became a trustee in his place on 7th February 1957. Peter Richard Brookman became a trustee on March 7th 1957 in place of Percy Selvester.

Edward Russ died 9th September 1966.

William Alfred Turland died 3rd April 1971.

Rex Bloore and Sidney James Waterfield became trustees on 29th February 1972.

Marius Wright was appointed a trustee in 1973, to replace Sidney James Waterfield. Dennis Sutton was appointed in 1980 on the resignation of Rex Bloore. Marius Wright died in 1980 and was replaced by John Maltby.

The present trustees consist of Peter Richard Brookman, Dennis Sutton and John Maltby.

NO. 42 STATION ROAD

This property was owned by Percy William Meadow Wright of One Ash, Woodthorpe. It consisted of a shop, living quarters and outbuildings. At the time he owned three buildings known as 32, 34 and 36 Station Road but these were re-numbered 42, 44 and 46 on November 3rd 1965.

Mr. Wright died 25th May 1920 and in his will he left the property to his wife Agnes, she died 22nd February 1929.

Mrs. Annie Sharpe bought number 32 on 11th March 1929 and she lived there until she died 28th February 1960. Her son Ian David Sharpe sold the house and shop to Leslie and Phyllis White on 31st October, 1960, who traded as butchers.

Quorn Conservative Club bought the property from Leslie and Phyllis White on 31st January, 1972.

Work was then started on enlarging the club and the various small rooms were opened up into one large 'L' shaped room.

In 1979 three rooms on the top floor of 40 and 42 Station Road were made into two meeting rooms and in 1980 extensions at the back of the club were started, these consisted of a bottle store, kitchen and large committee room. These were officially opened by Michael Latham, M.P. on 19th December 1980.



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
